The Indian Bottom Association of Old Regular Baptist Churches of Jesus Christ met with the Sandlick Church, Whitesburg Ky., September 5, 6, 7, 1930. The congregation met at the stand and after singing by the congregation and prayer by Eld. L. C. Riddle, the Introductory was preached by Eld G. C. Riddle, from Hebrews 13:1, "Let brotherly love continue." Then the delegates met and assembled at the church house, and after prayer by Eld. W. R. Boggs, the association proceeded to business in the following minaner:

1. The Moderator then called for letters from churches that comprised the Indian Bottom Association. Letters received and read, and delegates seated and shown in the table of statistics.

2. The Association then organized by electing Eld. D. M. Maggard, moderator, and Eld. W. R. Boggs, assistant moderator; Eld. Geo. B. Ison, clerk; and Eld. Hendrix Caudill assistant clerk.

3. On motion, the reading of Articles of Faith, Rules of Decorium and Constitution were omitted.

4. Called for newly constituted churches of the same faith and order and received two, viz.: Ingram Creek and James Memo-

rial, and letters read and delegates seated.

- 5. Called for corresponding letters from sister associations, and received the following: A union association with letter and delegates as follows: Eld. Joe Hall, Willie Bates, T. R. Collier, B. H. Baker, J. J. Johnson. J. B. Stallard (letter delivered by T. R. Collier) who was given the right hand of fellowship and took seats and aided in council; New Salem with Eld F. A. Hopkins as delegate, who was also given the right hand of fellowship and took seat and aided us in council.
- 6. Called for transient ministers and members of the same faith and order and received Eld. F. A. Hopkins, Willis Tolliver; Brethern B. J. Adams, P. H. Wells, C. W. Richardson, Lewis Caudill, Dewey Hampton and Thomas Stout.

7. On motion the Moderator was authorized to make all temporary appointments during this session of the Association.

- 8. Appointed a committee to arrange the ministry for Saturday, consisting of one member from each of the churches, with the entire delegation from the Sandlick Church, who reported as follows: First, Eld. W. M. Scott; second, London Francis, third, T. R. Collier; fourth, James Caudill; fifth, B. H. Baker; sixth, F. A. Hopkins.
- 9. Appointed the clerk and assistant clerk to write the corresponding letters to sister associations.
- 10. Appointed a committee on arrangements, consisting of one delegate from each church with the moderator, clerk, corresponding transient ministers and members invited to arrange the business for tomorrow.
- 11. On motion the association was adjourned until tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, sun time, with the committee on arrangements to meet just after adjournment.

Saturday Morning, September 1930.

Met pursuant to adjournment, and after singing by the delegates and prayer by Eld. Goo. Hagans, the association then proceeded to business in the following manner:

1. Called the names of the delegates and marked the absen-

tees.

2. Called the committee on arrangements to report, and who reported as follows, and then was discharged, viz.: "We, the committee on arrangements, after prayerful consideration, do recommend to the Indian Bottom Association as follows: That the work done in the association prior to this session stand unmolested. We further recommend that the association send a committee to investigate the records and standing of Little Zion Church and ask her to quit seating and using disorderly ministers and members. Also to re-baptize her members that have been baptised by disorderly ministers; also to ask her to report at our next session of this association.

"Signed: J. D. Kelly."

3. Called for transient ministers and members, but received

4. On motion the ministers who were appointed on the stand

for today were excused.

5. Report of committee on airangements was received and adopted and requests granted and a committee was appointed by the association's moderator to visit the Little Zion Church and to make the proper investigations. Committee: Eld. G. C. Riddle, F. G. Fields and Bro. I. N. Lewis, and to meet the first Saturday in November.

6. Appointed a committee on finance, viz.: Bro. I. N. Lewis, W. M. Brown and John Jenkins, who received the contributions from the churches as shown in the table of statistics, amounting to \$103.15, which was turned over to Eld. Geo. B. Ison,

treasurer.

7. Appointed the same committee on ministery as of yesterday, who reported the following ministers to preach on stand for Sunday: First, Eld. F. G. Fields to open; second, Eld. Geo. Hagans, text, "Think on me when it shall be well with &c." Gen. 40; third; D. M. Magand, text, "Blessed is he that hat a part in the first &c.; fourth, Sherman Gibson, text, "If any of you thirst, let him come unto me;" fifth, Robert Combs; sixth, W. R. Boggs, text, "To give knowledge of salvation through God." Luke 7:79:

8. Called on secretary and treasurer to report, who reported as follows:

9. Appointed Geo. B. Ison secretary and treasurer and finance committee to turn over the present contributions to treasurer, which amounted to \$103.15 plus \$5.00 from last year, making a grand total for 1930 of \$108.15.

10. It is ordered that the secretary and treasurer superintend the printing of 1400 minutes for the association. Reserve 200 copies for sister associations and to distribute remainder among the churches according to their contributions as near as can be so that each church may receive one for each of its members.

11. Called on brethern appointed to write corresponding letters to sister associations. (a) The letter to Union Association was read, received and appointed Eld. F. F. Sumner, G. M. Caudill, Cullin Hogg, Calch Creech, Bros. I. N. Lewis and David Caudill as delegates to attend. (b) Letter to New Salem was read received and Eld. Ben Adams, Bros. Henry Blair and C. W. Richard to attend as delegates.

12. Called on brethern appointed last year to attend sister essociations and union meetings to report, who reported, and

those who failed to attend were excused.

13. Appointed union meetings as follows: Carrs Fork, 4th Saturday in June, Eld. Geo Hagans, Thomas Collier, Geo. B. Ison, F. A. Hopkins and W. R. Boggs to attend. # ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in the one true and living God; and notwithstanding there are Three that bear record in heaven, the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet there is but one in substance, equal in power and glory, not to be divided and impossible to change in principle or practice.

2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the true written words of God, and were given by inspiration of God, and there is a sufficiency in them contained for our instruction, and they are the only

rule of our faith and practice.

3. We believe in the dectrine of original sin and that men sinned since the fall, and are by nature the children of wrath.

4. We believe in the empotency or inability of men to recover themselves out of the state they are in: therefore, a Savior is absolutely needed.

5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God, only by the

imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

- 6. We believe in the perseverance of the Saints, that through grace they are born again and adopted into the family of heaven; that they become equal heirs with Jesus Christ in Glory and that He will raise them up at the last.
- 7. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are gospel ordinances; that true believers are the proper subjects and we admit of no other.
- 8. We believe that the true mode of baptism is by immersion, to baptize a person by their own consent, back foremost in water, in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost.
- 9. We believe that washing one another's feet is a commandment of Christ, left on record with His disciples, and ought to be practiced by Fis followers.
- 10. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgment when all will be judged according to their deeds done in the body.
- 11. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal after death.

12. We believe that no one has a right to administer the Gospel Ordi-

nances but such as are legally called and qualified thereunto.

13. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to attend church meetings and that it is the duty of the church to deal with them for neglecting the same.

14. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to contribute to the support of the church by defraying all reasonable expenses of the same never neglecting the poor according to their several abilities.

- 15. We believe that any doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge the people in their sins or to cause them to settle down on anything short of saving grace in Christ for salvation is erroneous and such doctrine will be rejected by us.
- 16. None of the above articles shall be construed as to hold with particular election or reprobation so as to make God partial, directly or indirectly, so as to injure children of men.
- 17. No one of the above articles shall be altered without legal notice and free consent.

# RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2. A moderator and clerk shall be chosen by the suffrage of the mem-

bers present.

3. Only one member shall speak at a time and shall rise from his seat when he is about to speak.

4. The person speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyore except the moderator until he is done speaking.

5. He shall strictly adhere to his subject and in no wise reflect on the proceding speaker, but shall define his ideas on the proposition for debate as far as he can.

6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave for the same.

7. No person shall rise and speak more than three time on any one subtiest without permission of the Association.

3. No member of the Association shall have liberty to laugh during the sitting of same, nor whisper in time of public speech.

9. No member shall address another by any other name or term than that of "Prother."

10. The moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit a member from speaking until he gives his views on the subject, unless he shall have violated the rules of decorum.

11. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the clerk and called over as the Association may require.

12. The moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speech as another member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided, in that event he shall give the deciding vote.

13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reprimanded by the Association as it may think proper.

# CONSTITUTION

Having by unanimous voice changed our organization from on unusual union meeting to an association, we therefore, propose to keep the order and rules of an association according to the following form of government

1. The association shall be called "The Indian Disam Association."

2. The association shall be compared of members chosen by the different churches in our union and duty sent to represent them in the Association. who shall be members whom they judge best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their churches cordiging their appointment, shall be entitled to a sent.

3. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their number in full fellowship; those baptized, reseived by letter, restoration, application, dismissed, excluded and deceased since our last association.

4 The members thus chosen and convened thall have no power to lard over Cod's heritage, nor shall they have any elerical power over the churches, nor shall they infringe on the rights of any of the churches in the union,

5. The Association when convend shall be governed by a regular and

proper decorum.

6. The Association shall have a moderator, clerk and treasurer, who shall

be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

7. New churches may be admitted into this union, which shall patition by letter and delegates, and if found upon examination to be orthodex and orderly shall be received by the Association and manifested by the Mud erator giving the right hand of fellow-hin,

8. Hery church in the union shall be entitled to representation in the

Association.

- 9. Every query presented by the church to the Ausociation, being that debated in their own church, shall come under the consideration of the Association.
- 10. Every motion made and seconded shall be considered by the Associaation except it be withdrawn by the party who made it.
- 11. We think it absolutely recessary that we have an Association fend for defraying the expenses of the corner for the raising of which we think it the duty of each church in the miles to contribute such sums voluntarily as they think proper, and sone it by their delegates to the Association, and the amount so received shall be done ited with the treasurer who shall be responsible to the Association and pay same out as the Association may
- 12. There shall be an Association book kept in which the proceedings of every Association shall be regularly recorded by the recretery.
- 13. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if need le, and signed by the moderator and cleek before the Association rises.
- 14. Amendments to this plan of government may be made at any tineby a majority of the union, when it may co desire.
- 15. The Association shall endeavor to formish the charebes with minutes of the Association. The best method of effective same shall be determined by the Association.
- 16. All matters coming before the Association chall be decided by will of a majority of the members present, except in receiving and dismissing churches and Associations, which shall be by a unanimous vote,
  - 17. The Association shall have power to decide for the general union of

the churches and to preserve an inviolable chain of communion among same, giving the churches all necessary advice in matters of church diffically; inquire into the cause why any church shall have failed to represent itself at any time in the Association; appropriate the money received to any purpose it may think proper; appoint any member or members, by their consent, to transact any business which it may think necessary; withdraw from any church in the anion which may violate any of the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodex principles of religion; admit my or lerly minister of our faith and order to a sent in the Association; and adjourn to any future time or place it may doem necessary.

## RESOLUTIONS

1. RESOLVED. That the clerk supply all ommissions that may have been made by oversight.

2. Resolved, that the Articles of Faith, Rules of Decorum and Constitution and form of church letter be printed in our minules.

3. Resolved, that this Association pay actual expenses, such as radroad fare and hotel bills of delegates of this Association who attend our sister associations and the Treasurer, Eld. Geo. B. Ison, is hereby authorized to pay same and take credit in his ment report.

4. Resolved, that the delegates of the Association not leave

the Association until the final close.

5. Resolved, that we print in our minutes—the obituaries—of car deceased members and that the arma be furnished our secretary.

6. Resolved, that our next association be held with the New Home Church, of Hindman, Knott County, Ly., to begin on Friday before the first Saturday in September, 1931, and that Eld. 1). M Maggard preach the introductory sermon on that day; that Eld. Goo. Hagans be his alternate.

7. Resolved that this Association give her compliments to the Studilica Church and the surrounding country for the kindness

shown this Association.

8. Resolved, that this Association adjourn until the time and place of our next Association.
