PROCEEDINGS

The Indian Bottom Association of Old Regular Baptist met with the Mallet Fork Church and after singing by the delegates and prayer by Eld. George Hagans, Eld. Caleb Creech preached the introductory sermon, Eld. Robert Combs not being present. His text, "How Shall We Escape, If We Neglect So Great Salvation." -Heb. 2:3.

The Association then proceeded to organize after singing

by the delegates and prayer by Eld. Ballard Baker.

1. Called on the letter bearers, who turned in to the Clerk, the letters from the several Churches. The Clerk read one, then on motion the letters and delegates were received as shown in the table of statistics; and all querries, if any, to be referred to the Committee on Arrangements. On motion, delegates where no letters were received, were scated as delegates.

2. Then Eld. W. R. Boggs was, by move and second, nominsted for Moderator. Next a motion that nominations close. He

was elected without a dissenting vote.

Next a motion was made to retain Eld F. G. Fields and W. C. Hogg. Assistant Moderators, and they were reelected as such.

Then a motion was made to retain Bro. I. N. Lewis as Clerk and Henry Blair, Assistant Clerk, and they were reelected as such.

3. On motion the Articles of Faith, Rules of Decorum and

Constitution were read, approved and adopted.

- 4. Called for newly Constituted Churches and received Petitionary Letters, one from "Dry Fork" Church and one from "Little Bethlehem" Church. Their letters were received and delegates seated as shown in table of statistics; their Constitution being found orthodox.
- 5. Called for letters from Sister Associations and received two as follows: From New Salem Association letter, file of minutes, and delegates; which was received, and the delegates given the right hand of fellowship and invited to seats and to aid in Counsel. From the Union Association letter, file of minutes and delegates given the right hand of fellowship and invited to seats and to aid us in Counsel.
- 6. Called for Transient Ministers and members, and received Elds. James Caudill, W. S. Tolliver, Alva Caudill, Arlie Brown, Jessie Cornett and J. S. Gibson.

7. On motion the Moderator was authorized to make all

temporary Appointments during this Association.

8. Appointed a Committee on Ministry, consisting of N. T. Maggard, Nick Everidge, Wm. Scott, G. B. Ison, Chas. Baldridge, Bradley Gilliam, Harrison Williams, A. C. Craft, J. C. Brown, H. H. Collins, N. B. Smith, Floyd Huff, John Eldridge, Moses Adams, Francis Owens, Kerney Day, Bob Blair, K. Anderson, A. C. Caudill, Raymond Strunk, Silas Cox, Harrison Cornett, Watson Sexton, E. A. Reedy, J. W. Mullins, J. H. Brewer, Dawson Dixon and Ira Honeycut.

9. On motion I. N. Lewis and Henry Blair were appointed to write corresponding letters to Sister Associations, and report

10. The Committee appointed on Ministry, reported for on tomorrow. Saturday: 1st, N. T. Maggard; 2nd, F. A. Hopkins; 3rd, Linz Mosley;

4th, W. S. Tolliver; 5th, Wm Scott.

11. Committee on Arrangements to be same as on Ministry.

- No business before it. 12. On motion the Association adjourned till Saturday at 9:00 o'elock.

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 3RD, 1938

Met pursuant to adjournment and after singing by the delegates and prayer by Eld. H. M. Mullins, proceeded as follows:

1. Called the Roll of Delegates and marked the absentees, after which the Committee on Arrangements was discharged.

2. Called for Transient Ministers and Members and re-

ceived Eld. D. C. Maggard. 3. On motion, the Ministers chosen for the stand, were

excused for the day.

4. Appointed a Committee on Finance consisting of Bros. Jim Whitaker, G. B. Ison, and L. C. Riddle, who reported the sum of \$106.45 from the several Churches, which was turned over to * Bro. I. N. Lewis, who was appointed Secretary and Treasurer.

5. Appointed same Committee on Ministry as of yesterday, who reported: 1st, L. C. Riddle; 2nd, W. C. Hogg; 3rd, C. C.

", Bates; 4th, W. R. Boggs on stand for Sunday.

6. Report of Treasurer, read, and on motion was aproved, and the Treasurer allowed \$20.00 for his services instead of \$10.00

as heretofore allowed. 7. Letters to Sister Associations were read and approved and delegates appointed as follows: To New Salem Association, L. D. Francis, Ira Honeycut, E. A. Recely, A. C. Craft, Geo. Hagans,

Robert Blair, H. H. Collins. To Union Association, A. C. Craft, H. D. Caudill, W. R. Boggs, W. C. Hogg, John Back, Caleb Creech, Nickless Everidge, Leander Eldridge, Henry Blair, E. A. Reedy, Jasper Lucas, James Whitaker, Silas Cox, L. D.Francis, I. N. Lewis and Geo. Hagans.

8. On motion, it, was ordered that the Clerk have 2000 Minutes Printed and distributed after reserving 200 for Sister Associations, the remainder, apportioning them among the several Churches; the Clerk to superistend the printing of the Minutes.

9. Brothren appointed to attend Union Meetings and

Associations who failed to attend were excused.

10. Union Meetings were appointed with about fifteen churches for next year as will appear elsewhere under that heading.

11. Called on Eld. H. D. Caudill, who was appointed to write circular letter last year, who reported that none had been written. He was excused.

12. Called on Committee appointed to secure Association

Record Books to report. A partial report was read by Bro. Henry Blair, when Bro. Robert Combs, one of the Committee entered.

On motion, further time till next Association was extended, if needed, for the prosecution of the suit to a higher court if necessary. In event of further prosecution and lack of money to do the same, the cost equal to 15 cents per member is to be assessed against each church in this association. Brother I. N. Lewis, Clerk, to write notices to the several churches advising them of the committee's needs, if necessary.

13. On motion, it was agreed that I. N. Lewis write a

circular letter to be read at our next Association.

14. On motion, it is agreed that our next Association be held with the Big Leatherwood Church, Cornettsville, Perry County, Ky.; to begin on Friday before the first Saturday in September, 1939, and continue the two following days, and that Eld. W. R. Boggs preach the introductory sermon; W. C. Hogg to be his Alternate.

On motion, the foregoing Minutes were read and approved.

16. Then on motion, this Association was closed by prayer by Eld. W. R. Boggs, then adjourned to the time and place of our next Association. ELD. W. R. BOGGS, Moderator

CONSTITUTION

Having by unanimous voice changed our organization from an annual meeting to an Association, we therefore propose to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following form of government:

1. The Association shall be called The Indian Bottom Asso-

2. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by ciation. the different churches in our union and duly sent to represent the Association, who shall be members whom they judge best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to a seat.

3. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their number in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, restoration, application dismissed excluded and de-

ceased since our last association. 4. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord over God's heritage, nor shall they have any clerical power over the churches, nor shall they infringe on the rights of any of the churches in the union.

5. The Association, when convened, shall be goverened by a

regular and proper decorum.

6. The Association shall have a moderator, clerk and treasurer, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

7. New churches may be admitted into this union, which shall petition by letter and delegates, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association and manifested by the moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

8. Every church in the union shall be entitled to representa-

tion in the Association.

9. Every query presented by the church to the Association,

being first debated in their own church, shall come under the consideration of the Association.

10. Every motion made and seconded shall be considered by the Association except it be withdrawn by the party who made it.

11. We think it absolutely necessary that we have an association fund for defraying the expenses of the same for the raising of which we think it the duty of each church in the union to contribute such sums voluntarily as they think proper, and send by their delegases to the Association, and the amount so received shall be deposited with the treasurer, who shall beresponsible to the Association and pay same out as the Association may direct.

12. There shall be an Association Book kept in which the proceedings of every association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary.

13. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected if need be and signed by the Moderator and clerk of the Association.

14. Amendment to this plan of government may be made at any time by a majority of the union when it may so desire.

.15. The Asociation shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of the Asociation. The best method of effecting same shall be determined by the Association.

16. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of a majority of the members present except in receiving and dismissing churches and the associates, which shall be by unanimous vote.

17. The Association shall have power to decide for the general union of the churches and to preserve an inviolable chain of communion among same, giving the churches all necessary advice in matters of church difficulty; inquire into the cause why any church shall have failed to represent itself at any time in the Association; appropriate the money received to any purpose it may think proper; appoint any member, or members, by their consent, to transact any business which it may think necessary, withdraw from any church in the union which may violate any of the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion, admit any orderly minister of our faith and order to a set in the Association, and adjourn to any future time or place it may deem necessary.

RULES OF DECORUM

The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.

2 A moderator and clerk shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

3. Only one member shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat when about to speak.

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4. The person speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is done speaking.

5. He shall strictly adhere to his subject and in nowise reflect the preceding speaker, but shall define his ideas on the proposition for debate as far as he can.

6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Associa-

tion without leave of the same. 7. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any one subject without permisson of the Association.

8. No member of the Association shall have liberty to laugh during the sitting of same nor whisper in time of public speech.

9. No member shall address another by any other name or

term than that of "brother."

10. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit a member from speaking until he gives his views on the subject, unless he shall have violated the rules of decorum.

11. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the clerk and called over as the Association

12. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of may require. speech as another member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided. In that event he shall give the deciding vote.

13. Any member who shall willingly and knowlingly violate any of these rules shall be reprimanded by the Association as it

may think proper.
