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PROCEEDINGS

The Indian Bottom Association of Old Regular Baptist met with the Doty Creek Church of Jeremiah, Letcher County, Kentucky, September 6, 1940. After singing by the delegates and prayer by Elder C. C. Bates, the Association proceeded to organize.

- 1. The Moderator called on letter-bearers who turned in to the clerk the letters from the several churches, and the requests and querries were referred to the Committee on Arrangements.
- 2. The Association, then organized by electing Elder W. R. Boggs Moderator, Elder F. G. Fields Assistant Moderator and Elder Robert Combs Assistant Moderator. I. N. Lewis was retained as Clerk, and Henry Blair Assistant Clerk.

3. The Constitution, Rules of Decorum and Articles of

Faith were read and approved.

- 4. Called for newly constituted churches, and received letters from Little Zion Church, and Little Dove, Shoulder Blade, Mt. Zion, Little Jerusalem, and Napier Memorial Churches
- 5. Called for letters from sister Associations, and received one from Union and one from New Salem Association.
- 6. Called for transient ministers and members, and received Elder Cullen Hogg, James Caudill, Wm. B. Smith, David H. Standerford, Nelson Seals, F. F. Sumner, Billy Moore, G. B. Adams, McKinley Gillispie, Arlie Brown, G. C. Crase, Dewey Hampton, and Brothers Thomas Stout and H. B. Whitaker.

7. On motion, the Moderator was authorized to make

all temporary appointments during this Association.

8. Appointed a committee on Ministry consisting of one member from each church, together with all the delegates from this church, which consisted of the following: John Hampton, W. M. Alderage, W. M. Scott, James Whitaker, David Maggard, J. W. Pratt, D. B. Day, Harrison Williams, J. P. Mullins, W. C. Dixon, A. C. Craft, J. H. Brewer, Bob Blair, Ervin Cloud, H. D. Caudill, James Maggard, Cullen Sexton, W. B. Smith, A. Whitaker, Francis Owens, Emory Reedy, Alvie Caudill, John D. Dixon, Wes Caudill, Mose Adams, James Adams, N. T. Maggard, Enoch Blair,

and P. H. Whitaker.

9. On motion, I. N. Lewis and Henry Blair were appointed to write corresponding letters to sister Associations and report on tomorrow.

10. The Committee on Ministry reported for Saturday: 1st, Billy Moore; 2nd, McKinley Gillispie; 3rd, W. C. Dixon;

4th, Frank Napier; 5th, G. B. Adams.

11. Committee on Arrangements, same as Ministry.
12. On motion, the Association adjourned till Saturday at 9:00 o'clock.

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 7, 1940

Met pursuant to adjournment, after singing by the delegates and prayer by Elder James Caudill, the Association proceeded as follows:

1. Called the roll of delegates and marked the absentees.

2. Called for transient ministers.

3. On motion the ministers chosen for the stand were

excused for the day.

4. Appointed a committee on Finance, consisting of Brothers J. M. Blair, G. B. Ison, and G. C. Crase, who reported the sum of \$131.55, which amount was turned over to I. N. Lewis, Treasurer.

5. Appointed same committee on Ministry as of yesterday, who reported for Sunday as follows: 1st, Dan Gibson; 2nd, Wm. Scott, 3rd, George Hagans; 4th, Cullen Hogg.

6. The Treasurers report was read and approved.

(See page 128, of Record)

7. On motion the Association letters ordered to be written to sister Associations was read and approved by the Association, and delegates appointed as follows: To the Union Association, Elders George Hagans, Hays Shepherd, London Francis, and Henry Blair; To the New Salem Association, Elders Cullen Hogg, Joe Hagans, George Hagans, Henry Blair, Lewis Day and Robert Combs.

'8. On motion it was ordered that the Clerk have 2500 minutes printed and distributed after reserving 200 for sister Associations; apportioning the remainder among the several churches, the Clerk superintending the printing of the minutes to be allowed \$20.00 for his services.

9. Called on Brethren appointed to attend Union meeting and Associations to report. Those who failed were excused.

10. Union meetings were appointed with churches for

next year, as will appear elsewhere in the minutes under

that heading.

11. Called on Elder Henry Blair, appointed last year to write a circular letter, "Let Brotherly Love Continue", to report.

(To be printed; also letter written by W. R.

Boggs to be printed in the minutes.)

12. Called on Committee appointed to secure Association Records, to report, which was done.

13. On motion it was agreed that Elder W. C. Dixon write a Circular Letter, to be read at our next Association.

- 14. On motion it is agreed that our next Association be held with Sandlick Church, beginning on Friday before the first Saturday in September, 1941.
- 15. On motion the foregoing minutes were read and approved.
- 16. Then, on motion, this Association was closed, by prayer by Elder Robert Combs, then adjourned to the time and place of our next Association.

SUNDAY MORNING, SEPTEMBER 8, 1940

All Brethren appointed to preach on the stand were blessed to be present, and were blessed with a large audience of people, and considering the crowd, they were very orderly and attentive to hear the brethren preach the Gospel of the dear Son of God.

1st. The service was introduced by Elder Dan Gibson, and was followed by.

2nd. Wm. Scott, whose text was "Preach the Word".

3rd. Elder George Hagans, Text in Acts 13.

4th. Elder Cullen Hogg, Text Isaiah 62:2, "And the Gentiles shall see thy righteousness, and all kings thy glory".

The brethern who spoke on the stand were blessed with the spirit of the Lord, to deliver us sweet messages from above.

So, this ended the 45th session of The Indian Bottom Association of Old Regular Baptists, amid much rejoicing in the Lord.

CONSTITUTION

Having by unanimous voice changed our organization from an annual meeting to an Association, we therefore propose to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following form of government:

- 1. The Association shall be called The Indian Bottom Association.
- 2. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our union and duly sent to represent the Association, who shall be members whom they judge best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to a seat.
- 3. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their number in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, restoration, application dismissed excluded and deceased since our last association.
- 4. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord over God's heritage, nor shall they have any clerical power over the churches, nor shall they infringe on the rights of any of the churches in the union.
- 5. The Association, when convened, shall be goverened by a regular and proper decorum.
- 6. The Association shall have a moderator, clerk and treasurer, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- 7. New churches may be admitted into this union, which shall petition by letter and delegates, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association and manifested by the moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.
- 8. Every church in the union shall be entitled to representation in the Association.
- 9. Every query presented by the church to the Association, being first debated in their own church, shall come under the consideration of the Association.
- 10. Every motion made and seconded shall be considered by the Association except it be withdrawn by the party who made it.
- 11. We think it absolutely necessary that we have an association fund for defraying the expenses of the same for the raising of which we think it the duty of each church in the union to contribute such sums voluntarily as they think proper, and send by their delegates to the Association, and the amount so received shall be deposited with the treasurer, who shall be responsible to the Association and pay same out as the Association may direct.

12. There shall be an Association Book kept in which the proceedings of every association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary.

13. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected if need be and signed by the Moderator and clerk of the Association.

14. Amendment to this plan of government may be made at any time by a majority of the union when it may so desire.

15. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of the Association. The best method of effecting same shall be determined by the Association.

16. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of a majority of the members present except in receiving and dismissing churches and the associates, which shall be by unanimous vote.

17. The Association shall have power to decide for the general union of the churches and to preserve an inviolable chain of communion among same, giving the churches all necessary advice in matters of church difficulty; inquire into the cause why any church shall have failed to represent itself at any time in the Association; appropriate the money received to any purpose it may think proper; appoint any member, or members, by their consent, to transact any business which it may think necessary; withdraw from any church in the union which may violate any of the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion, admit any orderly minister of our faith and order to a set in the Association, and adjourn to any future time or place it may deem necessary.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed by prayer.
- 2. A moderator and clerk shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- 3. Only one member shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat when about to speak.
- 4. The person speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is done speaking.
- 5. He shall strictly adhere to his subject and in nowise reflect on the preceding speaker, but shall define his ideas on the proposition for debate as far as he can.
- 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the same.
- 7. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any one subject without permisson of the Association.

8. No member of the Association shall have liberty to laugh during the sitting of same nor whisper in time of public speech.

9. No member shall address another by any other name or term than that of "brother."

10. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit a member from speaking until he gives his views on the subject, unless he shall have violated the Rules of Decorum.

11. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the clerk and called over as often as the Association may require

12. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as another member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided. In that event he shall give the deciding vote.

13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reprimanded by the Association as it may thik proper.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in the one true and living God; and notwithstanding there are Three that bear record in Heaven, the Father, Son and Holy Ghost, yet there is but one in substance, equal in power and glory, not to be divided and impossible to change in principle or practice.

2. We believe that the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the true written words of God and were given by inspiration of God and there is a sufficiency in them contained for our instruction, and they are the only rule of our faith and practice.

3. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and that men

sinned since and are by nature the children of wrath.

4. We believe in the impotency or inability of man to recover themselves out of the state they are in; therefore, a Saviour is absolutely needed.

5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God

only by imputed righteousnes of Jesus Christ.

6. We believe in the perseverance of the Saints, that through grace they are born again and adopted into the family of heaven: that they become equal heirs with Jesus Christ in glory, and He will raise them up at the last day.

7. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are gospel ordinances; that true believers are the proper subjects, and we

admit of no others.

8. We believe that the true mode of baptism is by immersion,

to baptize a person by their own consent, back foremost in water, in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

9. We believe that washing of one another's feet is a commandment of Christ, left on record with His disciples, and ought to be practiced by his followers.

10. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgement when all will be judged according to their deeds done in the body.

11. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal after death.

12. We believe that no one has a right to administer the gospel ordinances but such as are legally called and qualified thereunto.

13. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to attend church meetings, and that it is the duty of the church to deal with them for neglecting the same.

14. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to contribute to the support of the church by defraying all reason able expenses of the same, never neglecting the poor, according to their several abilities.

15. We believe that any doctrine that goes to encourage or include the people in their sins or to cause them to settle down on anything short of saving grace in Christ for salvation is erroneous and church doctrine will be rejected by us.

16. None of the above articles shall be construed as to hold with particular election or reproduction so as to make God partial directly, so as to injure children of men.

17. No one of the above articles shall be altered without legal notice and free consent.

CIRCULAR LETTER

WRITTEN BY HENRY BLAIR

Dear Brethen and Sisters of the Indian Bottom Association of the Old Regular Baptist Faith and Order:

Having been called upon last year to write a circular

letter for your inspection:

I will now undertake to do so by the help of God. Knowing within myself I would be unable to write anything that would be worth your attention, hoping that God will direct my mind, and that I will be led by His holy spirit to instruct you on the scripture of love. The Scripture that arrested my mind will be found in Hebrews, 13-1. "Let brotherly love continue". This was the testimony of Paul to the Church; the people of God; those that have been born again; those that are born of God and have a part in the First Resurrection; those that have been partakers of Christ which is love, for we are told in the Scripture that God is born of love.

This love far exceeds death; it is a greater love than we have for our families here upon earth, or any possessions we may accumulate in this world. The love of God constrains his servants to forsake the things of nature, to go call poor sinners to the fold, and warn them of the danger of living and dying in sin. This love not only works with his called servants, but with all His children and causes them to be up and about their Father's business. This love never dies; it will carry the whole household of the children of God to that home which our Saviour said he would go and prepare for all that love and serve Him.

It was love that caused our Saviour to come down to this low ground of sorrow and suffering and died a shameful death on the tree of the cross for poor, fallen men and women. For the Lord tells us that greater love hath no man than this: that a man lay down his life for his friends.

It was love that Jesus had for the world of mortals that He came down and did a work that no other man ever did, that we may have free access to the tree of life, and marked out the way from earth to Heaven. It was love that he had for His children that He appointed unto them a kingdom here on earth that they may have a home to worship Him in and if they don't receive blessings in this visible kingdom, it is for their own disobedience and not God's. For He gave us the orders and precepts to keep, which govern this kingdom. It was love He had for this church the kingdom that He took up fellowship with His disciples that John the Baptist made ready for the sitting up of the kingdom. Now, He said, "Follow me". ("Well," says one, "where did He go?" or "what church did He go to?") He went to a man, sent from God, whose name was John. This was the same John that came preaching in the wilderness of Judea, who got his name from Heaven, especially (John) who was ramed by the angel. Jesus called him John the Baptist when He was questioned by the Pharisees. So I am sure that it was the Regular Baptist Church that Jesus was baptized into, and none other. Now, if Jesus had set up any other kingdom but this Baptist kingdom, undoubtedly He would have said "I will appoint unto you kingdoms" instead of a kingdom. Now then, if any wants to knoow this way, let them ask God, and not so much as some men do. The Bible teils us to search the Scriptures for in them ye think ye

have eternal life but these are they that testify of me, and when ye have searched then try them with an honest heart and what I have been telling you about will lead your mind in the right path and will bring you down to the feet of Jesus where you will receive that love in your souls. When that is done for us we are commanded to let brotherly love continue. I could give you many scriptures in connection to these given but it is making my letter too long.

There is one other thing I want to say and that is: May God in His tender mercies guide and direct our young brethen's minds to be more humble and respectful to our old fore-fathers in the Gospel, and to honor them as fathers instead of children; for that is commanded of the young brethen to honor old men as fathers, especially those that have borne the burden and heat of the day. They have been so faithful in holding up the blood-stained banner of King

Emmanuel for lo these many years.

So, Dear Brethren and Sisters in the Lord, let us be more prayerful that God in His wisdom might extend unto us His loving spirit that may over-shadow the things of nature and make us humble that we may live in peace and love.

That when the Forty-fifth Session of the old Indian Bottom Association has passed into history that the work done will be a light to the children of men when we have passed on to the great beyond.

So may God bless every brother and Sister that comprises the Indian Bottom Association to meet together with a prayerful heart and an humble mind is the prayer of your unworthy brother.
