PROCEEDINGS

Minutes of the Forty-Eighth Annual Session of the Indian Bottom Association of Old Regular Baptist of Jesus Christ in session assembled with the Powell Church, Waynesburg, Lincoln County, Kentucky, September 3-4-5, 1943; met and after singing by the delegates and prayer by Elder David Caudill, the Introductory Sermon was delivered by Elder Ray Whitaker from 2 Timothy, 4 chapter, 2 verse (Preach The Word) who filled the vacancy of Elder L. C. Riddle who was not present.

1. The Moderator then called the house to order and called for the letters from the several churches that composed the Indian Bottom Association which was handed in to the clerk and by move and second to receive the letters that was in regular form and seat the delegates as shown in the table of Statistics, and the requests and querries be refered

to the committee on arrangements.

2. By move and second the old officers were retained: Elder G. M. Caudill, Moderator, Elder Caleb Creech, Asst. Moderator, Elder Henry Blair, Clerk, Bro. Dawson Dixon, Asst. Clerk.

- 3. The constitution Rules of Decorum and Articles of Faith was omited to redeem time.
- 4. Called for newly constituted churches and received one by the name of Hoover Hill which upon examination found to be orthodox was received into the Indian Bottom Association letter in the hands of Bro. Hays Shepherd.
- 5. Called for letters from sister associations and received one from union association and a file of minutes by the hand of their delegates to-wit: Elders B. H. Baker, S. T. Wright, Nick Wright and Andy Bates.

Received minutes and delegates from the New Salem but no letter to-wit: Elders Aaron Pack, Monroe Moore, Troy Nicholes and Levi Page.

- 6. Called for transcient ministers and members and received Elder W. B. Mullins, Bros. Silas Caudill, Wilburn Caudill, and Lloyd Day.
- 7. On motion the moderator was authorized to make all temporary appointments during this sessions of the association.
- 8. Appointed a committee on Ministry consisting of one member from each church together with the entire delegates from the Powell Church consisting of the following to-wit: J. M. Blair, Jeff Whitaker, Coleman Winstead, Francis Owens, Riley Fouts, Dixie Ison, Henry Caudill, Willie Fields, D. D. Halcomb, John Hampton, Arthur Dixon, Hiram Campbell,

Bob Blair, Charles Bauldredge, James Whitaker, Noah Eldredge, J. P. Mullins, Ester Cornett, Ira McKnight, Willie Walters, James Caudill, John Madden, Nathan Young, N. M. Elderedge, Newton Cornett, A. C. Craft, J. H. Brewer, C. C. Bates, David R. Caudill, Perry Tackett, Willie Mullins and A. C. Caudill.

- 9. Appointed same committee on arrangements as on ministry except one delegate from Powell church.
- 10. On Motion Elder Henry Blair and Bro. Dawson Dixon was appointed to write the corresponding letters to our sister Association to-wit: New Salem and Union.

11. Called on committee on ministry to report who re-

ported to be on the stand Saturday.

1. L. D. Francis, 2. Aaron Pack, 3. B. H. Baker 12. On motion and second the association adjourn until

9 o'clock Saturday.

13. Then the moderator called the committee on arrangements together for the purpose of taking up the question of Secret Orders which was brought up from the Indian Bottom church, which was discussed before the Committee.

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 4, 1943

Met pursuant to adjournment and after singing and prayer by Elder Caleb Creech the Association proceeded as follows:

1. Called the roll and marked the absentees.

2. Called for transcient Ministers and members and received none.

- On motion the ministers chosen on the stand was excused.
- 4. Called on committee on arrangements to report which reports reads as follows to-wit: We the committee do agree and advise all churches of the Indian Bottom Association to comply with order heretofore made in regard to Secret Order. James Whitaker one of the committees.
- 5. Appointed a committee on finance consisting of Bro. David R. Caudill, James Whitaker and Riley Fouts, who reported the sum of \$136.91 which they received from the several churches and by move and second Elder Henry Blair was appointed Secretary and Treasurer and to superintend the printing of the minutes and that he have 3,000 copies printed and to reserve 250 for each sister association.

Appointed same committee on ministry as of yesterday to report who should be on the stand for Sunday.

1. Caleb Creech, 2. Tip Cornett, 3. Cullen Hogg, 4. G. M. Caudill.

7. Letters to sister association was read and received and delegates appointed to-wit: New Salem, to-wit Elders James Caudill, G. M. Caudill, Geo. Hagans, Henry Blair, L. D. Francis, Joe Hagans, Caleb Creech, Bros. Willie Fields, Dewey Fields.

To Union, Caleb Creech, Cullen Hogg, G. B. Ison, Tip Cornett, Geo. Hagans, L. D. Francis, G. M. Caudill, Henry Blair, Bros. Nich Everidge, Hiram Amburgey.

- 8. Called on Brethern who was appointed to attend union meeting and associations to report who reported and those who failed to attend was excused but advised to be more cautious next time.

On motion, Elder Geo. Hagans was appointed to preach the Introductory Sermon and Elder G. B. Ison be his alternate.

15. On motion the association was closed by prayer by Elder Henry Blair, then the association was adjourned to the time and place of our next association. Done an dsigned by order of the Association.

2. Elder Tip Cornett, Text 2 Timothy, 4 chapter and 2 verse (Preach the word; Be instant in season out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all long suffering and doctrine).

3. Elder Cullen Hogg, Text, Genesis 24 chapter and 27 And he said blessed be the Lord God of my master Abraham who hath not left destitute my master of his mercy and his truth: I being in the way, the Lord led me to the house of my Master's brother.

Elder G. M. Caudill, Text, Psalms 9, chapter, 17 verse (The wicked shall be turned into hell and all nations,

that forget God.

CIRCULAR LETTER

Dear Brethern and Sisters Who Compose The Indian Bottom Association:

I was chosen at your last Association to write a "circular" letter" to be read for approval or rejection by the delegates of our next Association, which will be held with the Powell Church, Lincoln County, Kentucky. Dear Brothers and Sisters; I feel very unworthy in the great task which you have asked me to do and I am sure I will be unable to write a letter that will be profitable to the great cause of Christ and his Kingdom without the Spirit of God, and after praying over this matter and thinking what subject I could write on, I feel led to write on this subject. "Shepherds Feed The Flocks."

Dear Brethern, you will find my Text in 34 chapter of Ezekel, and a part of the 2nd Verse; Thus sayeth the Lord God unto the Shepherds woe be to the Shepherd of the Sheep and who is the Shepherd of the goat family. That is one of the great problems of today among so called Christians. Christ. said "My sheep hear my voice and they do follow me and a stranger they will not follow. Dear Brethern, the time has come for us to decide between sheep and goats and between shepherds and goats. You will find in the 34th chapter of Ezekel what the goat shepherds done for the sheep, they are the fat and clothed themselves with the wool but they feed not the sheep. They have scattered the sheep and caused them to wander through the mountains and on high hills. They have scattered the sheep upon all the face of the earth; therefore, O, ye shepherds of the Lord hear the word of the Lord God; Brethern we have saw the sheep scattered abroad by the wrong shepherds, and I must say by the Word of God that a shepherd must be a man sent from God before he can feed the sheep. Many have run in the name of shepherds but they scattered the sheep and God has said in His word, I will feed them with Judgment, and as for you O my Flock I will judge between cattle and cattle and rams and the goats. Just as sure as there is a sheep family there is a goat family, and God has said in His word "Ye have thrust with your side and your shoulders and have pushed all the disease with your horns. Dear Brethern, I am proud of you brethern whom God has made shepherds over the flock. You can feed the sheep when God blesses you to preach the Gospel, but the goat family can't eat that kind of food, they claim to be sheep but they can't eat sheep food, they claim they are going to Heaven, how can a man see the Kingdom of Heaven except he is converted and born again, Christ said "I am the door and by me if any man enter in he shall be saved and all that climb up some other way the same is as a thiet and robber, and Imust say by the word of God, no thieves and robbers will enter the Kingdom of Heaven, but they will have their part in the lake that burneth with fire and brimstone except they repent, and I feel like Dear Brethern, the time has come when we should not shun to declare the whole Council of God, the enemy hates the truth and will rebuke it because he loves darkness rather than the light. He will not come to the light because his deeds are evil. Dear Brethern and Friends, who may read my letter if you are unsaved, I want you to repent and make Heaven

your home, you can't get to Heaven any other way. You may be a member of some church and yet be unsaved, you must be born again. You can get in the church without being born again, I don't want to judge any one, the Bible says by their fruits ye shall know them. There are just two classes of people, saved and unsaved and two places to go, Heaven or Hell, and two places for the people here on earth, in the Church of Kingdom or in the World, and Dear Friends, if you are still in the World you need to be killed dead to the world and made alive in Christ Jesus, then you will not be ashamed of the true church and the shepherds of the Lord. Dear Brethern; 1 must close my letter by saying to you Shepherds, be on the watch for the sheep and keep the gaps laid up for the enemy is always looking for gaps so as to get among the sheep, and I have given you a few proof along what the goat family will do. We have always had them and they will be here when Christ comes back again, but thanks be to God they can't cater the sheep, they can only scatter them, but when they hear he voice of the Lord they will all come home. Dear Brethern, I hope we can all meet at the Association with hearts full of love and I hope the Lord will bless us with a great Service. We as preachers should not shun to declare the whole Council, and I think we have the greatest Kingdom to live in that however been given to the children of God, and Dear Brethern, if I never meet you again here on earth I hope to meet you in heaven where we will surround the throne of God and walk the streets of Gold and praise the Lord forever more, and may God bless all the Brothers and Sisters of this great family and Association till we meet again.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in the one true and living God, and notwithstanding there are Three that bear record in Heaven, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, yet there is but one in substance, equal in power and glory, not to be divided and impossible to change in principle or practice.

2. We believe the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the true written Words of God and were given by inspiration of God and there is a sufficiency in them contained for our

instruction and they are the only faith and practice.

3. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and that men sinned since the fall and are by nature the children of wrath.

4. We believe in the impotency of inability of man

recover themselves out of the state they are in; therefore, a Saviour is absolutely needed.

5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of

God only by imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

6. We believe in the preservance of the Saints that through grace they are born again and adopted into the family of Heaven; that they become equal heirs with Jesus Christ in glory, and that He will raise them up at the last day.

7. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Gospel Ordinances; that true believers are the proper sub-

jects and we admit no others.

- 8. We believe that the true mode of baptism is by immersion, to baptize a person by their own consent, back foremost in water in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy
- 9. We believe that washing of one another's feet is a commandment of Christ, left on record with His disciples, and ought to be practiced by his followers.

10.We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general Judgment when all will be judged according to their

deeds done in the body.

- 11. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal after death.
- 12. We believe that no one has a right to administer the gospel ordinances but such as are legally called and qualified there unto.

13. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to attend church meetings ,and that it is the duty of the church

to deal with them for neglecting the same.

14. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to contribute to the support of the church by defraying all reasonable expenses of same, never neglecting the poor, according to their several abilities.

15. We believe that any doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge the people in their sins or to cause them to settle down on anything short of saving grace in Christ for salvation is

erroneous and such doctrine will be rejected by us.

16. None of the above articles shall be construed as to hold with particular election or reprobation as to make God partial directly or indirectly so as to injure children of men.

17. No one of the above articles shall be altered without legal notice and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Association shall be opened and closed with pray-

2. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

3.Only one member shall speak at a time, and shall rise

from his seat when about to speak.

4. The person speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is done

5. He shall strictly adhere to his spbject and in nowise reflect on the preceding speaker, but shall define his ideas on the proposition for debate as far as he can.

6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the As-

sociation without leave of same.

7. No person shall rise and speak more than three times

on any subject without permission of the Association.

8. No member of the Association shall have liberty to laugh during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time o. public speech.

9.No member shall address another by any other name

or term than that of "Brother".

10. The names of the several members shall be enrolled by the clerk and called over as the Association may require

11. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit a member from speaking until he gives his views on the subject, unless he shall have violated the Rules of Decorum.

12. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as another member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided. In that event he shall give the casting vote.

13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reprimanded by the Associa-

tion as it may think proper.

CONSTITUTION

Having by unanimous voice changed our organization from an Annual Union Meeting to an Association, we therefore propose to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following form of government:

1. The Association shall be called the Indian Bottom

Association.

2. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who shall be members whom they judge best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to a seat.

- 3. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their full number in fellowship those baptized, received by letter, restoration, application dismissed, excluded and deceased since our last Association.
- 4. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical powers over the churches nor shall they infringe on any of the rights of any of the churches in the union.

5. The Association, when convened, shall be governed by

a regular and proper decorum.

- 6. The Association shall have a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- 7. New churches may be admitted into the Union which shall petition by letter and delegates and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association and manifested by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.
- 8. Every church in the Union shall be entitled to representation in the Assosiation.
- 9. Every querry presented by the church to the Association, being first debated in their own churches shall come under the consideration of the Association.

10. Every motion made and seconded shall be considered by the Association except it be withdrawn by the party

who made it.

11. We think it absolutely necessary that we have an Association fund for defraying the expenses of the same for the raising of which we think it the duty of each church in the Union to contribute such sums voluntarily as they think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association, and the amount so received shall be deposited with the Treasurer, who shall be responsible to the Association and pay same out as the Association may direct.

12. There shall be an Association Book kept in which the proceedings of every Association shall be regularly re-

corded by the Secretary.

13. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected if need be and signed by the Moderator and clerk before the Association arises.

14. Amendment to this plan of government may be made at any time by a majority of the Union when they so desire.

15. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of the Association. The best method of effecting same shall be determined by the Association.

decided by will of the majority of the members present except in receiving and dismissing churches and Associations,

which shall be by unanimous vote.

17. The Association shall have power to decide for the General Union of the churches and to preserve an inviolable chain of communion among same, giving churches all necessary advice in matters of church difficulty; inquire into the cause why any church shall have failed to represent itself at any time in the Association; appropriate the money received to any purpose it may think proper; appoint any member, or members, by their consent, to transact any business which it may think necessary; withdraw from any church in the Union which may violate any of the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion, admit any orderly minister of our faith and order to a seat in the Association, and to adjourn to any time or place it may deem necessary.
