PROCEEDINGS

The Indian Bottom Association of Old Regular Baptists of Jesus Christ assembled with the Little Zion Church, Jeff, Perry County, Kentucky, Friday, Aug. 31, 1945. Met under a large Elm tree near the Church house.

After singing by the congregation and prayer by Elder Sam Combs, the introductory sermon was preached by Elder Caleb Creech from Hebrews 13:1. Let brotherly love continue. Then the delegates returned to the Church house. After some brief remarks by Elder E. V. Hopkins, singing by the delegates and prayer by Elder F. A. Hopkins, proceeded to business as follows:

1. The house was called to order by the Moderator, who then called for the letters from the several churches that compose the Indian Bottom Association.

The Clerk, (Elder H. D. Caudill) was not present, as it was necessary that he be in the hospital with his son, who was seriously injured in an accident in the mines. So the letters were handed in to the Assistant Clerk (Brother Dawson Dixon). By move and second one letter was read by the As_ sistant Clerk, then all were received and delegates seated as shown in the table of statistics.

- 2. The Association then organized by electing Elder G. M. Caudill, Moderator; Elder Caleb Creech, Assistant Moderator; Brother Dawson Dixon, Clerk; and Elder Kirby Ison, Assistant Clerk.
- 3. On motion, the reading of our Articles of Faith, Rules of Decorum and Constitution was omitted.
- 4. Called for newly constituted churches and received
- 5. Called for letters from sister associations and received one from the Union Association by the hands of her delegates to wit: T. G. Bates, B. H. Baker, John Hess, Harrison Stanley, Ted Swindall, W. S. Akers, Alex Rakes, Willie Bates and W. F. Hubbard. Also one from New Salem Association by the hands of her delegates to wit: Jerry Hall, F. A. Hopkins, M. C. Wright, E. V. Hopkins, Billy Moore, Alex Coburn, J. B. Hamilton, Sam Justice, Jarvey Vance, A. J. Tackett and Felix Scott, with file of minutes from each association.

6. Called for transient ministers and members and receiv_ ed Elders Charlie Cornett, F. F. Sumner, Wm. B. Smith, Bros. Noah Couch, Shilo Combs, George Gibson, W. D. Bryan and G. C. Crase.

7. On motion the moderator was authorized to make all

temporary appointments during this session of the association. 8. Appointed a committee on ministry consisting of one delegate from each Church together with the entire delegation from the Little Zion Church to wit: Henry Blair, Manis Ison, Dan Day, Francis Owen, Riley Fouts, J. W. Pratt, Silas Caudill, Willie Fields, Troy Shepherd, A. C. Craft, John Back, V. T. Caudill, Squire Watts, L. D. Francis, Charles Baldridge, Willie Mullins, James Whitaker, James Fields, Milton Napier, Grover Patrick, Charlie Gibson, Troy Engle, Nathaniel Young, Hiram Amburgey, Millard Seals, Cleveland Fields, James Caudill, Baxter Bolling, Boyd Cornett, Sam Combs, Mason Whitaker.

9. Appointed same committee on arrangements as on min_ istry except just one delegate from the Little Zion Church.

10. On motion Bro. Dawson Dixon and Elder Kirby Ison were chosen to write corresponding letters to our sister associations, The Union and New Salem.

1. Called on the committee on Ministry to report who reported the following ministers to be on the stand Saturday:

1. W. F. Hubbard; 2. E. V. Hopkins; 3. Jerry Hall; 4. F. A. Hopkins.

12. On motion the association adjourned until 9 o'clock Saturday morning.

Saturday Morning, September 1, 1945

Met pursuant to adjournment, after singing by the congregation and prayer by Elder Dan Gibson the association proceeded as follows:

1. Called the roll and marked the absentees.

2. Called for transient ministers and members but received none.

3. Ministers chosen to be on the stand were excused.

4. Called the committee on arrangements which by motion

was discharged.

5. Appointed a committee on finance consisting of Brothers Mason Whitaker, James Whitaker and Elder Sam Combs who reported the sum of \$183.80, contributed by the several churches. The former clerk, Eld. H. D. Caudill, turned in to the association a balance of \$22.74 making a total of \$206.54. By move and second Brother Dawson Dixon was appointed treasurer and authorized to superintend the printing of 3000 minutes and reserve 200 copies for each of our corresponding associations; the Union and New Salem. By move and second the Association authorized that the clerk receive a fee of \$35.00 for his service.

6. Appointed same committee on Ministry as of yesterday whose report was as follows: 1. Dewey Sexton; 2. Cullen Hogg; 3. Ballard Baker; 4. G. M. Caudill.

7. Letters to the sister associations were read, received and

delegates appointed to attend as follows:

To the Union, Elders Kirby Ison, Caleb Creech, L. D. Francis, F. F. Sumner, Dixie Ison and George Hagans. To the New Salem: Elders Nelson Seals, Kirby Ison, Caleb Creech, G. M. Caudill, Alva Caudill, Cullen Hogg, Dan Gibson and Howard Caudill.

- 8. Called on brethren who were to attend Union meetings to report. They reported and those who failed to attend were excused.
- 9. Called on Treasurer to report, whose report was as follows:

10. Appointed Union Meetings as shown under that head_

ing.

11. Called on Elders L. D. Francis who was appointed last year to write a circular letter; to report. He reported and the letter was read and received by the Association to be printed in our minutes.

12. On motion Elder C. C. Bates was appointed to write a

Circular letter for the 1946 session of this association.

13. On motion it was agreed that our next association will be held with the Big Cowan Church, Day, Letcher County, Kentucky. To commence on Friday, before the first Saturday in September, 1946 and continue the two following days.

14. On motion Elder D. R. Caudill was appointed to preach the introductory sermon and Elder Riley Fouts to be his al-

ternate.

15. On motion the association was closed by prayer by Elder George Hagans and adjourned to the time and place of our next association.

3. Elder G. M. Caudill, text: St. John 14:1. Let not your

hearts be troubled, etc.

The brethren on the stand were well pleased to preach the gospel of God's Kingdom. We feel that God's little children feasted on the holy manna that comes down out of heaven And poor sinners were informed of their lost condition. This association wishes to express our heartfelt thanks to the good people of Jeff and the surrounding community for the hospitality which was shown us during this session of our association. We feel sure they will receive two-fold blessings for their loving kindness and painstaking care for us.

So let us pray that peace and love may continue with us and that God's holy spirit will guide us into the paths of

CIRCULAR LETTER

It is with much weakness and unworthy feelings I will attempt to write a circular letter for the Association to consider whether it should be published in our 1945 Association Minutes or not.

First I shall say that Christ said to His Disciples: Greater love hath no man than this, than a man lay down his life for his friends. He says ye are my friends, if ye do whatsoever I command you. Again Christ says: If ye keep my commandments, ye shall abide in my love, even as I have kept my Father's Commandments and abided in his love. And he said, This is my Commandment that ye love one another as I have loved you. Again in His address to them He said: Little children love one another for by this shall all men know that ye are my Disciples, if ye have love one for another. Love is the greatest thing to rule in any association church or home.

Fathers and mothers love their children. But God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son into the world that whosoever believeth on him should not perish; But should have everlasting life. Brethren I see the like of love being manifested toward one another as it ought to be giving space for strife and mallice to creep in. Dear beloved brethren if we were all sinners and God manifested His love toward us by sending His only begotten Son that through him we might have life; then we should love one another not in word but in deed. Perfect love casts out all fear. The Apostle John says: He that loveth his brother, abideth in the light and there is none occasion of stumbling in him. But he that hateth his brother is in darkness and walketh in darkness and knoweth not whether he goeth because that darkness hath blinded his eyes. The last chapter of Paul's letter to the Hebrews, Verse 1, says: Let brotherly love continue. Verse 2 says: Be not forgetful to entertain strangers for thereby some have entertained angels unawares. May the love of God reign in our hearts to be more loving and kind toward each other than ever before; and not to forget to entertain our strange brethrens according to the flesh but being not strangers in spirit.

All being born of love, for God is love. Begotten of our father God and born of our spiritual mother Jerusalem above bringing us into one spiritual family of God. So let's work

and live together in love and in peace.

May the love of God rule or reign in the old Indian Bottom Association together with our sisters, the New Salem and the Union Associations. May God's blessings rest upon your lots now and forever.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in the one true and living God, and notwithstanding there are Three that bear record in Heaven, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, yet there is but one in substance, equal in power and glory, not to be divided and impossible to change in principle or practice.

2. We believe the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the true written Words of God and were given by inspiration of God and there is a sufficiency in them contained for our

instruction and they are the only faith and practice.

3. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and that men sinned since the fall and are by nature the children of wrath.

4. We believe in the impotency of inability of man to recover themselves out of the state they are in; therefore, a Saviour is absolutely needed.

5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of

God only by imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

6. We believe in the perseverance of the Saints that through grace they are born again and adopted into the family of Heaven; that they become equal heirs with Jesus Christ in glory, and that He will raise them up at the last day.

7. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Gospel Ordinances; that true believers are the proper sub-

jects and we admit no others.

8. We believe that the true mode of baptism is by immersion, to baptize a person by their own consent, back foremost

in water in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

9. We believe that washing of one another's feet is a commandment of Christ, left on record with His disciples, and ought to be practiced by His followers.

10. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general Judgment when all will be judged according to their

deeds done in the body.

- 11. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal after death.
- 12. We believe that no one has a right to administer the gospel ordinances but such as are legally called and qualified there unto.
- 13. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to attend church meetings, and that it is the duty of the church to deal with them for neglecting the same.
- 14. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to contribute to the support of the church by defraying all reasonable expenses of same, never neglecting the poor, according to their several abilities.
- 15. We believe that any doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge the people in their sins or to cause them to settle down on anything short of saving grace in Christ for salvation is erroneous and such doctrine will be rejected by us.

16. None of the above articles shall be construed as to hold with particular election or reprobation as to make God partial directly or indirectly so as to injure children of men.

17. No one of the above articles shall be altered without legal notice and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

3. Only one member shall speak at a time, and shall rise

from his seat when about to speak.

- 4. The person speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is done speaking.
- 5. He shall strictly adhere to his subject and in nowise reflect on the preceding speaker, but shall define his ideas on the proposition for debate a sfar as he can.

6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the As-

sociation without leave of same.

7. No person shall rise and speak more than three times

on any subject without permission of the Association.

8. No member of the Association shall have liberty to laugh during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time of public speech.

9. No member shall address another by any other name or term than that of "Brother".

10. The names of the several members shall be enrolled by the clerk and called over as the Association may require.

11. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit a member from speaking until he gives his views on the subject, unless he shall have violated the Rules of Decorum.

12. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as another member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided. In that event he shall give the casting vote.

13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reprimanded by the Associa-

tion as it may think proper.

CONSTITUTION

Having by unanimous voice changed our organization from an Annual Union Meeting to an Association, we there_ fore propose to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following form of government:

1. The Association shall be called the Indian Bottom Association.

2. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who shall be members whom they judge best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters fro mtheir churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to a seat.

3. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their full number in fellowship those baptized, received by letter, restoration, application dismissed, ex-

cluded and deceased since our last Association.

4. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical powers over the churches nor shall they infringe on any of the rights of any of the churches in the union.

5. The Association, when convened, shall be governed by

a regular and proper decorum.

6. The Association shall have a Moderator, Clerk and

Treasurer who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the mem-

bers present.

7. New churches may be admitted into the Union which shall petition by letter and delegates and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association and manifested by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

8. Every church in the Union shall be entitled to repre-

sentation in the Association.

9. Every querry presented by the church to the Association, being first debated in their own churches shall come under the consideration of the Association.

- 10. Every motion made and seconded shall be considered by the Association except it be withdrawn by the party who made it.
- 11. We think it absolutely necessary hat we have an Association fund for defraying the expenses of the same for the raising of which we think it the duty of each church in the Union to contribute such sums voluntarily as they think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association, and the amount so received shall be deposited with the Treasurer, who shall be responsible to the Association and pay same out as the Association may direct.

12. There shall be an Association Book kept in which the proceedings of every Association shall be regularly re-

corded by the Secretary.

13. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected if need be and signed by the Moderator and clerk before the Association arises.

14. Amendment to this plan of government may be made at any time by a majority of the Union when they so desire.

15. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of the Association. The best method of effecting same shall be determined by the Association.

16. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of the majority of the members present except in receiving and dismissing churches and Associations.

which shall be by unanimous vote.

17. The Association shall have power to decide for the General Union of the churches and to preserve an inviolable chain of communion among same, giving churches all necessary advice in matters of church difficulty; inquire into the cause why any church shall have failed to represent itself at any time in the Association; appropriate the money received to any purpose it may think proper; appoint any member, or members, by their consent, to transact any business which it

may think necessary; withdraw from any church in the Union which may violate any of the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion, admit any orderly minister of our faith and order to a seat in the Association, and to adjourn to any time or place it may deem necessary.
