PROCEEDINGS

Proceedings of the fifty-third annual session of the Indian Bottom Association of Old Regular Baptists of Jesus Christ in session assembled with the Mallet Fork Church, May, Knott County, Kentucky, Sept. 3, 4, and 5, 1948.

Met in the church house and after singing by the congregation and prayer by Elder W. C. Hogg, the introductory sermon was preached by Elder Henry Blair whose text was Heb. 13th Chapter, 1st verse, "Let brotherly love continue."

The delegates then retired to a school house some little distance away and after singing by the delegates and prayer by Elder Alex Coburn; proceeded to business as follows:

- 1. As our moderator, Elder F. G. Fields, was very ill and not able to be present: The house was called to order by the Assistant Moderator, Elder Caleb Creech, who then called for the letters from the several churches that compose the Indian Bottom Association, which were handed in to the Clerk. All letters were received and delegates seated except the one from the Little Dove Church which together with all queries and requests was referred to the committee on arrangements.
- 2. The Association then organized by choosing Elder Caleb Creech, Moderator; Elder Riley Fouts, Assistant Moderator; Brother Dawson Dixon, Clerk; and Elder Kirby Ison, Assistant Clerk.
- 3. Called for newly constituted churches and received none.
- 4. By move and second, the reading of the Constitution, Rules of Decorum and Articles of Faith was omitted.
- 5. Called for letters from corresponding sister associations and received as follows:

Union; — no letter but one delegate to wit: Elder A. D. Turner who stated that a letter had been prepared but had got misplaced.

New Sales — by the hands of Elders F. A. Hopkins, E. V. Hopkins, Troy Nickles, Willie Collins, McKinley Moore, R. E. Holbrock, E. D. Moore, Burton Damron, J. M. Stumbo, Jim Sanders, Baxter Osborne, Alex Coburn, and J. B. Hamilton; and Brethren Ballard Hopkins, Andy Tackett and Ode Kiser.

Thornton Union — by the hands of Elders T. R. Collier, Denver Tolliver and D. N. Asher, and Brethren J. Mart Potter and Noah Couch.

Philadelphia — by the hands of Elder Ealis Cotton and

Brethren Fred Akers, Joe Coldgrove and J. M. Rose.

Said letters were received and the right hand of fellowship were extended to the delegates and they were seated with us.

6. Called for transient ministers and members of our same faith and order and received as follows: Elder Howard Caudill and Brother Willie Bates.

7. On motion the Moderator was authorized to make all temporary appointments during this session of the association.

- 8. Appointed a committee on ministry consisting of one delegate from each church with all the delegates from Mallet Fork Church as follows: Henry Blair, W. C. Hogg, Frank Fugate, J. W. Pratt, G. M. Caudill, Willie Fields, Willie Madden, A. C. Craft, Oscar Back, V. T. Caudill, George Hagans, Dan Gibson, A. L. Eldridge, J. D. Fields, Dan Noble, George Atkins, H. L. Raleigh, Nathaniel Young, Hiram Amburgey, Morrell Slone, Cleveland Fields, Carson Cornett and Lawrence
- 9. Appointed same committee on arrangements as on ministry except just one delegate from the Mallet Fork Church, together with the Moderator and Clerk, also correspending Brethren from Sister Associations and transients in-
- 10. On motion brother Dawson Dixon and Elder Kirby Ison, were appointed to write corresponding letters to our sister associations; The Union, New Salem, Thornton Union, and Philadelphia.
- 11. Called on the committee on ministry to report who reported the following ministers to preach; Friday evening 1. Caleb Creech, 2. M. C. Wright, 3. A. D. Turner, 4, T. R. Collier, Saturday; 1. Alex Coburn, 2. Ealis Cotton, 3. Willie Madden, 4. F. A. Hopkins, 5. E. V. Hopkins.

12. On motion the Association adjourned till 8:00 o'clock

Saturday morning.

Saturday Morning Sept. 4, 1948

Met pursuant to adjournment and after singing by the delegates, some touching remarks by Elder Thomas Mosley and prayer by Elder Willie Collins, proceeded as follows:

Called the roll and marked the absentees.

- 2. Called for transient ministers and members and received none.
- 3. Ministers to preach on the stand for the day, were excused.
 - 4. Called on the committee on arrangements to report

whose report was as follows:

1st., We recommend that the Association adopt the resolution from the James Memorial church, which is as follows:

Resolved: That the officers of our Association; Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk, be eelcted without nomination. That is the delegates shall vote for the man whom they deem best qualified to serve them. Said vote to be taken secretely by roll call of the several churches. Each delegate shall have the privilege to vote for a moderator, assistant Moderator, Clerk, and assistant clerk, all at the same time in order to redeem time.

Furthermore resolved; that any question coming before the Association requiring a vie; that said vote shall be taken secretly by roll call of the several churches. 2nd In regard to the Little Dove church having failed to obey the previous order of this association in regard to double married ordained ministers; we wish to recommend that they be held in disorder until they obey the orders of this Association. We further recommend that this Association hold all official work done since the 1947 session of this Association, by W. T. Francis, be held in disorder and that all illegal work done by other churches by W. T. Francis be ratified and the work done orderly.

3rd In answer to the request from the Thornton Union Association in regard to a Regular Baptist Orphanage we recommend that this Association endorse the resolution passed by the council of Regular Baptist Churches of America while in session at the Little Samuel Memorial Church on Saturday July 31, 1948. And that we ask the several churches of this Association to endorse this movement and thee who wish to contribute to this cause to place their contributions in the hands of their regular church treasure who will in turn forward same to the authorized treasurer of this grand and noble organization.

The above report was accepted and approved by the Association to become a part of our records. Then by move and second the committee was discharged.

5. Appointed a committee on Finance consisting of Brothers G. M. Caudill, Henry Blair and Manis Ison who reported the sum of \$226.00 contributed by the several churches.

By move and second Brother Dawson Dixon was appointed treasurer and authorized to superintend the printing of 3000 Minutes and reserve 50 copies for each of our corresponding Sister Associations, and distribute the remainder among

the several churches according to their contributions and that

he receive a fee of \$35.00 for his services.

6. Appointed same committee on Ministry as of yesterday who reported the following ministers to preach Saturday night. 1. Dixie Ison, 2, Troy Nickles, 3, Thomas Mosley, 4. Willie Collins, 5. S. T. Wright. Sunday 1, Willie Collins, 2. W. C. Hogg, 3. Riley Fouts, 4. Caleb Creech.

15. On motion the Association was closed by prayer by Elder G. M. Caudill and adjourned to the time and place of our next Association.

Sunday Morning, Sept. 5, 1948

Rachel E., the daughter of the late Levi and Easter Caudill Eidridge, born October 15, 1854 three and one half miles east of Blackey, on Rockhouse Creek.

On March 20, 1947 at 1:00 A. M., she went to her reward. The last one of her family of four brothers and eight sisters, age ninety-two years five months and five days.

She defied the span of life decreeded in his prayer of David, when he said in 90th Psalm that the days of our years are three score years and ten. She has even gone farther and exceeded the next limit, set out in this prayer that says, "And if by reason of strength they be four score years, yet is their strength, labor and sorrow." She knew the meaning of labor and sorrow, but never complained.

This Chrisitan pioneer of the mountains, had graduated from the school of hard knocks and received her diploma from the college of experience, many years ago. During her more than four scre years in dealing with neighbors, she leaves behind her no enemies. This is a record seldom equaled if ever.

These relatives and a great host of friends can hardly overcome the shock of realizing the stillness of this body, that has been among them so long.

Though we have no doubt about the resting place of this soul, it will be found resting upon the right hand of God injudgment, when books of the recording angel are opened, there will be no difficulty in making a decision.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in the one true and living God, and notwithstanding there are Three that bear record in Heaven, the Father, the S on and the Holy Ghost, yet there is but one in substance, equal in power and glory, not to be divided and impossible to change in principle or practice.

2. We believe the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the true written Words of God and were given by inspiration of God and there is a sufficiency in them contained for our

instruction and they are the only faith and practice

3. We believe in the doctorine of original sin and that men sinned since the fall and are by nature the children of

4. We believe in the impotency of inability of man to recover themselves out of the state they are in; therefore a Saviour is absolutely needed.

5. W believe that sinners are justified in the sight of

God only by imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

6. We believe in the preservance of the Saints that through grace they are born again and adopted into the family of Heaven; that they become equal heirs with Jesus Christ in glory, and that He will raise them up at the last

7. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Gospel Ordinances; that true believers are the proper subjects and we admit no others.

8. We believe that the true mode of baptism is by immersion, to baptize a person by their own consent, back foremost in water in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy

9. We believe that washing of one another's feet is a commandment of Christ, left on record with His disciples, and ought to be practiced by His followers.

10. We believe in the ressurrection of the dead and general Judgment when all will be judged according to their

deeds done in the body.

11. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal after death.

12. We believe that no one has a right to administer the gospel ordinances but such as are legally called and quali-

fied there unto.

13. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to attend church meetings, and that it is the duty of the church

to deal with them for neglecting the same.

14. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to contribute to the support of the church by defraying all reasonable expenses of same, never neglecting the poor, according to their several abilities.

15. We beieve that any doctorine that goes to encourage or indulge the people in their sins or to cause them to settle down on anything short of saving grace in Christ for salvation is erroneous and such doctorines will be rejected by us.

16. None of the above articles shall be construed as to hold with particular election or reprobation as to make God partial directly or indirectly so as to injure children of men.

17. None one of the above articles shall be altered with-

out Igeal notice and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- 3. Only one member shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator when about to speak.
- 4. The person speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is done speaking.
- 5. He shall strictly adhere to his subject and in nowise reflect on the proceeding speaker, but shall define his ideas on the proposition for debate as far as he can.
- 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of same.
- 7. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any subject without permission of the Association.
- 8. No member of the Association shall have liberty to laugh during the sitting of the same nor whisper in time of

public speech.

9. No member shall address another by any other name or term than that of "Brother."

10. The names of the several members shall be enrolled by the clerk and called over as the Association may require.

11. The Moderator shall not interrupt or prohibit a member from speaking until he gives his views on the subject, unless he shall have violated the Rules of Decorum-

12. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speech as another member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided. In that event he shall give the casting vote.

13. Any member who shall willingly and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reprimanded by the Associa-

tion as it may think proper.

CONSTITUTION

Having by unanimous voice changed our organization from an Annual Union Meeting to an Association, we therefore propse to keep the order and rules of an Association according to the following form of government:

1. The Association shall be called the Indian Bottom

Association.

2. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our Union and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who shall be members whom they judge best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their churches certifying their appointment, shall be entitled to a seat.

3. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their full number in fellowship those baptized, received by letter, restoration, application dismissed, ex-

cluded and deceased since our last Association.

4. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical powers over the churches nor shall they infringe on any of the rights of any of the churches in the union.

5. The Association when convened shall be governed by

a regular and proper decorum.

6. The Association shall have a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

7. New churches may be admitted into the Union which shall petition by letter and delegates and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association and manifested by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

8. Every church in the Union shall be entitled to repre-

sentation in the Association.

- 9. Every querry presented by the church to the Association, being first debated in their own churches shall come under the consideration of the Association.
- 10. Every motion made and seconded shall be considered by the Association except it be withdrawn by the party who made it.
- 11. We think it absoutely necessary that we have an Association fund for defraying the expenses of the same for the raising of which we think it the duty of each church in the Union to contribute such sums voluntarily as they think proper and send it by their delegates to the Association, and the amount so received shall be deposited with the Treasurer, who shall be responsible to the Association and pay same out as the Association may direct.
- 12. There shall be an Association Book kept in which the proceedings of every Association shall be regularly recorded by the Secretary.
- 13. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected if need be and signed by the Moderator and clerk before the Association arises.
- 14. Amendment to this plan of government may be made at any time by a majority of the Union when so desire.
- 15. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of the Association. The best method of effecting same shall be determined by the Association.
- 16. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of the majority of the members present except in receiving and dismissing churches and Associations, which shall be by unanimous vote.
- 17. The Association shall have power to decide for the General Union of the churches and to preserve aan inviolable chain of communion among same, giving churches all necessary advice in matters of church difficulty; inquiry into the cause why any church shall have failed to represent itself at any time in the Association; appropriate the money received to any purpose it may think proper; appoint any member, or members, by their consent, to transact any business which it may think necessary; withdraw from any church in the Union

which may violate any of the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion, admit any orderly minister of our faith and order to a seat in the Association, and to adjourn to any time or place it may deem necessary.
