PROCEEDINGS OF THE SEVENTY FIFTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE INDIAN BOTTOM ASSOCIATION.

of OLD REGULAR BAPTIST OF JESUS CHRIST FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 4, 1970

The Indian Bottom Association in session associated with the CEDAR GROVE Church, Hallie, Letcher, Co. Ky. September, 4, 5, 6. 1970 met at the church house for preaching services. Elder James D. Fields was called to the stand according to appointment of last years session, choosing a text on the promises of GOD, preaching a good sermon and a heart moving prayer. After which Elder Manus Ison was blessed to deliver

a wonderful sermon, (Text: Be ye not deceived, God is not mocked etc.)

The delegates remained at the church house. Mitchel Chaffins of the New Salem Association was blessed with a downpouring of GOD'S SPIRIT in preaching and prayer, to introduce for the business session.

The Association then was called to order by our beloved moderator Elder Manus Ison, who called for letters of the churches that compose the Indian Bottom Association.

1. After reading the Cedar Grove Church letter a move and second was made to receive all the church letters as they were in regular form, seat the delegates and refer all queries and requests to the committee on arrangements

10. Appointed the same committee as on ministery but with only one (1) delegate from each church, with moderator, sistant moderator, clerk, assistant clerk and entire delegation from our corresponding associations and transits to meet with us Friday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock to arrange

the work for Saturday morning. 11. By regular move and second it was agreed that we correspond with the following associations and clerk prepare letters to same

Saturday morning: Elder W.F. Hubbard. Union Elder Henry Barney. Philadelphia, Elder Paris Tackett. Northern New Salem. 13. By a move and second the Association adjourned until 9:30 o'clock Saturday morning.

SATURDAY MORNING, SEPTEMBER 5, 1970

The Indian Bottom Association met persuant to adjournment, and after singing some old songs of Zion, Elder Ira Adkins of Philadelphia Association was called on to introduce the business session and prayer by same. The association proceeded as follows

4. Appointed a committee on finance: I.D. Back, Andy Bates and Nelson Seals who reported \$380.00 from the churches. By a move and second to have 2,000 copies of minutes printed and that clerk superintend printing same and he be secretary-treasurer and he be allowed \$25.00 for expenses.

6. Appointed same committee on ministery as on Friday to arrange for preaching Saturday evening and Sunday. Saturday evening services were cancelled. For Sunday;

15. In regard to Cedar Grove request as follows: In Meekness of the Holy Spirit and in much love, we humbly request that this association consider the appointment of a council composed of seven brethren, members of this association, who are deemed best qualified to carry on their several duties which the association may assign to them, whose duties would be to hear and gather facts and give advice relative to problems and difficulties which commonly arise among the churches, We suggest and request that if this council is appointed that the association give them a charge as to their duties and the powers and authority under which they may labor and function.

In regard to the request from the Cedar Grove Church relative to the appointment of a council from our brethren and their various duties. After careful consideration and considerable thought being given on the subject, we think it is a forward move for Regular Baptist; therefore, we unanimously agree and grant the request.

Whereupon this association by move and second duly carried authorized the moderator to appoint members to compose the council, and to advise them of their several duties relative to the welfare and prosperity of our churches.

the council, and to advise them of their several duties relative to the welfare and prosperity of our churches. Be it further recognized by this association that the council take note of any trouble or difficulity arising in any church or between churches and use their best judgement and skill in arbitrating a peaceful solution and getting the problems settled peacefully without the intervention of the associations. However, their findings, decision and recommendations shall in no-wise Lord it over God's heritage. They must always rely on God's word and the guidance of the Holy Spirit to assist them in solving whatever duties they may encounter for the upbuilding of the church and the Lord's Kingdom.

They are admonished to strive to preserve and to work for the advancement of the Regular Baptist Churches in maintaining her old time image, practice and doctrine. We also recommend that this council organize themselves; that they have a chairman and a secretary and that minutes be kept of their work; that they vote on all matters to be passed upon by the council, the chairman voting only in case of a tie vote. This association urges this council to enter into its duties and begin its functioning as soon as they can arrange to do so, and that the 'Great I Am' will be with them in all their undertaking.

16. In regard to the request of the New Home Church and Kingdom Come Church regarding conditions a church must meet to get a letter of dismission from the Indian Bottom Assn.

We the Indian Bottom Association as an advisory council, say to the New Home and Kingdom Come Churches that their requests are hereby granted relative to a church requesting a letter of dismission from this association.

We advise that a church requesting a letter of dismission must at its regular council meeting time, notify by word of mouth or in writing, each and every member of the church's anticipation and intentions, and that the matter be thoroughly discussed at their regular council meeting time, that thoroughly inquire of her membership, if there be any member who would not prefer to leave this association.

If it should be manifested that some should prefer not to leave this association the church upon request by the members grant them a letter of dismission. We further advise that any church who fails to fully comply with this advice shall forthwith be denied their request, and if a letter having been granted to a church who has not fully complied to this advice, the letter shall be deemed null and void, canceled and held for naught by this association.

We also advise our churches to grant letters of dismission to members who ask for same, that are in good stan-

ding with the church.

17. In answer to the request of New Home concerning several disorders in the Charlestown Regular Baptist Church of the Thornton Union Association.

We, the Indian Bottom Association now in session and in compliance with our work of our last session, sendeth this

request to our sister, the Thornton Union Association:

For the sake of peace and fellowship among our brotherhood we ask Thornton Union Association to investigate the disorders in the Charlestown Church regarding double married members, and members taken into the church illegally who were members held in disorder by this Association. This request is sent in much love to our sister association trusting that she will treat this matter in a manner that will be accep-table in the sight of our dear Lord. Our prayer is that God will give you a mind to work with this church in such a way that it will cause peace to abound among us and that the to us and our glory of God will show forth its goodness blessed children.

18. In regard to the requests of Bethel and Pilgrim's Home churches asking for letters of dismission, our moderator asked if they had or would comply with the sixteenth item of this year's work and they answered yes. A move and second was made to grant their requests when joined to another as-sociation of the same faith and order.

19. Resolved by the association that the clerk draw up a resolution of appreciation to the Cedar Grove Church and community at large for the care and consideration given the 1970 session of the Indian Bottom Association.

20. By a move and second it was agreed that we omit the

reading of this year's minutes.

21. Upon motion and second to adjourn to the time and place

of our next association.

22. The business session of the annual business meeting of the Indian Bottom Association was closed with inspiring remarks and prayer by Elder I.D. Back of the Thornton Union Done and signed by order of the Association.

CIRCULAR LETTER

After being chosen last year at the Indian Bottom Association to write a Circular Letter, I am now going to try

to write a letter for inspection.

I want to write, if the Lord will, the truth as it is in Christ Jesus, such as I think will be good for all the Churches and everybody, you know I will have the guiding Spirit of the almighty God, for all in vain without him. I think there is a lot of preaching done out of Him and it is not identifying.

Jesus said the Spirit of the Lord is upon Me because He hath annointed me to preach the Gospel to the poor When He was annointed and preached, it was power. The Gospel is the Power God to every one that believes, but to those that do not believe it is foolishness, yet it is the power of God. The Gospel was not only power in the time Jesus was here on earth, or in Paul's day. It is the same today; there is a doctrine that the only way sinners can

ever hear the Gospel is through a preacher (man), John saw another angel fly in the midst of Heaven having the ever lasting Gospel to preach to them that dwell on earth. I feel sure this angel preached to me before man did, which made the second witness, to let me know like he did Nicodemus, "Ye Must be Born Again." Some say ye are children before ye are born. If so, Jesus told Nicodemus wrong. Not so, any thing preached that does away the new Birth in Christ, is erroneous doctrine as far as I am concerned.

When ye heard the word of truth, the Gospel of your salvation and after ye have believed then were ye sealed with the Holy Spirit of promise; an heir with Christ in His Kingdom. Some may say, "Do I have to join a Baptist Church to Some may say, "Do I have to join a Baptist Church to be a Baptist?" No, you do not have to join any church, but ye must be born again; as many as are baptised into Christ have put on Christ. Some may say, "How can I know when this has happened to me?" The way ye may know ye have passed from death unto life. You will hate the things you passed and love the things you once hated. The worldly once loved and love the things you once hated. The worldly pleasures will not be pleasures any more.

Ye are kept by the power of God through faith in His Son. God chastens whom He loves. If we bear not the rod,

we are bastards and not sons.

I hope some of our brothers quit trying to dictate other people's lives and let everyone live his own life.

If they are Christians, God will take care of them.
One other thing, let's quit judging our brothers and sisters. We are not the judges. We can only look on the outside, but God can look in the heart and He makes no mistake. He knows those that are His. I would like to advise too, let's not talk hearsay about our brothers and sisters or about our sister churches. We hear talk about others very often and ask if they know. The answer is, "They say..." It is carried from one to another and most of the time gets bigger. We should manifest our love one to another, and the world may know, "Ye are my desciples" If we have love one toward another, we should trust each other. I am sure lots of our brothers are doing all they can or the best they know. There have to be some weak. The Bible says the strong shall bear the infirmities of the weak. I understand my weakness. We should teach forgiveness and practice forgiveness.

I used to be very hasty to condemn the other brother but we must look over the things that are common to man. For none are perfect in the flesh. If the righteous scarcely are saved where shall the sinner and the jungodly appear?

We are of the Christian family. Today everyone that has been born again is a member of that family, whether in the church or out; a member of the body of Christ, a member of the Bride of Lamb's Wife. I believe God wants all His children to join this church, put their light on a candle stick that it may give light to all that are in the house.

I have never seen times as they are today, but Jesus said

perilous times would come. I suppose they are here. Anyway, I think the time is here for the Baptist and all Christians to take their weapons of war off of each other and join together and fight the enemy. If we would stay down at the

feet of Jesus where we belong we could put the enemy on his flight. The Bible says, "' woe unto the shepherd that feeds himself and not his flock." I have seen brothers get terribly high. The higher they get the farther they have to fall, but in this they get terribly strict, terribly smart. Old self has a feast.

The Bible says, "Should they not have fed the flock?"

The Bible says, The food that feeds the flock comes down from God. If we are not clean and humble God will not trust us with this food, and we will end our work like the builders of the Tower of Babel, in shame and defeat.

If all the professed followers of Christ would accept God's standard it would bring us to unity and peace. I would like to see all our associations in unity and peace. I would like to see all our associations in unity like they were 35 years ago. They don't seem to understand each other any more. The builders of the Tower of Babel got to where they could not understand each other, because God confounded their language.

Now in my closing, I guess this will be the last Circular Letter I will ever write, for it is getting close to Home coming time and I will be going Home, but I feel like Paul said, '' I have fought a good fight, I have kept the faith, hence forth there is a crown laid up for me and not for me alone, but for all that love and serve the Lord. 'I have not tried to write on any certain subject. I have written a very simple letter, mostly in a way of counsel.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in the one true and living God, and not withstanding there are Three that bear record in Heaven, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, yet there is but one in substance, equal in power and glory, not to be divided and impossible to change in practice or principle.

2. We believe the Old and New Testament Scriptures are

the true written words of God and were given by inspiration of God and there is a sufficiency in them contained for our instruction and they are the only rule of our faith and

practice. 3. We believe in the doctrine of original sin and that men sinned since the fall and are by nature the children

of wrath.

4. We believe in the impotency of inability of man to recover themselves out of the state they are in: therefore a Saviour is absolutely needed.

5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of

God only by imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

6. We believe in the perseverence of the Saints. That by grace through faith they are born again and adopted into the family of Heaven: that they become equal heirs with Jesus Christ in glory, and that He will raise them up at the last day.

We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are Gospel Ordinances; that true believers are the proper sub-

jects and we admit no other.

8. We believe that the true mode of baptism is by immersion to baptize a person by their own consent, back foremost in water in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

9. We believe that washing of one another's feet is a commandment of Christ, left on records with His Desciples, and ought to be practiced by his followers.

10. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgement when all will be judged according to their body. their deeds done in their body.

11. We believe that the punishment of the wicked will be, everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal

after death.

12. We believe that no one has the right to administer the Gospel Ordinances but such as are legally called and qualified there unto.

13. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to attend church meetings, and that it is the duty of the

church to deal with them for neglecting same.

14. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to contribute to the support of the church by defraying all reasonable expenses of same, never neglecting the poor, according to their several abilities.

15. We believe that any doctrine that goes to encourage

or indulge the people in their sin so as to cause them to settle down on anything short of saving grace in Christ for salvation is erroneous and such doctrine will be rejected

by us

16. None of the above articles shall be construed as to hold with particular election or reprobation as to make God partial directly or indirectly so as to injure children

17. None of the above articles shall be altered without legal notice and free consent.

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RULES OF DECORUM

1. The association shall be opened and closed by prayer. 2. The moderator and clerk shall be chosen by the suf-

frage of the members present.

3. Only one member shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the moderator, when he is about to speak

4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the moderator until he is done

5. He shall strictly adher to his subject and in nowise reflect on the preaching speaker, but shall define his ideas on the proposition for debate, so far as he can.

No person shall abruptly absent himself from the

association without leave of the same.

7. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any subject without permission from the association.

8. No person of the association shall have the liberty to laugh during the sitting of the same, nor to whisper in time of public speech.

9. No member shall address another in any other form or term than that of "brother."

10. The moderator shall not interrupt a brother or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his views on the sub-

ject unless he shall violate the Rules of Decorum.

11. The names of the several members of the association shall be enrolled by the clerk, and called as often as the

association may require.

12. The moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled but he shall have no vote unless the association be equally

divided in which event he shall give the deciding vote.

13. Any member who shall willfully and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reprimanded by the Association

as it may think proper.

CONSTITUTION

Having by unanimous voice changed our organization from an annual union meeting to an association we therefore propose to keep the order and rules of an association according to the following form of government:

1. The association shall be called the Indian Bottom

Association.

2. The association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our union, and duly sent to represent them in the association, who shall be members whom they judge best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their respective churches, certifying to their appointment these shall be entitled to a seat.

3. In the letters from the different churches shall be

expressed their full number in fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, restoration, application, dismissed, ex-

cluded and deceased since our last association.

4. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical powers over the churches nor shall they infringe on any of the rights of any of the churches in our union.

The association, when convened, shall be governed by

a regular and proper decorum,

6. The association shall have a moderator and assistant moderator, clerk and assistant clerk and treasurer, who shall

be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

7. New churches may be admitted to this union, which shall petition by letter and delegates, and if found, upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the association, and manifested by the moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

8. Every church in the union shall be entitled to repre-

sentation in the association.

9. Every query presented by the churches to the association, being first debated in their own church, shall come under the consideration of the association.

10. Every motion made and seconded shall be considered by the association, except it be withdrawn by the party who

made it.

11. We think it absolutely necessary that we have an association fund, for defraying the expense of the same, for the raising of which we think it the duty of each church in the union to contribute such sums voluntarily as they think the defraction of the same of the sa proper, and send it by their delegates, to be deposited with treasurer, who shall be responsible to the association for any pay the same out as the association may direct.

12. There shall be an association book kept in which the proceedings of every association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary, who shall receive annual compensation

for same

13. The minutes of the association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the moderator and clerk before the association rises.

14. Amendments to this plan of government may be made by

a majority of the union when in regular session, when so

desired.

15. The association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of the association, the best method of effecting the same shall be determined by the association.

16. All minutes coming before the association shall be decided by will of the majority of the members present.

17. The association shall have power to decide for the special which of the churches and to present an inviolence. general union of the churches and to preserve an inviolable chain of communion among same, giving churches all neces-sary advice in matters of church difficulties: inquiring into the cause why any church shall have failed to represent itself any time in the association; appropriate the money received to any purpose it may think proper; appoint any member, or members by their consent to transact any business which it may think necessary; withdraw from any church in the union which may violate any of the rules of the association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion, admit any orderly minister of our faith and order to a seat in the association and adjourn to any time or place it may deem necessary.
