PROCEEDINGS OF THE SEVENTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE INDIAN BOTTOM ASSOCIATION OF OLD REGULAR BAPTIST OF THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST

Friday August 31,1973 and the two following days.

The Indian Bottom Association in session assembled with the Little Dove Church, Sassafras, Knott County, Kentucky August 31,1973, met at the church house for preaching services; after singing some of Zion's old songs, due to the absence of Elder Frank Fugate, who was appointed in last year's session as an alternate, the Moderator appointed Brother Lee Mosley to introduce the services. Bro. Lee, in his usual humble way in presenting himself unto the Lord with the assignment, made a wonderful introduction.

After prayer by Bro. Mosley, Elder Ermel R. Ison, who was chosen by the delegates of the 1972 session to preach the introduction in this session, came to the stand and delivered, laboring under the spirit of our Lord, a message of encouragement, peace, love and understanding, which the delegates and the congregation seemed to enjoy so much.

The delegates chose to remain at the church house to conduct the business of the Association for the day. Elder Melvin Watts of the New Salem Association introduced the Association with remarks and prayer by Elder Mitchell Chaffins of the New Salem Association.

The Association, being assembled, was called to order by Elder Manus Ison, our beloved Moderator, who called for letters of the several churches which compose the Indian Bottom Association.

- After reading the Little Dove Church Letter, a move was made by Elder Kirby Ison to receive all other church letters as they were in regular form, seat the delegates and refer all queries and request to the Committee on Arrangements. A second was made to Elder Ison's move, which was put before the house and passed with no objections being filed.
 - 2. The Association was then organized by cho-

osing the following officers:

- The Moderator called for newly organized churches and received none.
- 4. Called for churches of our same faith and order who may desire to take up fellowship with us. Two responded, the Blair Branch Church and the Mt. Olivet Church. Letters for each were received and read by approval of the Association and the delegates seated; the Moderator extending the right hand of fellowship to them.
- By move and second made and duly carried the Articles of Faith, Rules of Decorum and the Constution will be printed in the Minutes.
- 6. Called for corresponding Associations and received the following represented by letter and the following delegates towit:

- All foregoing letters were received, read by the clerk and the delegates were given a seat with us in council, the Moderator extending to all delegates the right hand of fellowship.
 - 7. Called for transit ministers and members of

our same faith and order who may desire to take a seat with us in council. None responded.

 By move and second duly carried, the Moderator was directed to make all temporary appointments during this session.

 Appointed one delegate from each church with the entire delegation of the Little Dove Church as a Committee on Ministry to arrange for preaching services for Friday evening and Saturday morning.

- 10. Appointed same committee as on ministry but with one delegate from each church, with the Moderator, Asst. Moderator, Clerk and Asst. Clerks and the entire delegation from our corresponding Associations and transits to meet with us Friday afternoon at 2:30 P.M. to arrange the business work for Saturday morning.
- Il. By regular move and second it was agreed to correspond with the following Associations of our same faith and order and the clerks are directed to prepare letters to same:

NEW SALEM, UNION, SARDIS, PHILADELPHIA and NORTHERN NEW SALEM

12. The Committee on Ministry made the following report for preaching services: Friday afternoon:

 By move and second the Association adjourned until 9:30 A.M. Saturday morning.

Saturday Morning, September 1, 1973

The Indian Bottom Association met persuant to adjournment and after singing some of Zion's songs the Moderator selected Elder Elias Cotton of the Philadelphia Association to introduce the business session of this Association. Elder Cotton was wonderfully blessed, being endued with the Holy Spirit

of our blessed Lord to counsel the delegates to be faithful to the trust and to the cause in which we are so vitally engaged. Likewise Elder Alonzo Allen prayed to our dear Lord to guide and direct us in this great and noble work, and that all we may do in this great work be dedicated to the glory and the honor of the GREAT I AM.

The Association proceeded as follows:

- 1. Called the roll and noted the absentees.
- Ministers chosen to preach on the stand and the congregation was excused by the Moderator to go to the stand for preaching services.
- The Committee on Arrangements' report was read and received by move and second. The Committee was then discharged.
- 4. Appointed a Committee on Finance: Elder Charlie Gibson, Bro. Glenn Hampton and Bro. Agnan Back, who reported the sum of \$575.00. By move and second the report was received and accepted.
- 5. By move and second 2500 copies of the minutes were directed to be printed, and that the Clerk be the secretary and treasurer and that he superintend the printing of same and that he be allowed the sum of Fifty Dollars(\$50.00) for his services.
- 6. Appointed same Committee on Ministry as on Friday to arrange for preaching services for Saturday evening and for Sunday. No services were arranged for Saturday Evening. For Sunday: 1. Elder Crit Eldridge of the Indian Bottom Association. 2. Elder Coy Combs of the New Salem Association. 3. Elder Dillis Combs of the New Salem Association. 4. Elder Manus Ison of Indian Bottom Association.
- 7. The Circular Letter was read by Elder Olus Baldridge. By move and second same was received and directed to be printed in our minutes. The Committee on Ministry chose Elder Kirby Ison to write one for inspection next year.
- 8. Brethren were called on to report on attending union meetings and Associations, who reported that they had done the best they could. A move and second was made to receive their reports and excuse them their failures.
 - 9. By move and second union meetings & communion

times were directed to be printed in our minutes.

10. By move and second it was agreed to have obituaries and pictures printed in our minutes with the understanding that (\$5.00) five dollars must be included for printing of pictures.

It appeared to the satisfaction of this Association that the Pig Leatherwood Church, Little Zion Church, Kingdom Come Church, Poor Fork Church, Maple Grove Church, and the Oven Fork Church having gone out from us and taken fellowship with an Association with whom we have no fellowship or correspondence, be it resolved by this Association that we drop each of these churches from our fellowship. Be it further resolved by this Association that if any of the churches or members desire to return to this Association or any of our churches, they may present themselves for the consideration of this Association or the Churches.

Hallie, Kentucky Fourth Saturday in July, 1973

The Cedar Grove Church of Old Regular Baptist met on the above date, it being our regular council meeting time. After singing and prayer the Church was seated in love and fellowship and working order. The subject of the Pilgrims' Home Church, Milan, Indiana having taken into her fellowship

Perry Tackett, an excluded member from the Powell Church was debated and by move and second duly carried, the church agreed to send the following request to the Indian Bottom Association where convened with the Little Dove Church on Friday before the first Saturday in September, 1973.

REQUEST

We request that the Indian Bottom Association send a request to our Sister, the New Salem Association informing her of the above transgression and that they deal with this situation as they see fit, proper and right.

17. Be it resolved by this Association that the regular Associational church letter be altered and changed as follows: in noting the state of the church following the word restored in the letter put application (and or) recommendation etc.

The above resolution was approved by the Association by move and second and the Clerk and Asst. Clerks were directed accordingly relating to the Associational church letter and the statistical table of contents as well.

- 18. By move and second the Association granted the Defeated Creek Church her request to change her regular meeting time from the first Saturday and Sunday to the Second Saturday and Sunday in each month.
- 19. The Association called on Kirby Ison, secretary of the Committee on Council, to make the report for the year. The Secretary reported that they held no meeting for the year 1972 and therefore transacted no business. Said report was received by move and second.

20. The Moderator of the Indian Bottom Association appointed the following to serve on the Committee Council for the year 1973-74: Elders: Manus Ison, Carl Back, Olus Baldridge, Kirby Ison, Nelson

Seals, Crit Eldridge and Bro. John Preece. These all being present accepted this position. By move and second the appointments were approved by the Association and Elder Manus Ison was to serve as chairman of the committee and Elder Kirby Ison was to serve as secretary of the committee.

21. Elder Robert Pridemore, delegate representing the Powell Church made it known to the Association by verbal request that the Powell Church needed the assistance of the Committee on Council and that they wanted the Committee to come at their convenience to assist the church with her problems. By move and second the Association directed the Committee to go to the Powell Church the Third Saturday in September in obedience to the delegates request.

22. Be it resolved by this Association that item No.6 of our 1958 Minutes be changed to read as follows: If a sister is excluded from the church for cutting her hair and she comes back with an application and acknowledgement to the satisfaction and acceptability of the church, she may be restored to full love and fellowship. By move and second this resolution was approved.

23. By move and second the Association endowed the Council Committee with the authority to inquire of and to investigate order and to assist a church or churches in getting themselves in order and legal standing and in a position to meet the standard of Old Regular Baptist.

24. The work of the Association having been completed and no further business to be considered; by move and second the Association stands adjourned until the reconvening of same with the Ivy Point Church Garner, Knott County, Kentucky to commence on Friday before the first Saturday in September 1974. Elder Carl Back closed the Association with prayer.

Sunday September 2, 1973

Early Sunday Morning the glorious sun was making its appearance from behind the great eastern mountains and gently and peacefully peering into the density of the fog, breaking it into pieces, lifting and taking it away from the world around us, so that nothing but sun shine and its glory would be dominating the valley which was holding the Little Dove Church in its hand. Yet greater and more blissful splendor than this was visible in and around the Little Dove Church in the early morning hours, as throngs of people of practially every walk of life began to gather for the Sunday worship and last day of the 1973 session of the Indian Bottom Association. By 9:30 in the morning a large crowd of eager listeners had filled the spacious comfortable Church House.

Pretty soon after hand shakes and lovable greetings among each other, the echoes of Zion's old songs began to ring out. Oh! how sweet was the sound, blessed human voices blending together in the meekness of the spirit and to glory of God. Oh, how magnificent! Elder Critt Eldridge, having been chosen to introduce the services for this day, came to the stand. In his gentle humble way he spoke to the congregation relating to their soul's salvation and of the eternal life which we obtain through faith in Jesus Christ our Lord. CIRCULAR LETTER

Dear Brethren of the Indian Bottom Association: Last year you chose me to try to write a circular letter for your inspection at our next session. Now a year has passed by and it's only 4 days until we meet; a year for me marked with much suffering and sorrow as you can see nearly half my mortal body is gone. But there have been a great many rewards in meeting with you my brothers, sisters and friends in many places where I have been permitted to go, and your unfeigned love and kindness that has been manifested to me, which I can never repay if I should live many years, and your prayers that you prayed in my behalf which God heard and answered. For Jesus said, 'All things whatsoever ye shall ask in prayer, believing ye shall receive."

Paul said that faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen. For by it the elders obtained a good report. Through faith we understand that the worlds were framed by the word of God, so that things which are seen were not made of things which do appear.

I could mention a few of old time from righteous Abel, Enoch, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Sara, Joseph, Moses, Rahab, Gedion, Barak, Sampson, Jepthea, David, and Samual and the prophets, and what shall I more say? For the time would fail me to tell of the men and women of old time too many to remember with my feeble mind, who through faith subdued kingdoms, wrought right, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the violence of fires escaped the edge of the sword, out of weakness were made strong, waxed valiant in fight, turned to flight the armies of aliens.






ARTICLES OF FAITH

- 1. We believe in the one true and living God, and not withstanding there are Three that bear record in Heaven the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost, yet there is but one in substance, equal in power and glory, not to be divided and impossible to change in principal and practice.
- 2. We believe the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the true written words of God and were given by inspiration of God and there is a sufficiency in them contained for our instruction and they are the only rule of our faith and practice.
- We believe the doctrine of original sin and that men sinned since the fall and are by nature the children of wrath.
- 4. We believe in the impotency or inability of man to recover themselves out of the state they are in; therefore, a Saviour is absolutely needed.
 - 5. We believe that sinners are justified in the

sight of God only by imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

- 6. We believe in the preseverence of the Saints. That by grace through faith they are born again and adopted into the family of Heaven; that they become equal heirs with Jesus Christ in glory, and that He will raise them up at the last day.
- We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Gospel Ordinances; that true believers are the proper subjects and we admit no other.
- 8 We believe that the true mode of baptism is by immersion to baptize a person by their own consent, back foremost in water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost.
- We believe that washing of one another's feet is a commandment of Christ, left on records with His Disciples, and ought to be practiced by his followers.
- 10. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgment when all will be judged according to their deeds done in the body.
- We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal after death.
- 12. We believe that no one has the right to administer the Gospel Ordinances but such as are legally and qualified there unto.
- 13. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to attend church meetings, and that it is the duty of the church to deal with them for neglecting same.
- 14. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to contribute to the support of the church by defraying all reasonable expenses of same, never neglecting the poor, according to their several abilities.
- 15. We believe that any doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge the people in their sins or to cause them to settle down on anything short of saving grace in Christ for salvation is erroneous and such doctrine will be rejected by us.
- 16. None of the above articles shall be construed as to hold with particular election of reprobation as to make God partial directly or indirectly so as to injure children of men.

 None of the above articles shall be altered without legal notice and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM

- The association shall open and close with prayer.
- The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- Only one member shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the moderator, when he is about to speak.
- 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the moderator until he is done.
- He shall strictly adhere to his subject and in nowise reflect on the preceding speaker, but shall define his ideas on the proposition for debate, so far as he can.
- No person shall abruptly absent himself from the association without leave of the same.
- No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any subject without permission from the association.
- No member of the association shall have the liberty to laugh during the sitting of the same, nor to whisper in time of public speech.
- No member shall address another in any other form or term than that of "Brother."
- 10. The moderator shall not interrupt a brother or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his views on the subject unless he shall violate the Rules Of Decorum.
- The names of the several members of the association shall be enrolled by the Clerk, and called as often as the association may require.
- 12. The moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall have no vote unless the association be equally divided, in which event he shall give the deciding vote.
- 13. Any member who shall willfully and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reprimanded by the association as it may think proper.

CONSTITUTION

Having by unanimous voice changed our organization from an annual meeting to an association, we therefore propose to keep order and rules of an association according to the following form of government.

- The association shall be called the Indian Bottom Association.
- 2. The association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our union, and duly sent to represent them in the association, who shall be members whom they judge best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their respective churches, certifying to their appointment, these shall be entitled to a seat.
- 3. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their full number in fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, restoration, application, dismissed, excluded and deceased since our last association.
- 4. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical powers over the churches nor shall they infringe on any of the rights of any of the churches in the union.
- The association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum.
- The association shall have a moderator and assistant moderator, clerk and assistant clerk, and treasurer, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- 7. New churches may be admitted to this union, which shall petition by letter and delegates, and if found, upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the association, and manifested by the moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.
- Every church in the union shall be entitled to representation in the association.
- 9 Every query presented by the churches to the association, being first debated in their own church shall come under the consideration of the association.
- Every motion made and seconded shall be considered by the association, except it be withdrawn by the party who made it.

- 11. We think it absolutely necessary that we have an association fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For the raising of which we think it the duty of each church in the union to contribute such sums voluntarily as they think proper, and send it by their delegates, to be deposited with treasurer, who shall be responsible to the association for any pay the same out as the association may direct.
- 12. There shall be an association book kept in which the proceedings of every association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary, who shall receive annual compensation for same.
- 13. The minutes of the association shall be read and corrected if need be, and signed by the moderator and clerk before the association rises.
- 14. Ammendments to this plan of government may be made by a majority of the union when in regular session, when so desired.
- 15. The association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of the association, the best method of effecting the same shall be determined by the association.
- 16. All matters coming before the association shall be decided by will of the majority of the members present.
- 17. The association shall have power to decide for the general union of the churches and to preserve an inviolable chain of communion among same. giving churches all necessary advice in matters of church difficulty; inquiring into the cause why any church shall have failed to represent itself any time in the association; appropriate the money received to any purpose it may think proper; appoint any member or members by their consent to transact any business which it may think necessary; withdraw from any church in the union which may violate any of the rules of the association or deviate from the orthodox principals of religion, admit any orderly minister of our faith and order to a seat in the association and adjourn to any time or place it may deem necessary.
