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# MINUTES OF THE EIGHTY—SECOND ANNUAL SESSION OF THE INDIAN BOTTOM ASSOCIATION OF

# OLD REGULAR BAPTIST THE CHURCH OF JESUS CHRIST

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 2, 1977 AND THE TWO FOLLOWING DAYS:

The Indian Bottom Association being in session assembled at our Association House, Sassafras, Knott County, Kentucky, September 2, 1977, being hosted by the Blair Branch Church met in the Congregational Department of the house for preaching services. After singing some of Zion's blessed songs Elder Olus Baldridge having been selected last year to introduce the services for this year (1977) came to the stand; Brother Baldridge was wonderfully blessed in his opening remarks and prayer.

After prayer, intercession and giving of thanks had been made, Elder Ermel Ison who was chosen by the delegates of the 1976 session to preach the sermon of introduction in the 1977 session came to the stand and delivered a wonderful message

which will be long remembered by this Association.

After the introductory, the delegates were advised to assemble in their room to organize and conduct the business of the Association for the day. The delegates being assembled, Elder Ivan Amburgey of the Northern New Salem Association introduced the Association with some sweet Godly counsel and Elder Hiram Adkins led us to Hiş great Throne of Grace in prayer. 11. By move and second duly carried it was agreed to

The Clerks were directed to prepare letters to same.

12. The Committee on Ministry made the following report for preaching services:

13. By move and second duly carried the Association stands adjourned until 9:30 A.M. Saturday morning.

# SATURDAY MORNING, SEPTEMBER 3, 1977

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. After singing some of Zion's precious old songs to the glory of our dear Lord, our Moderator selected Elder Hobert Bates from the New Salem Association to introduce the business session of the Association. His remarks and prayer were both seasoned with the spirit and the love of God and food to God's little children.

The Association proceeded as follows:

10. By move and second it was agreed to have obituaries printed in our minutes together with pictures, with a fee of \$5.00 being included for the printing of pictures.

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# 18. Request of Northern New Home Church:

Request to the Indian Bottom Association

Dear Brethren:

The Northern New Home Church being in session and in love and fellowship this fourth Saturday in July, 1977. One of the items discussed was the subject of a uniform system for our churches in the Indian Bottom Association in securing and seating ordained authorities from which a presbytery approved and accepted by the church to be perfected in the work of ordaining deacons and elders in the church.

It is the humble request of this church that the Indian Bottom Association, now in session, give this matter close attention and that they work out a system which will be a guide for all our churches to follow, and that same be spread of record in the minutes of the Indian Bottom Association.

God help us all to be of one mind in this great cause.

19. Answer to the request of the Northern New Home Church relative to ordaining deacons and ministers in the church.

The Indian Bottom Association now in session, in answering the request of the Northern New Home Church, wish to advise that we believe that a more uniform system or method for ordaining deacons and ministers in our churches is badly needed, and that a system or guideline for our churches to follow should be set forth by this Association, being careful not to Lord it over God's heritage. Therefore we briefly suggest:

- 1. When a church has a party or parties who have a gift and calling to the Deaconship of the church or to the ministry of the gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ, if the church is satisfied as to the gifts and callings, they should be set aside, in the decretion of the church to be examined and ordained if found worthy and qualified by a legally constituted presbytery authorized and approved by the church.
  - 2. Whereupon the church shall call for assistance and

invite ordained authorities of our sister churches by letter of request, by public announcements or by various means of personal contacts. When the set time arrives and ordained authorities present themselves for the services of the church, the moderator of the church shall seat those who responded to the invitation together with all other ordained authorities present on the occasion who were present, but did not previously receive an invitation. These all are to be seated together from which a legal and proper presbytery is to be constituted.

- 3. Whereupon the ordained authorities thus seated shall organize themselves into a legal constituted presbytery by choosing a moderator and a clerk. The moderator shall be the chief spokesman and leader in the examination; the clerk shall be the recorder of same. Thus the presbytery is formed. Each and every member of the presbytery shall have the right and privilege to ask any question they deem necessary on touching the gifts, callings and qualifications of those under consideration of the presbytery.
- 4. If upon conclusion of the whole matter, subjects to be considered do satisfactorily respond to all questions and inquiries and the presbytery does so find, then those being considered shall be ordained fully to their many functions relative to the church and the Gospel ministry of the Lord Jesus Christ, by prayer and the laying on of hands by the presbytery.
- 5. Then those ordained and properly given a final charge by some chosen member of the presbytery and then delivered back to the church an ordained elder or deacon as the case may be. Then the presbytery shall be finally discharged and dissolved.
- 6. At this point the church shall approve or disapprove the work of the presbytery and receive the ordained back into the hands and custody of the church as such.

## 20A. Resolution:

Resolved that this Association appoint ministerial aid for three of our needy churches to wit: The Harrican Gap Church, the Little Zion Church and the Kingdom Come Church. Be it resolved that the Clerks make a tentative list of ministers to carry out this resolution and that same be approved by this Association and printed in our minutes for information of those who are concerned.

We truly hope that those ministers who are tentatively selected will meet the obligation and help these little churches carry on the cause of the Master. List published elsewhere in these minutes.

20B. Item 2 in our minutes in the Rules of Decorum which reads as follows: The Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present, shall be changed to read and be in force as follows to-wit:

The Moderator and Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk or Clerks shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present. The Clerk is directed to make this correction in the minutes accordingly.

#### CIRCULAR LETTER

Brother Moderator, Brother Clerks, Brother delegation, also the delegation from our corresponding associations, and our Brothers and Sisters ever where you might be, of this eightysecond session of the Indian Bottom Association, of Old Regular Baptist, the Church of Jesus Christ, our Lord. Twelve months have rolled by and gone since our last session of our old Indian Bottom Association. Many of our good brothers and sisters have gone on to that great beyond. In our 1976 session of our Indian Bottom Association, the delegation did choose me, Brother McKinley McIntosh, to write a circular letter to be read before this Association to be approved or rejected. I will now attempt to write this letter, knowing that without God's help, we can not do anything. I am before this delegation and an allwise God, who holds our lives in His hands every day of our lives. My brother delegates, my subject is (Love.) This world hinges on love; it was love that spoke this world into existence. (God is love,) everything was made by the God of love. God made the world and everything in the world. There are two loves, there is a natural love, and there is a spiritual love. The natural love is with people in their everyday life, going about our natural affairs; the spiritual love is the love of God, that visits our people every day of our life, teaching us there is a hell to shun, and a Heaven to gain. Oh how about that love, a love that can come into our hearts every day of our lives, where ever we go, at night when we lie on our beds and lets us know

that it's not all well with us. Oh, how merciful our God is! He's followed me through my young life teaching me to live a peaceful life and He would be found with me. It would bring me peace and joy, and going on in sin would bring me trouble and dissatisfaction. You see, God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten son into the world, that through Him whosoever would believe on Him may be saved. There are three that bear record in Heaven, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost; these three are one equal in power and love. The Bible tells us in God's word to examine the spirits to see which one is of God. God has never told us to do anything that we could not do. Ever since man was made there must have been a conversation in Heaven, with the Father and Son. Jesus took upon Himself to come down here upon this earth, here in this cold-hearted world. He came down here in a natural body, and lived among the inhabitants of this world. Talk about love, there has or never will be such love to compete with this love. St. John first chapter, verse 6, says "There was a man sent from God whose name was John, the same came for a witness, to bear witness of the light, that all men through him might believe and be saved." He was not the light but was sent to bear witness of that light; that was the true light, that lighteth every man that cometh into the world. We see as He went about doing miracles. Here is one of His miracles. In the beginning of His work, I think it was the third day, there was a marriage in Cana, of Gallilee. The mother of Jesus was there; both Jesus and His mother were there, and His mother was called, and His Disciples: to marriage. When they wanted wine, the mother of Jesus saith unto Jesus, "They have no wine." Jesus saith unto her,"Woman, what have I to do with thee? Mine hour is not yet come." (5) His mother saith unto the servants, "Whatsoever He saith unto you, do you it." And there were set there six water pots of stone, after the manner of the purifying of the Jews, containing two or three firkins apiece. (7) Jesus saith unto them, "Fill the water pots with water," and they filled them up to the brim. And He said unto them, "Draw out now, and bear unto the govenor of the feast." And they bare it. (9) When the ruler of the feast had tasted the water that was made wine, and knew not whence it was, (but the servants which drew the water knew,) the governor of the feast called the bridegroom, (10) and saith unto him, "Every man at the beginning doth set forth good wine and when men have well drunk, then that which is worse...but thou hast kept the good wine until now." Just think about what a mind that Paul did have, (8 Acts, Chapter 26, Verse 9) I verily thought

with myself, that I ought to do many things contrary to the name of Jesus of Nazareth. (10) which things I also did in Jerusalem and many of the saints did I shut up in prison, having received authority from the chief priests, and when they were put to death, I gave my voice against them. (11) v..and I punished them oft, in every synagogue, and compelled them to blaspheme and being exceedingly mad against them, I persecuted them even unto strange cities. (12)V, whereupon as I went to Damascus, with authority and commission from the chief priests. (13) V..at midday, O, King, I saw in the way a light from Heaven, above the brightness of the sun, shining around about me, and them which journeyed with me. (14) v.. And when we were fallen to the earth, I heard a voice speaking unto me and saying, in the Hebrew tongue, "Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou me? 

Cebra Back was born into the house of James and Elizabeth Roberts Back on October 4, 1887. Uncle Cebra was called from this life on November 18, 1976,


making his stay on earth 89 years, 1 month and 14 days.

#### ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in the one true and living God, and not withstanding there are Three that bear record in Heaven, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, yet there is but one in substance, equal in power and glory, not to be divided and impossible to change in principle and practice.

2. We believe the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the true written words of God and were given by inspiration of God and there is a sufficiency in them contained for our instruction and they are the only rule of our faith and practice.

3. We believe the doctrine of original sin and that man sinned since the fall and are by nature the children of wrath.

4. We believe in the impotency or inability of man to recover themselves out of the state they are in: therefore, a Saviour is absolutely needed.

5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

6. We believe in the perseverence of the Saints. That by grace through faith they are born again and adopted into the

family of Heaven; that they become equal heirs with Jesus Christ in Glory, and that He will raise them up at the last day.

7. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Gospel Ordinances; that true believers are the proper subjects

and we admit no other.

8. We believe that the true mode of baptism is by immersion to baptize a person by their own consent, back foremost in the water in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost.

9. We believe that washing of one another's feet is a commandment of Christ, left on record with His Disciples, and

ought to be practiced by His followers.

10. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgment when all will be judged according to their deeds done in the body.

11. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal after death.

- 12. We believe that no one has the right to administer the Gospel Ordinances but such as are legally and qualified there unto.
- 13. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to attend church meetings, and that it is the duty of the church to deal with them for neglecting same.
- 14. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to contribute to the support of the church by defraying all reasonable expenses of same, never neglecting the poor, according to their several abilities.
- 15. We believe that any doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge the people in their sins or to cause them to settle down on anything short of saving grace in Christ for salvation is erroneous and such doctrine will be rejected by us.

16. None of the above articles shall be construed as to hold with particular election of reprobation as to make God partial

directly or indirectly so as to injure children of man.

17. None of the above articles shall be altered without legal notice and free consent.

# RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Association shall open and close with prayer.

- 2. The Moderator and Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerks shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- Only one member shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator, when he is about to speak.

4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is done.

5. He shall strictly adhere to his subject and in nowise reflect on the preceding speaker, but define his ideas on the proposition for debate, so far as he can.

6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Associ-

ation without leave of the same.

7. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on

any subject without permission from the Association.

8. No member of the Association shall have the liberty to laugh during the sitting of the same, nor to whisper in time of public speech.

9. No member shall address another in any other form or

term than that of "Brother."

- 10. The Moderator shall not interrupt a brother or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his views on the subject unless he shall violate the Rules of Decorum.
- 11. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk, and called as often as the Association may require.
- 12. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided, in which event he shall give the deciding vote.
- 13. Any member who shall willfully and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reprimanded by the Association as it may think proper.

# CONSTITUTION

Having by unanimous voice changed our organization from an annual meeting to an Association, we therefore propose to keep order and rules of an Association according to the following form of government.

1. The Association shall be called the Indian Bottom Associ-

ation.

- 2. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our union, and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who shall be members whom they judge best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their respective churches, certifying to their appointment, these shall be entitled to a seat.
- 3. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their full number in fellowship, those baptized, re-

ceived by letter, restoration, application, dismissed, excluded and deceased since our last Association.

4. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical power over the churches nor shall they infringe on any of the rights of any of the churches in the union.

5. The Association, when convened, shall be governed by

a regular and proper decorum.

The Association shall have a Moderator and Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, who shall

be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

- 7. New churches may be admitted to this union, which shall petition by letter and delegates, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association, and manifested by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.
- 8. Every church in the union shall be entitled to representation in the Association.
- 9. Every query presented by the churches to the Association, being first debated in their own church shall come under the consideration of the Association.
- 10. Every motion made and seconded shall be considered by the Association, except it be withdrawn by the party who made it.
- 11. We think it absolutely necessary that we have an Association fund for defraying the expenses of the same. For the raising of which we think it the duty of each church in the union to contribute such sums voluntarily as they think proper, and send it by their delegates, to be deposited with treasurer, who shall be responsible to the Association for and pay the same out as the Association may direct.

12. There shall be an Association book kept in which the proceedings of every Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary, who shall receive annual compensation for same.

- 13. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises.
- 14. Amendments to this plan of government may be made by majority of the union when in regular session, when so desired.
- 15. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of the Association, the best methods of effecting the same shall be determined by the Association.

16. All matters coming before the Association shall be

decided by will of the majority of the members present.

17. The Association shall have the power to decide for the general union of the churches and to preserve an inviolable chain on communion among same, giving churches all necessary advice in matters of church difficulty; inquiring into the cause why any church shall have failed to represent itself any time in the Association, appropriate the money received to any purpose it may think proper; appoint any member or members by their consent to transact any business which it may think necessary; withdraw from any church in the union which may violate any of the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principals of religion; admit any orderly minister of our faith and order to a seat in the Association and adjourn to any time or place it may deem necessary.
