



- 1. From Hazard, Kentucky, go east on KY 15 to Sassafras (12 miles) then follow signs up Yellow Creek about ½ mile to Association.
- 2. From Hindman, Kentucky, leave KY 80 on KY 160 South about 10 miles to KY 15; turn right, follow KY 15 about 4 miles to Sassafras, follow signs as in Direction Number 1.
- 3. From Whitesburg, Kentucky, follow KY 15 West to Sassafras about 20 miles; follow signs as in Direction Number 1.
- 4. Accommodations for campers will be provided for and available on the building parking lot.

Friday, September 6, 1985 and the two following days

The Indian Bottom Association, being in session, assembled at our Association Building at Sassafras, Knott County, Kentucky, Friday, September 6, 1985 and the two following days. Being hosted by the Poor Fork, Hurricane Gap and New Bethlehem Churches, the Association met in the Congregational Department of the Association Building for preaching services. After uniting our voices in singing praises to our Lord and Master, Elder Ellis Adams introduced the service and led in prayer.

After the introduction and prayer had been rendered, Elder Marcus Combs, who had been chosen by the delegates of the eighty-ninth session of our Association to preach the Introductory Sermon of this, the ninetieth session, came to the pulpit and

preached a heart-warming sermon.

The delegates were dismissed from the congregation and asked to assemble in the Delegate Room. Then came forth Elder Elwood Cornett, our Moderator, who made a few remarks to the delegates and called upon Elder Paris Tackett to come to the pulpit. Elder Tackett rendered a very warm sermon. After a song, Elder Fon Bowling led in a very humble prayer.

The Association, now being assembled, was called to order by Elder Elwood Cornett, the Moderator, who called for the letters of our several churches that compose the Indian Bottom

Association.

1. A Motion was made, seconded, and passed with no objection, to read the letter of the Poor Fork Church. The letter was read by the clerk. By a move and second, with no objection, it was received along with all other church letters, as they were in regular form; the delegates were seated, and all requests and queries were referred to the Committee on Arrangements.

2. The Association was then organized by choosing the following officers:

- 3. The Moderator called for newly constituted churches desiring to take up fellowship with us and Mt. Zion Church presented a letter desiring fellowship in the Indian Bottom Association. The letter was read and by a move and second with no objection, the letter was received, the delegates seated, and the letter was referred to the Committee on Arrangements.
- 4. Churches of our same faith and order who desired fellowship were called for and none responded.
- 5. By a move and second with no objection, we omitted the reading of the Constitution and Rules of Decorum, but have them printed in the minutes. The Articles of Faith were read, and ordered to be printed in the Minutes.
- 6. The Moderator called for corresponding associations of our same faith and order who desired to correspond with us. The following associations responded with letters, a list of delegates, and files of minutes:

- 7. The Moderator called for transient members and ministers, and Elders Manus Ison, Clyde Shepherd, Jerry Caudill and Clifton Hampton responded.
- By a move and second with no objection, the Moderator was directed to make all temporary appointments.
- 9. The Moderator appointed a Committee on Ministry composed of one delegate from each church, with the entire delegation from the Poor Fork, Hurricane Gap and New Bethlehem Churches to arrange for preaching services for Friday afternoon and Saturday morning.
- 10. The Moderator appointed a Committee on Arrangements which was to be composed of one delegate from each church, together with the Association Moderator, Assistant Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, transients and the entire delegation from the corresponding associations to meet Friday afternoon at 2:00 p.m. to arrange the business for Saturday.

11. By a move and second with no objection, it was agreed to correspond with the following associations: New Salem, Union and Northern New Salem; and the Clerk was directed to prepare letters to same.

- 12. The Committee on Ministry made the following report for preaching services:

- 13. By a move and second with no objection, the Association adjourned until 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning.

The Committee on Arrangements met at 2:00 p.m. Friday afternoon in the Congregational Department of the Association Building. The session was introduced by Elder Woodrow Dye, who was well-blessed to bring up the service. Prayer was humbly rendered by Elder Paris Tackett. Elder John C. Layne was very humble in his discourse and received a good blessing, after which the Committee arranged the work for Saturday.

Saturday Morning

The Association met pursuant to adjournment. After singing praises to our Lord and Saviour, Elder Elwood Cornett, our Moderator, made a few remarks and called upon Elder Grover Adkins to come to the pulpit and introduce the service. Elder Adkins warmed our souls with words of wisdom, then he humbly led us in prayer.

- 1. The Clerk called the roll and marked the absentees.
- The report of the Committee on Arrangements was given by the clerk. The work was approved and the Committee was discharged by a move and a second with no objection.
- 3. The ministers chosen to preach on the stand were excused to go to the Congregational Department of the Association Building.
- 4. The Moderator appointed a Committee on Finance, to wit: Kirby Jent, E. Robert Miller, Roger Gibson, who reported a sum of \$3170.00 collected from various churches. By a move and second with no objection, the report was received and the Committee discharged.
- 5. By a move and second with no objection the minutes of this session of the Association were ordered to be printed. The Clerk was to be Secretary/Treasurer; he was to have 3,500 copies of the minutes printed; and he was to receive \$50.00 for his services.
- 6. By a move and second with no objection, the dates of the Union, Communion and Memorial Services are to be printed in the minutes.
- 7. The Circular Letter was read by Elder Cliff Hampton. There was a move and second with no objection to receive the letter and have it printed in our minutes.
- 8. The Committee on Ministry, being the same as on Friday, chose the following ministers to fill the stand on Sunday, to wit: Jimmy Hall, Paris Tackett, Baxter Osborne and Elwood Cornett.
 - B. The Committee on Ministry chose Elder Nelson Seals to preach the Introductory Sermon for the 1986 Session of the Association, and Elder Danny Dixon to be his alternate.

- C. The Committee on Ministry chose Elder Squire Watts to write a Circular Letter for approval next year.
- 9. By a move and second with no objection obituaries were ordered to be printed in the minutes with a \$10.00 fee for printing pictures.
- 10. The treasurer apologized for not having his report with him. By a move and second with no objection his apology was accepted and he was to have the report printed in the minutes. The report is as follows:

- 12. The ministers gave their reports on their attendance at Union Meetings and Associations. By a move and second with no objection their reports were received and they were excused for their failures.
- 13. The Committee on Council reported that they had met with the Mt. Zion Church who wanted fellowship in the Indian Bottom Association. They found their doctrine and practices to be orthodox and in line with ours and had taken them under watch-care until our Association met. By a move and second with no objection their report and work were received.
- 14. The letter from the Mt. Zion Church was read. After some discussion there was a move and second with no objection to receive the Mt. Zion Church into our Association and the delegates were given the right hand of fellowship.
- 15. There were identical requests from the Cedar Grove Church and Big Cowan Church. The requests are as follow:

Dear Brethren,

The Cedar Grove Church of Old Regular Baptist, having been seated in full love and fellowship, by move and second with no objection, sends the following request to the Indian Bottom Association:

The Cedar Grove Church of Old Regular Baptist requests that the Indian Bottom Association adopt the following:

The Indian Bottom Association believes in long hair on our Sisters, and short hair on our Brothers.

We believe the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the true written words of God and were given by inspiration of God and there is a sufficiency in them contained for our instruction

and they are the only rule of our faith and practice.

The Bible says: Doth not even nature itself teach you, that, if a man have long hair, it is a shame unto him? But if a woman have long hair, it is a glory to her: for her hair is given her for a covering. But if any man seem to be contentious, we have no such custom, neither the churches of God.

As an advisory council, we, the Indian Bottom Association, advise our churches that have members disobeying the scriptures

that they deal with them according to the scriptures.

Also, concerning whether we believe in Sisters wearing pants, slacks or shorts, we as an advisory council and not as a law-making body, say: To answer yes would be interpreted by some Brethren too liberally and they would say we have laid down the gate and opened the doors to anything and everything.

To answer no would be interpreted by some Brethren too strictly and they would say we have shut the door on everything and Committees would flow from Church to Church like water.

We believe the Indian Bottom Association should advise the churches to advise their members – both Brethren and Sisters – to dress soberly and modestly and to conduct themselves in such a manner that becometh a child of God. We believe that each child of God will adorn themselves in such a manner that they can easily be identified from the World. We feel the Bible, the infallible Word of God, sets forth and the Spirit will teach us how we should dress and conduct ourselves.

We believe that each church in the Indian Bottom Association holds the key to its own door and is the sole judge of the conduct of its members so long as they follow the orthodox principles of religion and keep up a Godly discipline according to the rules of the Gospel as laid down in the Scriptures. In fact, Article 4 of our constitution guarantees that the Association shall not infringe on any of the rights of any of the Churches in the union.

The Big Cowan Church has completed an audit of its members and as a result of that audit we have determined that our actual membership total is of now 52. Please accept and publish the revised total.

Request:

Asking you to reprint item 6, page 3, of your 1958

minutes, which reads as follows:

"In regard to the query from the Hurricane Gap Church, we wish to advise all our churches not to receive into your fellowship any woman with bobbed hair unless she agrees not to have it bobbed any more, and after you receive them to exclude from your fellowship all those who violate this agreement or continue to have their hair cut, and not to restore them back to fellowship, except by an experience of grace."

We, the Northern New Salem Association, ask the moderator of our sister, the Indian Bottom Association, to advise the moderators of your churches to advise their sisters with short hair and their brothers with long hair to adhere to the advice given and to comply with the 11th chapter of 1st Corinthians.

By a move and second with no objection Brother Carl Slone and Brother Ross Hill were appointed as trustees to replace Elder Danny Dixon and Brother John Preece.

Circular Letter 1985

Dear Brothers and Sisters of the Ninetieth Session of the Indian Bottom Association:

Having been chosen last year to write a circular letter for your consideration, I will try, by the help of God, to answer your request.

The subject uppermost in my mind and heart is, "You

must be born again."

In St. John, Chapter 3, Verse 3, Jesus told Nicodemus, "Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God."

As we read the 3rd chapter of St. John, we see that Nicodemus was confused at Jesus' words. For he was trying to understand spiritual things with the natural mind. (Corinthians - Chapter 2, Verse 14) But the natural man receiveth not the things of the Spirit of God, for they are foolishness unto him. Neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned.

But Jesus plainly tells Nicodemus that the flesh is one thing and the spirit is another. In First Peter - Chapter 1, Verse 23, He tells us that we are born again, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, by the word of God, which liveth and abideth

forever.

Now Brethren, I say unto you, this incorruptible seed, this word of God, is His son, Jesus. I say unto you, that through and by Him is the only way that man can be born again.

When John the Baptist came preaching in the wilderness, he preached, "Repent ye, for the kingdom of Heaven is at hand."

Matthew Chapter 3, Verse 1-8, tells us how the people of Jerusalem and Judea came unto John, and were baptized by him, confessing their sins. But some came, desiring baptism, whom John felt were not ready for his water baptism. These he would not baptize, but told them, "Bring forth therefore fruits meet for repentance."

John was baptizing with water unto repentance, and he spoke of One, who was to come, who was greater than he, who would baptize with the Holy Ghost and with fire. This baptism of the Holy Ghost and with fire is the essential baptism that

gives us a ticket to God's kingdom.

Matthew - Chapter 3, Verses 13 - 15) When Jesus came to John, to be baptized of him, John did not feel worthy. But rather, felt the need to be baptized of Him. Jesus said unto him, "Suffer it to be so now, for thus it becometh us to fulfill all righteousness."

On that day Jesus laid a pattern that He wanted His believing

children to follow.

Poor weak creatures that we are. When we reach the age of accountability, God puts His law in our hearts and teaches us that it is good to do good and wrong to do wrong. Then the Old Tempter comes along and we override the low, still voice in our hearts and do the things that are not right. Therefore we become a sinner. He that knows to do good and does it not, to him it is sin. And sin, when it is finished, brings death. Then we are dead in trespass and in sin. It is the soul that stands in need of a Savior

Now the Bible teaches us that repentance is required at the hands of all men. God has judged us all under sin that He might

have mercy upon us all.

John the Baptist tells us that Jesus will enlighten everyone that comes into the world (when we have become sinners), letting us see and understand what we are in His sight, how great our condemnation is. With His enlightening comes a fear of dying and going down to the lake that burns with fire and brimstone. The fear of God is the beginning of wisdom.

The choosing time has come. Choose you, this day, whom you will serve, whether it be God or mammon. You can't serve

two masters. You will cleave to one and hate the other.

I pray that all men and women would make the choice to seek God and serve Him. That all would become afflicted with a Godly sorrow. For sin, a Godly sorrow, worketh repentance to salvation not to be repented of.

If a man or woman makes the good choice with all their hearts, vow in their hearts to quit sinning, a measure of faith will be given them, that they might believe that God is, and is the rewarder of them that do diligently seek Him.

This same Jesus, who enlightened us, will teach the one,

who is under conviction, how to pray and what to pray for.

By being willing to be led by this loving spirit, He will lead us to where we need to go. Right down to the feet of Jesus, with our repentant hearts crying out to Him, "Oh Lord of Lords and King of Kings, save or I perish. I come to you with a broken heart and contrite spirit. Thy will be done with me all the rest of my life. If it be Thy will, let this body die, but save my soul."

This Holy Jesus will cleanse your soul with His cleansing blood, forgive you of your sins, baptize you with the Holy Ghost and with fire. Then you have been born again. An heir of God,

and joint heir with Christ in His kingdom.

Then, having received the gift of Eternal Life, I believe that all who feel that the Lord has given rest to their souls, should go home to their friends and tell what great things the Lord has done for them. If you keep the vow that you made to the Lord, you will. And demand the water baptism, to answer a good conscious toward God. ARTICLES OF FAITH

1. We believe in the one true and living God, and not withstanding there are Three that bear record in Heaven, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, yet there is but one in substance, equal in power and glory, not to be divided and impossible to change in principle and practice.

2. We believe the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the true written words of God and were given by inspiration of God and there is a sufficiency in them contained for our instruction and they are the only rule of our faith and

practice.

3. We believe the doctrine of original sin and that man sinned

since the fall and are by nature the children of wrath.

4. We believe in the impotency or inability of men to recover themselves out of the state they are in: therefore, a Savior is absolutely needed.

. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God

only by imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.

6. We believe in the perseverance of the Saints. That by grace through faith they are born again and adopted into the family of Heaven; that they will become equal heirs with Jesus Christ in Glory, and that He will raise them up at the last day.

17. None of the above articles shall be altered without legal notice and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The Association shall open and close with prayer.

2. The Moderator and Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk, shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

3. Only one members shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator when he is about to speak.

4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the Moderator until he is done.

5. He shall strictly adhere to his subject and in nowise reflect on the preceding speaker, but define his ideas on the proposition for debate, so far as he can.

6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the same.

7. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any subject without permission from the Association.

8. No member of the Association shall have the liberty to laugh during the sitting of the same, nor whisper in time of public speech.

9. No member shall address another in any other form or term than that of "Brother."

10. The Moderator shall not interrupt a brother or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his views on the subject unless he shall violate the Rules of Decorum.

11. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk, and called as often as the Association my require.

12. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided, in which event he shall give the deciding vote.

13. Any member who shall willfully and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reprimanded by the Association as it may think proper.

CONSTITUTION

Having by unanimous voice changed our organization from an annual meeting to an Association, we therefore propose to keep order and rules of an Association according to the following form of government.

- The Association shall be called the Indian Bottom Associ-
- The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our union, and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who shall be members whom they judge best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their respective churches, certifying to their appointment, these shall be entitled to a seat.

In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their full number in fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, restoration, application, dismissed, excluded and deceased since our last Association.

The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord over God's heritage nor shall they have any clerical power over the churches nor shall they infringe on any of the rights of any of the churches in the union.

The Association, when convened, shall be governed by a

regular and proper decorum.

The Association shall have a Moderator and Assistant Moderator, Clerk and Assistant Clerk, and Treasurer, who shall

be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.

New churches may be admitted to this union, which shall petition by letter and delegates, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association, and manifested by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

Every church in the union shall be entitled to representation

in the Association.

Every query presented by the churches to the Association, being first debated in their own church, shall come under the consideration of the Association.

10. Every motion made and seconded shall be considered by the Association, except it be withdrawn by the party who made

it.

- 11. We think it absolutely necessary that we have an Association fund for defraying the expense of the same. For the raising of which we think it the duty of each church in the union to contribute such sums voluntarily as they think proper, and send it by their delegates, to be deposited with treasurer, who shall be responsible to the Association for, and pay the same out as the Association may direct.
- 12. There shall be an Association book kept in which the proceedings of every Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary, who shall receive annual compensation for same.
- 13. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the Association rises.
- 14. Amendments to this plan of government may be made by majority of the union when in regular session, when so desired.
- 15. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of the Association, the best methods of effecting the same shall be determined by the Association.
- 16. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of the majority of the members present.
- 17. The Association shall have the power to decide for the general union of the churches and to preserve an inviolable chain of communion among same, giving churches all necessary advice in matters of church difficulty; inquiring into the cause why any church shall have failed to represent itself any time in the Association, appropriate the money received to any purpose it may think proper; appoint any member or members by their consent to transact any business which it may think necessary; withdraw from any church in the union which may violate any of the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion; admit any orderly minister of our faith and order to a seat in the Association and adjourn to any time or place it may deem necessary.
