MINUTES OF THE ONE HUNDRED AND EIGHTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE INDIAN BOTTOM ASSOCIATION OF OLD REGULAR BAPTIST CHURCHES OF JESUS CHRIST FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 5, 2003 AND THE TWO FOLLOWING DAYS

The Indian Bottom Association, being in session, assembled at our association building at Sassafras, Knott County, Kentucky, on September 5, 2003 and the two following days. Hosted by the Blair Branch Church and co-hosted by the Reynolds Fork and Little Mary Churches, the association met in the congregational department of the association building for preaching services. After singing some old songs of Zion, Elder Billy Campbell introduced the service and led in prayer. Elder Ivan Amburgey followed with the introductory sermon.

The delegates were dismissed from the congregational department and asked to assemble in the delegate room. Elders Alonzo Mosley and Terry Bryant were appointed by the moderator to remain in the congregational department for preaching services. In the delegate room, Elder Elwood Cornett, the moderator, welcomed the delegates and called upon Elder Emory Caudill to introduce the session and Elder Homer Smith to lead in prayer. The Association, now being assembled, was called to order by Elder Elwood Cornett. He appointed a finance committee to wit: Brothers John Reedy, Darwin Gregory and Bryan Smith. He then called for the letters of the several churches that compose the Indian Bottom Association.

1. A motion was made, seconded, and passed with no objection, to read the letter of the Blair Branch Church. The letter was read by the clerk. By a move and second, with no objection, it was received, along with all other church letters, as they were in regular form; the delegates were seated and all requests and queries were referred to the Committee on Arrangements.

2. The Association was then organized by choosing the following officers:

Elder Elwood Cornett, Moderator Elder Jim Fields, Assistant Moderator Elder Don Pratt, Clerk/Treasurer Brother Bob Banks, Assistant Clerk

(The following brothers had been appointed to count the votes: Phillip Hicks, Estill Blair, and Freddy Watts.)

- 3. By a move and second, with no objection, the moderator was directed to make all temporary appointments.
- 4. The moderator appointed a Committee on Ministry composed of one delegate from each church with the entire delegations from the Blair Branch, Reynolds Fork and Little Mary Churches to arrange the preaching services for Friday afternoon and Saturday morning.
- 5. The moderator called for newly constituted churches desiring to take up fellowship with us. None responded.
- 6. Churches of our same faith and order who desired fellowship with us were called for. None responded.
- 7. By a move and second, with no objection, the reading of the Articles of Faith, the Rules of Decorum and the Constitution was omitted. All were directed to be printed in the minutes.
- 8. The moderator called for corresponding associations of our same faith and order who desired to correspond with us. None responded.
- 9. The moderator called for transient members and ministers and the following responded: Brothers Danny Dixon, Lonnie Sexton and Earl Mosley.

- 10. The Committee on Ministry made the following report for preaching services:
 - Friday afternoon: Brothers Theodore Looney and Feldon Ruggles, Jr.
 - Saturday morning: Brothers Frank Newsome, Arnold Bailey, Virgil Combs and Lonnie Gregory.
- 11. The moderator appointed a Committee on Arrangements composed of one delegate from each church, together with the association moderator, assistant moderator, clerk and assistant clerk.
- 12. A move and second, with no objection, were made for the Committee on Arrangements to meet on Friday afternoon at 1:30 p.m. to arrange the business for Saturday.
- 13. By a move and second, with no objection, the Association was adjourned until 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning. The singing will start in the congregational department at 9:30 a.m.

The Committee on Arrangements met at 1:30 p.m. on Friday afternoon in the congregational department of the association building. After singing, Brother Theodore Looney introduced the service and Brother Willie Crace, Jr. led in prayer. Brother Feldon Ruggles, Jr. then preached, after which the committee arranged the work for Saturday. Elder Charles Shepherd called dismission.

SATURDAY MORNING

The association met pursuant to adjournment. After singing some songs of Zion, Elder Elwood Cornett, our moderator, welcomed everyone and called upon Elder Bill Halcomb to introduce the session and Elder Layton Phipps to lead in prayer.

- 1. The clerk called the roll and marked the absentees.
- 2. The report of the Committee on Arrangements was given by the

clerk of the association. The report was approved by a move and second, with no objection, and the committee was discharged.

3. The ministers chosen to preach on the stand were excused to go to the congregational department of the association building.

Elder Elwood Cornett made the following remarks to the delegates of the association:

We are where we are by the grace of God. According to this year's church letters, we have baptized 65 people in our 43 churches. In 1979, my first year as moderator, we baptized 108 people in our 21 churches.

The scriptures command us to "do the work of an evangelist." We sometimes forget that what we are about as Christians is to do the work of an evangelist. We need to do more. What society accepts is not our guide and does not change the fact that right is right and wrong is wrong.

We must have peace and unity in our hearts and in and among our churches. Confusion and differences hinder the work of evangelists. We need to do the work of an evangelist in our own household and among our families.

To do the work of an evangelist, we must have the spirit of the living God. We must study, pray, look to God for understanding, and let love flow from our hearts. A Regular Baptist minister should be any neighbor's best friend. We must tell the truth in such a way that it will touch the world's heart and cause them to cherish our friendship. To do the work of an evangelist, we must keep ourselves unspotted from the world and bear the image of our Heavenly Father. This includes not meddling in worldly affairs, not dressing as the world, and not being involved in the world. Let's get closer to the Lord and therefore our people will desire to get closer to the Lord.

In conclusion, let's get our hearts aimed toward Heaven, the Lord is still in the saving business. Let's do the work of an evangelist.

- 4. The Committee on Finance reported a sum of \$8,940.00 collected from the various churches. By a move and second, with no objection, the report was received and the committee discharged.
- 5. By a move and second, with no objection, the minutes of this session of the association were ordered to be printed. The clerk is to be secretary/treasurer. According to the amount of money collected and the cost per minute, the clerk is to decide how many copies to have printed and distributed to each church.
- 6. By a move and second, with no objection, the dates of the union, communion and memorial services are to be printed in the minutes.
- 7. The circular letter was read by Elder H.B. Reedy, Jr., who had been chosen last year to write a circular letter for approval by the association this year. By a move and second, with no objection, the letter was received and ordered to be printed in the minutes.
- 8. A. The Committee on Ministry, being the same as on Friday, chose the following ministers to preach on Sunday, to wit:

 Elders Bob Amburgey, Danny Dixon, Jim Fields and Elwood Cornett.
 - B. The Committee on Ministry chose Elder Don Pratt to preach the introductory sermon for the 2004 session and Brother Feldon Ruggles, Jr. to be his alternate.
 - C. The Committee on Ministry chose Elder Elwood Cornett to write a circular letter for approval next year.
- 9. By a move and second, with no objection, obituaries are to be printed in the minutes. They are to be typed and double spaced.
- 10. The treasurer's report was given. By a move and second, with no objection, the report was received and ordered to be printed in the minutes. The report is as follows:

- 12. By a move and second, with no objection, it was agreed to correct an omission in the 2002 minutes and include last year's move and second, with no objection, to appoint Elder Roger Gibson as an Indian Bottom Association Building Trustee in the 2003 minutes.
- 13. There was no report from the Committee on Council because no official meeting was conducted during the past year. Elder Elwood Cornett, our moderator, appointed the same members to serve another year as the Committee on Council. These brothers are: Elwood Cornett, Frank Newsome, Ivan Amburgey, Homer Smith, Feldon Ruggles, Jr., Toby Breeding, and Danny Dixon.
- 14. The request of Item 16 of our 2002 Association was read by the clerk. By a move and second, with no objection, it was agreed to print the church maps in the 2003 Association minutes.
- 15. The request from the Cedar Grove Church to host the 2004 Association was read and a verbal request to co-host was made by the Big Leatherwood Church. By a move and second, with no objection, the requests were granted. The Friendship and Big Creek Churches also made verbal requests to co-host the 2004 Association. By a move and second, with no objection, the requests were granted.
- 16. The request from the Kingdom Come Church to remove the name of Bert Fields from the list of ordained ministers was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 17. The requests from the Big Cowan and Little Bethlehem Churches to include the dates and times of appointed church meetings in the 2003 minutes were read. By a move and second, with no objection, the requests were granted.
- 18. The request from the Little Mary Church to change the current orders to expand the list of associations from which we can re-

ceive members by recommendation under the church watch care to include all churches that can trace their heritage to the Burning Springs Association of United Baptists was read. After discussion, a move and second was made to grant the request. An objection was filed and the delegates voted, by standing vote, to deny the request.

- 19. The request from the Little Bethlehem Church to remove the name of Bordes Slone from the list of ordained ministers was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 20. The request from the Summertown Church to change their memorial meeting from the 2nd Sunday in May to the 2nd Sunday in June was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 21. By a move and second, with no objection, the clerks were directed to write a tribute to the deceased ministers of the Indian Bottom Association.
- 22. By a move and second, with no objection, the clerks were directed to write a resolution of appreciation to the building trustees and volunteers for the work on the Association Building, especially recognizing the efforts of Brothers Roger Gibson and Emory Caudill.
- 23. By a move and second, with no objection, the clerks were directed to write a resolution of appreciation to the Blair Branch, Reynolds Fork and Little Mary Churches for hosting the 2003 session of the Indian Bottom Association.
- 24. There was a move and second, with no objection, to have services at the association building on the following odd-Sundays: November 30, February 1, May 30 and August 1.

- 25. By a move and second, with no objection, the minutes of the 2003 session of the Indian Bottom Association were accepted without being read and ordered printed in the minutes.
- 26. By a move and second, with no objection, we adjourned until the 2004 session of the Indian Bottom Association convenes on Friday, September 3, 2004. The moderator called on Elder Lonnie Gregory to lead us in the closing prayer.

SUNDAY

A large congregation gathered at the association building on the last day of the one hundred and eighth session of the Indian Bottom Association. After lifting our voices in the beautiful sounds of the age-old songs of Zion, Elder Elwood Cornett, the moderator, welcomed the congregation and called upon Elder Bob Amburgey to introduce the services and lead in prayer. He was blessed to preach upon the goodness of the Lord and the need for all sinners to repent. He was followed by Elder Danny Dixon. Elder Danny preached of the need for God's people to stand up and be counted and to put on the whole armor of God. Amid much shouting, rejoicing, and preaching by many brothers, the services came to a close. Elder Don Pratt led in the prayer of dismission, bringing to an end the 2003 session of the Indian Bottom Association.

CIRCULAR LETTER

Dear Brethren:

After many prayers, much meditation, and several failed attempts, this is my offering as the circular letter, for your consideration. Let us consider where we have been, where we are today and in which direction we intend to travel in the future.

The Holy Bible is the foundation of our beginning, from which the founding fathers established our Constitution, Articles of Faith, and Rules of Decorum. From these documents our doctrines were defined, our practices were established, we were given a direction in which to travel, and the old brothers were not moved from that foundation.

Our beginning has been reviewed and defined by our recently compiled book of operations. It is a very necessary, but imperfect representation intended as a guide for an imperfect people. Included in that book was a statement of our doctrines. We studied and restated those without compromising the principles of why we have each one. An agreement came into being, which evaluated the line of intended travel. The Constitution, Articles of Faith and Rules of Decorum are the platform of our foundation and these were considered to be sound.

The future of our doctrines, practices and direction seems to be of no concern to some. Others would have us believe the founding fathers built our foundation void of debate and continued questioning. From the beginning of time there have been challenges to rule and order. God forbid that we should want to omit order and discipline from our churches. Even by observing society we understand that a lack of order undermines discipline, thereby promoting chaos.

There are those among us who would remove the very foundation from which we were established, deleting any similarities brought from our past, the ancient landmarks.

I am dismayed and grievously concerned by what I have observed. Lined congregational singing is from our beginning, but it is gradually being replaced by men and women individually singing songs which do not praise, honor, or lift up Jesus. There is tolerance of behavior unbecoming a Christian. Preaching of unsound doctrines is not being challenged. Those individuals and the Moderators who allow such conduct and preaching should be called before the "Committee on Council" to explain why these are not dealt with, severely.

We are taught in Titus 2:6,7,8 and 11-15, "Young men likewise exhort to be sober minded. In all things shewing thyself a pattern of good works; in doctrine shewing uncorruptness, gravity, sincerity, sound speech that cannot be condemned; that he that is of the contrary part may be ashamed, having no evil thing to say to you. For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, Teaching us that denying ungodliness and worldly lust, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world; Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ; Who gave himself for us, that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works. These things speak, and exhort, and rebuke with all authority. Let no man despise thee."

Jesus stated in Mark 16:16, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved."

Paul wrote in Romans 10:9,10 and 11, "That if thou shall confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shall believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation. For the scripture saith, whosoever believeth on him shall not be ashamed."

Luke quoted Paul's preaching in Acts 2:38, "Repent and be baptized."

This is the example Jesus gave unto us, Matthew 3:13 and 15, "Then cometh Jesus from Galilee to Jordan unto John, to be baptized of him. Suffer it to be so now; for thus it becometh us to fulfill all righteousness. Then he suffered him."

Is it really as it appears? As though the worldly feeling of some members is; to dress as the world, talk as the world, and behave as the world, affects nobody, but me. Is there no thought for bringing reproach upon Jesus Christ and the church? Or is the challenge to see just how far one can stray from Christ like conduct?

Moderators and deacons remember your duties, as we are instructed in II Thessalonians 3:6, "Now we command you, brethren, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that ye withdraw yourselves from every brother (and sister) that walketh disorderly." Is this an expected response? "I don't want to hurt anyone's feelings. I will surely be unpopular, now." Is this a popularity contest? It absolutely is not! Shall we ignore the very obvious? God is not mocked! How long will we sit idly by and do nothing?

The lottery and bingo are a hoax perpetrated upon our people by Satan and legislatures of this nation. Gambling is still a sin and God is not pleased.

These statements and questions are about godly and orderly conduct, and not being afraid to take proper corrective action. Let us behold our face in the mirror and know whom we see. God, please, help us to forget about numbers on our rolls, but bless us instead to be fervently and effectually aware of our need for orderliness, righteousness and godliness in your house. She has left to mourn three sons, Charles Jr., Earl Keith and Gary Reffitt. She also had two daughters, Debra Black and Anita Reffitt.



RAY ROARK



ARTICLES OF FAITH

- 1. We believe in the one true and living God, and not withstanding there are Three that bear record in Heaven, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, yet there is but one in substance, equal in power and glory, not to be divided and impossible to change in principle and practice.
- 2. We believe the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the true written words of God and were given by inspiration of God and there is a sufficiency in them contained for our instruction and they are the only rule of our faith and practice.
- 3. We believe the doctrine of original sin, and that man sinned since the fall, and that men are by nature the children of wrath.
- 4. We believe in the impotency or inability of men to recover themselves out of the state they are in; therefore, a Savior is absolutely needed.
- 5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.
- 6. We believe in the perseverance of the Saints. That by grace through faith they are born again and adopted into the family of Heaven; that they will become equal heirs with Jesus Christ in glory, and that He will raise them up at the last day.
- 7. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Gospel Ordinances; that true believers are the proper subjects and we admit no other.
- 8. We believe that the true mode of baptism is by immersion, to baptize a person by their own consent, back foremost in the water, in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost.

- 9. We believe that washing of one another's feet is a commandment of Christ, left on record with His disciples, and ought to be practiced by His followers.
- 10. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgment when all will be judged according to their deeds done in the body.
- 11. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal after death.
- 12. We believe that no one has the right to administer the Gospel Ordinances but such as are legally ordained and qualified there unto.
- 13. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to attend church meetings, and that it is the duty of the church to deal with them for neglecting same.
- 14. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to contribute to the support of the church by defraying all reasonable expenses of same, never neglecting the poor, according to their several abilities.
- 15. We believe that any doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge the people in their sins or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving grace in Christ for salvation is erroneous and such doctrine will be rejected by us.
- 16. None of the above articles shall be construed as to hold with particular election or reprobation as to make God partial directly or indirectly so as to injure children of man.
- 17. None of the above articles shall be altered without legal notice and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall open and close with prayer.
- 2. The moderator and assistant moderator, clerk and assistant clerk, shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- 3. Only one member shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the moderator when he is about to speak.
- 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the moderator until he is done.
- 5. He shall strictly adhere to his subject and in no wise reflect on the preceding speaker, but define his ideas on the proposition for debate, so far as he can.
- 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the same.
- 7. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any subject without permission from the Association.
- 8. No member of the Association shall have the liberty to laugh during the sitting of the same, nor whisper in time of public speech.
- 9. No member shall address another in any other form or term than that of "Brother."
- 10. The moderator shall not interrupt a brother or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his views on the subject unless he shall violate the Rules of Decorum.
- 11. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the clerk, and called as often as the Association may require.
- 12. The moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided, in which event he shall give the deciding vote.
- 13. Any member who shall willfully and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reprimanded by the Association as it may think proper.

CONSTITUTION

Having by unanimous voice changed our organization from an annual meeting to an Association, we therefore propose to keep order and rules of an Association according to the following form of government:

- 1. The Association shall be called the Indian Bottom Association.
- 2. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our union, and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who shall be members whom they judge best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their respective churches, certifying to their appointment, these shall be entitled to a seat.
- 3. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their full number in fellowship; those baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed by letter, excluded and deceased since our last Association.
- 4. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord over God's heritage, nor shall they have any clerical power over the churches, nor shall they infringe on any of the rights of any of the churches in the union.
- 5. The Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum.
- 6. The Association shall have a moderator and assistant moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, and treasurer, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- 7. New churches may be admitted to this union, which shall petition by letter and delegates, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association, and manifested by the moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.
- 8. Every church in the union shall be entitled to representation in the Association.
- 9. Every query presented by the churches to the Association, being first debated in their own church, shall come under the consideration of the Association.
- 10. Every motion made and seconded shall be considered by the

- Association, except it be withdrawn by the party who made it.
- 11. We think it absolutely necessary that we have an Association fund for defraying the expense of the same. For the raising of which we think it the duty of each church in the Union to contribute such sums voluntarily as they think proper, and send it by their delegates, to be deposited with the treasurer, who shall be responsible to the Association, and pay same out, as the Association may firect.
- 12. There shall be an Association book kept in which the proceedings of ever Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary, who shall receive annual compensation for same.
- 13. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the moderator and clerk before the Association rises.
- 14. Amendments to this plan of government may be made by majority of the union when in regular session, when so desired.
- 15. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of the Association; the best method of effecting the same shall be determined by the Association.
- 16. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of the majority of the members present.
- 17. The Association shall have the power to decide for the general union of the churches and to preserve an inviolable chain of communion among same, giving churches all necessary advice in matters of church difficulty; inquiring into the cause why any church shall have failed to represent itself any time in the Association; appropriate the money received to any purpose it may think proper; appoint any member or members by their consent to transact any business which it may think necessary; withdraw from any church in the union which may violate any of the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion; admit any orderly minister of our faith and order to a seat in the Association and adjourn to any time or place it may deem necessary.


