

MINUTES OF THE ONE HUNDRED AND TENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE INDIAN BOTTOM ASSOCIATION OF OLD REGULAR BAPTIST CHURCHES OF JESUS CHRIST FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 2, 2005 AND THE TWO FOLLOWING DAYS

The Indian Bottom Association, being in session, assembled at our association building at Sassafras, Knott County, Kentucky, on September 2, 2005 and the two following days. Hosted by the Tolson Creek Church and co-hosted by the New Home, Dixon Memorial, Chester Hogg Memorial, and Big Cowan Churches, the association met in the congregational department of the association building for preaching services. After singing some old songs of Zion, Elder Alonzo Mosley introduced the service and led in prayer. Elder Toby Breeding followed with the introductory sermon.

The delegates were excused from the congregational department and asked to assemble in the delegate room. Brothers James Caudill, Jim Blankenship and Squire Watts were appointed by the moderator to remain in the congregational department for preaching services. In the delegate room, Elder Elwood Cornett, the moderator, welcomed the delegates and called upon Elder Harvey Creech to introduce the session and lead in prayer. The Association, now being assembled, was called to order by Elder Elwood Cornett. He appointed a finance committee to wit: Brothers John Reedy, Jimmy Bailey and Billy Campbell. He then called for the letters of the several churches that compose the Indian Bottom Association.

1. A motion was made, seconded, and passed with no objection, to read the letter of the Tolson Creek Church. The letter was read by the clerk of the Association. By a move and second, with no objection, the letter was received, along with all other church letters, as they were in regular form. By a move and second, with no objection, the delegates were seated and all requests and queries were referred to the Committee on Arrangements. Also, the

Rock of Ages Church, which had not sent a letter, was referred to the Committee on Arrangements.

2. The Association was then organized by choosing the following officers:

Elder Elwood Cornett, Moderator Elder Jim Fields, Assistant Moderator Elder Don Pratt, Clerk/Treasurer Brother Bob Banks, Assistant Clerk

(The following brothers had been appointed to count the votes: Freddy Watts, Curtis Caudill and David O'Quinn.)

- 3. By a move and second, with no objection, the moderator was directed to make all temporary appointments.
- 4. The moderator appointed a Committee on Ministry composed of all of the delegates from the Tolson Creek Church and one delegate from each of the other churches to arrange the preaching services for Friday afternoon and Saturday morning.
- 5. The moderator called for newly constituted churches desiring to take up fellowship with us. None responded.
- 6. Churches of our same faith and order who desired fellowship with us were called for. The Association clerk read the letter from the Caney Fork Church and Elwood Cornett, our moderator, discussed the visit to the church by the Committee on Council. By a move and second, with no objection, the delegates were seated and the church letter was referred to the Committee on Arrangement.
- By a move and second, with no objection, the reading of the Articles of Faith, the Rules of Decorum and the Constitution was omitted. All were directed to be printed in the minutes.
- The moderator called for corresponding associations of our same faith and order who desired to correspond with us. None responded.

- The moderator called for transient members and ministers and the following responded: Brothers Gary Mosley, David O'Quinn and Alonzo Mosley.
- 10. The Committee on Ministry made the following report for preaching services:

Friday afternoon: Brothers Frank Newsome and

Bill Halcomb.

Saturday morning: Brothers William McClanahan,

Theodore Looney,

Feldon Ruggles, Jr., and

Ross Wright.

- 11. The moderator appointed a Committee on Arrangements composed of one delegate from each church, together with the association moderator, assistant moderator, clerk and assistant clerk.
- 12. A move and second, with no objection, was made for the Committee on Arrangements to meet on Friday afternoon at 1:30 p.m. to arrange the business for Saturday.
- 13. By a move and second, with no objection, the Association was adjourned until 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning. The singing will start in the congregational department at 9:30 a.m.

The Committee on Arrangements met at 1:30 p.m. on Friday afternoon in the congregational department of the association building. After singing, Elder Jack Varney led in prayer. Elder Frank Newsome then preached, after which the committee arranged the work for Saturday. Brother Roy Slone called dismission.

SATURDAY MORNING

The association met pursuant to adjournment. After singing some songs of Zion, Elder Elwood Cornett, our moderator, welcomed everyone and called upon Elder Jim Fields to introduce the session and Elder Don Pratt led in prayer.

- 1. The clerk called the roll and marked the absentees.
- The report of the Committee on Arrangements was given by the clerk of the association. The report was approved by a move and second, with no objection, and the committee was discharged.
- 3. The ministers chosen to preach on the stand were excused to go to the congregational department of the association building.
- The Committee on Finance reported a sum of \$9,125.00 collected from the various churches. By a move and second, with no objection, the report was received and the committee discharged.
- 5. By a move and second, with no objection, the minutes of this session of the association were ordered to be printed. The clerk is to be secretary/treasurer. According to the amount of money collected and the cost per minute, the clerk is to decide how many copies to have printed and distributed to each church.
- 6. By a move and second, with no objection, the dates of the union, communion and memorial services and appointed meetings are to be printed in the minutes.
- 7. The circular letter was read by Elder Ellis Adams, who had been chosen last year to write a circular letter for consideration by the association this year. By a move and second, with no objection, the letter was received and ordered to be printed in the minutes.
- 8. A. The Committee on Ministry, being the same as on Friday, chose the following ministers to preach on Sunday, to wit: Elders Elwood Cornett, Jim Fields, and Don Pratt.
 - B. The Committee on Ministry chose Elder Milburn Slone to preach the introductory sermon for the 2006 session and Elder Emory Caudill to be his alternate.
 - C. The Committee on Ministry chose Brother Coy Tolliver to write a circular letter for consideration next year.

- By a move and second, with no objection, obituaries are to be printed in the minutes. Obituaries may be given to the clerks at any time during the year. They are to be typed and may be on paper or a computer disk (MS Word).
- 10. The treasurer's report was given by the clerk of the Association. By a move and second, with no objection, the report was received and ordered to be printed in the minutes. The report is as follows:

- 12. Elder Elwood Cornett, our moderator, appointed Ellis Adams, Merle Caudill, Virgil Combs, Roger Gibson, Carl Slone, Howard Owens and Elwood Cornett to serve another year as the Committee on Council.
- 13. The request from the Little Dove Church to host the 2006 Association and the request from the Bethlehem Church to co-host the 2006 Association were read. By a move and second, with no objection, the requests were granted. The Happy Home and Little Zion Churches made verbal requests to co-host the 2006 Association. By a move and second, with no objection, the requests were granted.
- 14. The request from the Pilgrims Home Church to change their regular monthly meeting time from the first Saturday and Sunday of each month to the second Saturday and Sunday of each month was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 15. The request from the Mount Olivet Church to change their memorial meeting time from the first Sunday in July to the first Sunday in June was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.

- Church and the minutes of the Church were read by the described on the history of the Canes For Church were given the right hand of fellowship.
- 17. Elder Elwood Comen, our moderator, discussed the reason that the Rock of Ages Church fill not send a letter to the Indian Bottom Association. By a move and second, with no objection, Brother Anthony Hagerman, a member of the Rock of Ages Church, was allowed to emplain the decision of the church to leave the Indian Bottom Association. Brother Hagerman explained that the church fielt this would create an opportunity for additional support from the churches in the area. By a move and second, with no objection, it was decided to remove the Rock of Ages Church as a member of the Indian Bottom Association and to allow it's members to become members of our churches by recommendation, if they so request.
- 18. By a move and second, with no objection, the clerks were directed to write a tribute to the ministers of the Indian Bottom Association that have deceased since the 2004 session.
- 19. Elder Elwood Cornett reported the completed construction of the elevator for the association building.
- 20. Brother Elwood Cornett reported that the association website was set up and may be accessed at www.oldregularbaptist.com.
- 21. By a move and second, with no objection, the clerks were directed to write a resolution of appreciation to the Tolson Creek, New Home, Dixon Memorial, Chester Hogg Memorial and Big Cowan Churches for hosting the 2005 session of the Indian Bottom Association and to Brothers Emory Caudill, Phillip Hicks,

- and Billy Campbell for their generous contribution of time and effort in the installation of the elevator.
- 22. There was a move and second, with no objection, to have services at the association building on the following odd-Sundays: October 30, January 1, April 30 and July 30; and at 7:00 p.m. on the Friday night of the Association.
- 23. By a move and second, with no objection, the minutes of the 2005 session of the Indian Bottom Association were accepted without being read and ordered printed in the minutes.
- 24. By a move and second, with no objection, we adjourned until the 2006 session of the Indian Bottom Association convenes on September 1, 2006. The moderator called on Elder Ivan Amburgey to lead us in the closing prayer.

SUNDAY

A faithful congregation of brothers, sisters and friends gathered at the association building for the final meeting of the one hundred and tenth session of the Indian Bottom Association. After singing some of the old songs of Zion, Elder Elwood Cornett, the moderator, welcomed the congregation and called upon Elder Emory Caudill to introduce the services and lead in prayer. He was followed by Elder Don Pratt and Elder Jim Fields. Elder Elwood Cornett then came forth and preached, bringing the meeting to a close. Elder Terry Bryant led in the prayer of dismission, thus ending the 2005 session of the Indian Bottom Association.

in death. Our Dad was born on April 4, 1913, near what is now the Dickenson-Buchanan County line on the left side of Greenbrier Creek. and passed away on October 3, 1992 at Buchanan General Hospital. Grundy, Virginia. Dad never received an accurate date of his birth. Some say he was older than his birth date indicated. He was orphaned at an early age. First, his mother died when he was four years old. and his father died a few years later. After this, his grandparents and other family members reared him. He told of his hardships, which included scarcity of clothing and shoes. Hard work and many chores were a way of life for our Dad as he grew up. Also, he told us of hiding in a haystack outside a church house, along with his brother. Basil, so they could hear the preaching and singing. They did not want to be seen because they "didn't have church clothes," and didn't want to go in their "hand-me-downs." The haystack became their refuge so they could hear the church services. These two little boys later became preachers.

On June 21, 1932, Evans (our Dad), and Altia Deel were married. They were blessed with eleven children. All grew into adulthood and have families of their own. One son, Willoughby, preceded Dad in death. Daddy leaves his wife, Altia; five sons, Johnny, Hanford, Everette, Arnold, and Leo; five daughters, Mable, Pansy, Pearley, Donna, and Connie; and sixteen grandchildren and eight great-grand children.

Daddy loved our mother and all his children, as we loved him. He was proud of our accomplishments, as we were his. We feel one

Coal mining played a major role in his life. He was a retired coal miner, who had spent around 40 years in both working and operating mines. Dad was also involved in various other endeavors to earn living. These included sawmills, timbering, general country stores, arming, and livestock raising. He worked long, hard days and did indeed follow the Biblical quote, which says, "Earn a living by the sweat of your brows."

In 1945, Daddy became a member of the Pilgrim's Home Church Prater, Virginia, and remained a faithful servant and contributor forty-seven years.

We want to share with you Daddy's experience of being saved, she has shared with us.

The following is an excerpt in his exact words which was pubshed in a Circular Letter in the Minutes of the Mountain Liberty Association in 1981:

"I feel that thirty some years ago, the Lord saved my soul. Not gainst my will, but when I desired to be saved with all my heart. I mew I was lost unless God saved me, because I could not do it myself. The sweetest day I have ever seen was when I felt the Lord forgive me of all of my sins. I remember at the time I was loading to all in the mine with Brother Marvin Hill. I remember wondering if he was paying any attention to me. I do not know if he remembers it mot but he said, "You are looking better." I replied, "I feel better." Praise the Lord."

Daddy was one of the original charter members of the Pilgrim's Home Church. He was instrumental in the construction of the first wooden frame building of the Pilgrim's Home Church. He helped build the present day cinder block building at this site when the first building needed to be torn down and replaced.

We would like to also note, he helped with supporting, organizing, and building of other Old Regular Baptist churches in various other surrounding areas.

Daddy served as the moderator of the Pilgrim's Home Church, at Prater, Virginia and later, when his health began to fail, he was named the honorary moderator of the church. Also, he served as a modera-

tor, and later honorary assistant moderator, of the [original] Mountain Liberty Association.

Daddy was ordained to preach in 1947, and in keeping with the practices of the Old Regular Baptist, he would travel to other churches in his own community, as well as surrounding states, where he helped deliver the messages of the Lord and comfort many in times of sorrow.

Daddy, and his brother, Elder Basil Bailey, traveled together on many trips to preach the gospel in churches. They were brothers in the flesh and spirit who maintained a close bond in life, and now are together in the Heavenly paradise.

Our Dad stood for the right things in life, and especially for following the teachings of the Bible. As a result of his steadfast stand, he suffered criticism and persecution from some who were not blessed with full enlightenment. However, our Dad was endowed with humility and forgiveness that was deeply engrained in his nature.

For years Dad was in declining health and had to be hospitalized several times, but he continued attending church. In fact, he preached the introductory sermon for the Mountain Liberty Association meeting on September 6, 1992, at the Little Freedom Church. This was his last sermon, and he delivered it while seated in a chair.

During the last month of his life, Daddy spent 22 days in the hospital, and there he spoke with one of his daughters, Connie, concerning his life. He spoke of many things of the past, but he particularly wanted her to tell everyone, when his obituary was written, that he had many struggles in serving the Lord. Prayer was a part of his life, as he had prayed all his life for guidance, help and forgiveness.

We feel Daddy's prayers were answered, and what he strived for in life was to be an example for others in the redemption of souls, which otherwise might have been lost.

There is great sadness in the loss of our Dad. However, if we may borrow a quote from a cousin who sums up our feelings quite adequately, we would say: "Remember he will live on with you forever. You will be quoting his sayings, thinking of his teachings, and missing him." So we are thankful for our memories of a father who was firm in his faith to God.

We will remember the words of wisdom that he gave us to live






ROBERT H. COOK





before leaving this world to go home to be with the Lord.





Mom, we miss and love you so much. We are so proud that both you and Dad "walked the walk as well as talked the talk."



He retired in 1998 after 30 years with Rockwell International.



She would cut, paste and copy special words and wishes. Each card was made and signed with love. She got in a little trouble though when she managed to get some postage stamps and started mailing things on her own.



ARTICLES OF FAITH

- We believe in the one true and living God, and not withstanding there are Three that bear record in Heaven, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, yet there is but one in substance, equal in power and glory, not to be divided and impossible to change in principle and practice.
- 2. We believe the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the true written words of God and were given by inspiration of God and there is a sufficiency in them contained for our instruction and they are the only rule of our faith and practice.
- 3. We believe the doctrine of original sin, and that man sinned since the fall, and that men are by nature the children of wrath.
- 4. We believe in the impotency or inability of men to recover themselves out of the state they are in; therefore, a Savior is absolutely needed.
- 5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.
- 6. We believe in the perseverance of the Saints. That by grace through faith they are born again and adopted into the family of Heaven; that they will become equal heirs with Jesus Christ in glory, and that He will raise them up at the last day.
- 7. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Gospel Ordinances; that true believers are the proper subjects and we admit no other.
- 8. We believe that the true mode of baptism is by immersion, to baptize a person by their own consent, back foremost in the water, in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost.
- 9. We believe that washing of one another's feet is a commandment of Christ, left on record with His disciples, and ought to be practiced by His followers.
- 10. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgment when all will be judged according to their deeds done in the body.
- 11. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal after death.

- 12. We believe that no one has the right to administer the Gospel Ordinances but such as are legally ordained and qualified there unto.
- 13. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to attend church meetings, and that it is the duty of the church to deal with them for neglecting same.
- 14. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to contribute to the support of the church by defraying all reasonable expenses of same, never neglecting the poor, according to their several abilities.
- 15. We believe that any doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge the people in their sins or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving grace in Christ for salvation is erroneous and such doctrine will be rejected by us.
- 16. None of the above articles shall be construed as to hold with particular election or reprobation as to make God partial directly or indirectly so as to injure children of man.
- 17. None of the above articles shall be altered without legal notice and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall open and close with prayer.
- 2. The moderator and assistant moderator, clerk and assistant clerk, shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- 3. Only one member shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the moderator when he is about to speak.
- 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the moderator until he is done.
- 5. He shall strictly adhere to his subject and in no wise reflect on the preceding speaker, but define his ideas on the proposition for debate, so far as he can.
- 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the same.
- 7. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any subject without permission from the Association.
- 8. No member of the Association shall have the liberty to laugh during the sitting of the same, nor whisper in time of public
- 9. No member shall address another in any other form or term than that of "Brother."
- 10. The moderator shall not interrupt a brother or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his views on the subject unless he shall violate the Rules of Decorum.
- 11. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the clerk, and called as often as the Association may require.
- 12. The moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided, in which event he shall give the deciding vote.
- 13. Any member who shall willfully and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reprimanded by the Association as it may think proper.

CONSTITUTION

Having by unanimous voice changed our organization from an annual meeting to an Association, we therefore propose to keep order and rules of an Association according to the following form of government:

- 1. The Association shall be called the Indian Bottom Association.
- 2. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our union, and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who shall be members whom they judge best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their respective churches, certifying to their appointment, these shall be entitled to a seat.

- 3. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their full number in fellowship; those baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed by letter, excluded and deceased since our last Association.
- 4. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord over God's heritage, nor shall they have any clerical power over the churches, nor shall they infringe on any of the rights of any of the churches in the union.
- 5. The Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum.
- 6. The Association shall have a moderator and assistant moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, and treasurer, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- 7. New churches may be admitted to this union, which shall petition by letter and delegates, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association, and manifested by the moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.
- 8. Every church in the union shall be entitled to representation in the Association.
- Every query presented by the churches to the Association, being first debated in their own church, shall come under the consideration of the Association.
- 10. Every motion made and seconded shall be considered by the

Association, except it be withdrawn by the party who made it.

- 11. We think it absolutely necessary that we have an Association fund for defraying the expense of the same. For the raising of which we think it the duty of each church in the Union to contribute such sums voluntarily as they think proper, and send it by their delegates, to be deposited with the treasurer, who shall be responsible to the Association, and pay same out, as the Association may direct.
- 12. There shall be an Association book kept in which the proceedings of every Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary, who shall receive annual compensation for same.
- 13. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the moderator and clerk before the Association rises.
- 14. Amendments to this plan of government may be made by majority of the union when in regular session, when so desired.
- 15. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of the Association; the best method of effecting the same shall be determined by the Association.
- 16. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of the majority of the members present.
- 17. The Association shall have the power to decide for the general union of the churches and to preserve an inviolable chain of communion among same, giving churches all necessary advice in matters of church difficulty; inquiring into the cause why any church shall have failed to represent itself any time in the Association; appropriate the money received to any purpose it may think proper; appoint any member or members by their consent to transact any business which it may think necessary; withdraw from any church in the union which may violate any of the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion; admit any orderly minister of our faith and order to a seat in the Association and adjourn to any time or place it may deem necessary.
