



MINUTES OF THE ONE HUNDRED AND THIRTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE INDIAN BOTTOM ASSOCIATION OF OLD REGULAR BAPTIST CHURCHES OF JESUS CHRIST FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 5, 2008 AND THE TWO FOLLOWING DAYS

The Indian Bottom Association, being in session, assembled at our association building at Sassafras, Knott County, Kentucky, on September 5, 2008 and the two following days. Hosted by the Blair Branch Church and co-hosted by the Hurricane Gap Church, the association met in the congregational department of the association building for preaching services. After singing some old songs of Zion, Elder Elwood Cornett called upon Elder Roger Gibson to introduce the service and lead in prayer. Elder Robert Combs followed with the introductory sermon. The delegates were dismissed from the congregational department and asked to assemble in the delegate room. Brothers Howard Owens, Carl Slone, Eddie Newsome and Greg Lewis were appointed by the moderator to remain in the congregational department for preaching services.

In the delegate room, Elder Elwood Cornett, the moderator, welcomed the delegates and called upon Brother Feldon Ruggles, Jr. to introduce the session and Brother Doug Gibson to lead in prayer. The Association, now being assembled, was called to order by Elder Elwood Cornett. He appointed a finance committee to wit: Brothers Rick Whitaker, Joe Steely, and Harlan Eldridge. He then called for the letters of the several churches that compose the Indian Bottom Association.

 A motion was made, seconded, and passed with no objection, to read the letter of the Blair Branch Church. The letter was read by the clerk. By a move and second, with no objection, it was received, along with the other church letters, as they were in regular form. A letter was not received from the Lily of the Valley Church. The delegates were seated and all requests and queries were referred to the Committee on Arrangements.

2. The Association was then organized by choosing the following officers:

Elder Elwood Cornett, Moderator Elder Jim Fields, Assistant Moderator Elder Don Pratt, Clerk/Treasurer Brother Bob Banks, Assistant Clerk

(The following brothers had been appointed to count the votes: Wayne Smith, H.B. Reedy, Jr. and Freddy Watts.)

- 3. By a move and second, with no objection, the moderator was directed to make all temporary appointments.
- 4. The moderator appointed a Committee on Ministry composed of one delegate from each of the churches to arrange the preaching services for Friday afternoon and Saturday morning.
- 5. The moderator called for newly constituted churches desiring to take up fellowship with us. None responded.
- 6. Churches of our same faith and order who desired fellowship with us were called for. None responded.
- 7. A move and second, with no objection, was made to omit the reading of the Articles of Faith, the Constitution and the Rules of Decorum. All were directed to be printed in the minutes.
- 8. The moderator called for transient members and ministers and the following responded: Elder H.B. Reedy, Jr.
- 9. The Committee on Ministry made the following report for preaching services:

Friday afternoon: Brothers Terry Bryant and Eugene Thacker.

Saturday morning: Brothers Alonzo Mosley, Danny Dixon,

Jim Blankenship and Roy Slone.

10. The moderator appointed a Committee on Arrangements composed of one delegate from each church, together with the association moderator, assistant moderator, clerk and assistant clerk.

- 11. A move and second, with no objection, was made for the Committee on Arrangements to meet on Friday afternoon at 1:00 p.m. to arrange the business for Saturday.
- 12. By a move and second, with no objection, the Association was adjourned until 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning. The singing will start in the congregational department at 9:30 a.m.

The Committee on Arrangements met at 1:00 p.m. on Friday afternoon in the congregational department of the association building. After singing, Elder Terry Bryant introduced the service and led in prayer. Elder Eugene Thacker then preached, after which the committee arranged the work for Saturday. Elder David Jent called dismission.

SATURDAY MORNING

The association met pursuant to adjournment. After singing some songs of Zion, Elder Elwood Cornett, our moderator, welcomed everyone and called upon Elder Ronnie Robinson to introduce the session and Elder Hershall (Jimmy) Hall to lead in prayer.

- 1. The clerk called the roll and marked the absentees.
- 2. The report of the Committee on Arrangements was given by the clerk of the association. The report was approved by a move and second, with no objection, and the committee was discharged.

- 3. The ministers chosen to preach on the stand were excused to go to the congregational department of the association building.
- 4. The Committee on Finance reported a sum of \$9,253.00 collected from the various churches. By a move and second, with no objection, the report was received and the committee discharged.
- 5. By a move and second, with no objection, the minutes of this session of the association were ordered to be printed. The clerk is to be secretary/treasurer and will decide how many copies to have printed and distributed to each church, according to the amount of money collected.
- 6. By a move and second, with no objection, the dates of the union, communion and memorial services and appointed meetings are to be printed in the minutes.
- 7. The circular letter was read by Elder Howard Owens, who had been chosen last year to write a circular letter for approval by the association this year. By a move and second, with no objection, the letter was received and ordered to be printed in the minutes.
- 8. A. The Committee on Ministry, being the same as on Friday, chose the following ministers to preach on Sunday, to wit: Brothers Bill Halcomb, Ellis Adams, Eddie Newsome, Bobby Amburgey, and Elwood Cornett.
 - B. The Committee on Ministry chose Elder H.B. Reedy, Jr. to preach the introductory sermon for the 2009 session and Elder Robert Holcomb to be the alternate.
 - C. The Committee on Ministry chose Elder Gary Mosley to write a circular letter for consideration for approval next year.
- 9. By a move and second, with no objection, obituaries are to be printed in the minutes. Obituaries may be given to the clerks at any time during the year. They are to be typed and may be on

paper, a computer disk/CD (MS Word) or emailed to the clerks.

10. The treasurer's report was given by the clerk. By a move and second, with no objection, the report was received and ordered to be printed in the minutes. The report is as follows:

- 12. Elder Elwood Cornett, our moderator, appointed the following brothers to serve another year as the Committee on Council. These brothers are: Terry Bryant, Harvey Creech, Emory Caudill, Ronnie Robinson, Nelson Craft, Roy Slone and Elwood Cornett.
- 13. Elder Elwood Cornett reported that the Association did not receive a church letter from the Lily of the Valley Church. The clerk read a letter from the Lily of the Valley Church stating that the church was withdrawing from the Indian Bottom Association. By a move and second, with no objection, the Lily of the Valley Church was dropped from the list of Indian Bottom Association churches. By a move and second, with no objection, the names of the ministers of the Lily of the Valley Church, James Slone, Mike Smallwood and Clifford Hughes, were removed from the list of Indian Bottom Association ministers. By a move and second, with no objection, it was agreed to receive members of the Lily of the Valley Church desiring membership into Indian Bottom Association churches by recommendation.
- 14. The request from the Cedar Grove Church to host the 2009 Association and the requests from the Big Leatherwood and New Home Churches to co-host the 2009 Association were read and the requests were granted by a move and second, with no objection.
- 15. The request from the Reynolds Fork Church to remove Paul M. Watson's name from the list of ministers was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.

- 16. The request from the Reynolds Fork Church to change their Saturday meeting time from 9:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 17. The request from the Dixon Memorial Church to change their Saturday meeting time from 9:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 18. The request from the Kingdom Come Church to change their memorial meeting time to the first Sunday in June and their union meeting time to the first weekend in May was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 19. The request from the Summertown Church to change their Saturday meeting time from 5:30 p.m. to 10:00 a.m. was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 20. The request from the Emmanuel Church to remove Freddie Ramey's name from the list of ministers was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 21. The request from the Bethlehem Church to remove Billy Campbell's name from the list of ministers was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 22. The request from the Pilgrim's Home Church to remove Arnold Deel's name from the list of ministers was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 23. The request from the Bethany Church to remove Woodrow Tackett's name from the list of ministers was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 24. By a move and second, with no objection, the clerks were directed to write a tribute to the deceased ministers of the Indian Bottom Association

- 25. By a move and second, with no objection, the clerks were directed to write a resolution of appreciation to the Blair Branch and Hurricane Gap Churches for hosting the 2008 session of the Indian Bottom Association.
- 26. There was a move and second, with no objection, to have services at the association building on the following odd-Sundays: November 30, February 1, May 31 and August 30; and at 6:30 p.m. on the Friday night of the Association.
- 27. By a move and second, with no objection, the reading of the minutes of the 2008 session of the Indian Bottom Association was omitted and ordered to be printed in the 2008 minute book.
- 28. By a move and second, with no objection, we adjourned until the 2009 session of the Indian Bottom Association convenes on September 4, 2009. The moderator called on Elder Jim Fields to make the closing remarks and Elder Don Pratt to lead in prayer.

SUNDAY

On this final day of the one hundred and thirteenth session of the Indian Bottom Association, a large congregation of brothers, sisters and friends gathered to worship God. After singing some old songs of Zion, Elder Elwood Cornett, the moderator, welcomed the congregation. Elder James Caudill began to rejoice, to shout and to give glory to God for His blessings. Many other voices were also raised in shouting and praising the goodness of the Lord. Elder Elwood then called upon Elder Bill Halcomb to introduce the service and lead in prayer. He was followed by Elders Ellis Adams, Eddie Newsome, James Caudill and Bob Amburgey. Elder Elwood Cornett then came forth and preached, bringing the meeting to a close. As we lifted our voices in a closing hymn, "Dear Friends Farewell", there was much shouting and rejoicing in the spirit of the Lord. Elder Emory Caudill led in a prayer of dismission, thus ending the 2008 session of the Indian Bottom Association.

MAYWOOD MARTIN AMBURGEY

When I reminisce about my first memory of my mother, the image of a bridge comes into play. I can recall myself standing on that bridge. I am at one end and my mother is at the other. My sister, Theresa, is saying "Mommy, what about the baby". Growing up, in my eyes I was my Daddy's little girl and Theresa belonged to Mother. To be totally honest, from the start, Mother and I had a rocky relationship. That memory of the bridge made my imagination run wild. Too often I thought that Mother was hoping to leave me on that bridge all alone. Throughout the course of my Mother's life, bridges seem to play an important role.

Maywood Martin was born on December 11, 1930 on Puncheon, across the bridge on Beaver Creek, to Ibre and Marie Hall Martin. Mom grew up with three brothers: Amom, Anon and Namon; and two sisters: Miami and Rose.

Too often, Mom would tell me her favorite childhood memory- it involved her and her brother, Amom, skipping school and going to the local grocery store with money that they had found and buying crackers, Vienna sausages and then returning to Puncheon and sitting on the bridge and having the time of their lives. Mom's childhood stories included telling me about how she would gather coal from the hillside for the family after her father passed away, playing with her doll, Nancy, and working in the lumber camp as a cook.

Mom attended school at Puncheon and then at Wayland High School. During that time she met the love of her life, Ivan J. Amburgey. With a guitar in his hand, he sung his way into her heart. After a year and a half of dating, they were married on February 28, 1949 in Pikeville, KY. With \$17.00 in their pockets, one pan, two plates, two cups and 2 forks, their adventure together as man and wife began for the next 59 years.

The two of them journeyed to Detroit, Michigan where Mom worked for Chrysler. During the early 1950's, Dad and Mom moved to Cleveland, Ohio, were Mom worked for Kresge Department Store, and later became a supervisor at American Greeting Card Company. It was during this time that Dad formed a band, with Mom playing the bass. One of Mom's favorite memories involved her performing

with Johnny Cash.

On November 20, 1958, Mom and Dad welcomed a baby girl, Theresa Lynn, into their family. Theresa brought much joy into their lives and then came me and life for the Ivan J. and May Amburgey family was never the same.

I was born on Good Friday, April 20, 1962. Mom, who loved astrology, had read once that daughters that are born on Good Friday could read their mother's mind. Too often, Mother would be thinking something and I would look over at her and answer her unspoken question. When her ability to speak became limited due to the ALS, this unique ability of mine was so, so helpful. Mother could look at me and I knew what she needed. It was as if I could read her mind.

One of the things that Mom and Dad loved to do was to travel. From the rocky sandy shore of the New England states to the white sandy beaches of the south; across the bridges of the mighty Mississippi to the wild, wild west, our family traveled to 48 states, Canada and Mexico.

In 1977, our family moved back to Knott County where Mom and Dad opened the Upper Carr Supermarket. If you found yourself in the Pine Top area on any given day, you could catch Mom behind the counter or up on the hill with her sickle cutting the weeds down. When the store closed, Mom was able to attend church with Dad each Sunday. Soon she was baptized and became a member of the Reynolds Fork Church.

From the stage of the Blackstone in Cleveland, to being an extra in the movies "Next of Kin" with Patrick Swayze and "Fire Down Below" with Steven Seagal, Mom loved the limelight. During the mid 1980's, Mom and I became involved in the world of pageantry. We formed a nationwide pageant system-USA Royal and traveled across the country conducting pageants. One of Mom's favorite things that she was involved with was the Miss Kentucky and Miss America Scholarship Pageants. From 1988 to 1999, Mom served as the Executive Director of Miss Knott County, Miss Perry County, Miss Bowling Green and Miss Southeastern Kentucky Preliminaries. She was also the Little Miss Kentucky Director for three years. In 1990, Mom was delighted when a young woman, named Nancy Cox, entered our lives. Not only did she win our local pageant, but she went on to

become Miss Kentucky. Mom would later say that never in her wildest dreams could she have imagined, as a little girl playing with her doll, Nancy, on the bridge at Puncheon, that one day she could cross the Chesapeake bridge to watch a young girl named Nancy compete for the title of Miss America.

Other than Dad, Mom's greatest love was for her grandchildren. Austin was the little boy she never had and she spoiled him like no one could. He could do no wrong in her eyes. Autumn was her pageant diva and the result of many hours of sewing costumes and pageant clothes. Jacqueline was the scholar, who shared her birthday and that made Mom proud and the one that Mom said reminded her of herself, and Steven, who reminded her of Dad when he was younger, was oh so special to her. For all of us girls in the family, we know how much mother loved her boys.

Mom was looking forward to the birth of her first great-grandchild. When she saw the ultrasound of Autumn and Micah's baby girl, Presley Jayleigh, she had me order a pink fiddle so that one day, the baby could play at the Grand Ole Opry like Daddy had dreamed about.

When Daddy had his massive stroke, I promised him that I would take care of Mother. Nothing in the world could have prepared me for it. With my independence and Mother's strong will, it was if we were on that bridge from my childhood once again, her on one end and me on the other. With the loss of Dad, we learned that we had to meet halfway. Watching my Mother struggle with the loss of Dad was sometimes unbearable. Too often I would hear her talk to Dad's picture and tell him that she loved him and missed him. As the months went by after Dad's passing, Mother's health started to decline. After a few visits to doctors in Lexington, Mom was diagnosed with ALS, commonly known as Lou Gehrig's. Too often, I am described as the planner, the independent one and more importantly during a crisis, the strong one. As Mom got weaker, our relationship is what became stronger. We were no longer meeting each other halfway on that bridge but were traveling on it side by side. From her mile long "To Do Lists" to moving in with her fulltime, I did my best. I kept my promise to my Daddy. According to the Webster's dictionary, a bridge is a structure carrying a pathway over an obstacle. For my Mother and me, that bridge was our journey that tried to overcame our differences and the obstacle of losing her husband and my Daddy, and for us living and fighting the horrible disease of ALS together.

On Wednesday, July 30, at 9:05 pm. I found myself, a little girl once again at one end of that bridge by myself. My mother had traveled all that she could with me and she went to the other side.

RAY BACK

Ray Back was the son of the late Joseph and Margaret "Maggie" Dixon Back. He was born on February 8, 1921 at Elk Creek, near Blackey, Kentucky. He passed away on May 30, 2007 at the age of eighty-six years, three months and twenty-two days.

As brothers, who were close in age, Ray and I developed a special



relationship, when young, that continued through adulthood. I remember him as a fun loving, caring person in all stages of life. Now like many others who miss him, I do so too, but in a special way. However, I cherish fond memories of the many events we shared.

The most important aspect of Ray's adult life was that he was greatly influenced by the doctrine and practice of the Old Regular Baptist Church. Little more than a year later, on July 19, 1958, Wayne and Kat traveled to Clintwood, Virginia, and were married. Shortly after their marriage, in 1959, Wayne's job in construction led him and Kat to Somerset. It was here that they had their first child. On October 27, 1959, a little boy, Jeff, was born. Shortly thereafter, they returned home to Daisy. Wayne began working underground in the coal mines. Then, on October 15, 1962, a baby girl, Sandy, was born. Wayne and Kat eventually made

their way to the small little holler called Turkey Creek. Still working underground, now for Blue Diamond Coal Company, Wayne and Kat had two more children, both baby boys, on February 6, 1968, Dewayne, and on January 30, 1973, Bobby.

Wayne and Kat both began going to church. They were baptized on February 19, 1981, and became members of the Cedar Grove Church. They were both very devoted to their faith and devoted to the church as well.

In 1987, Wayne had worked in the mines for thirty years. He always prided himself in the hard work he had done underground. That, however, would come to a halt. On February 25 of that same year, Wayne was involved in an accident at his job. He spent years in and out of doctor's offices and in and out of therapy, but there was no help for the damage done. He would never be able to turn his head as he once had and he would never regain use of his left arm. But, he would never stop being the hard worker that he always was.

It is here, after this tragedy, where I find the most wonderful memories of Papaw Wayne. Spring was spent planting the garden. Granny would drop the seeds and Papaw would follow behind gently sliding the dirt over them with his giant foot. Spring was also spent gathering firewood for the following winter. My husband, Dusty, often speaks of his first spring with my family, and the first time he helped with the wood. Papaw told him to hold the wedge while he swung the sledgehammer with his one arm. Dusty says that the first swing was one of the scariest moments he has ever experienced, but after that, he trusted Papaw not only with his hand, but with his life.

Summers were spent reaping the bountiful harvest that always seemed to me like, when I was a child, enough food to feed the entire holler for a dozen winters. It was during these times that I was most in awe of Papaw's strength and persistence. He would always emerge from the garden carrying buckets of corn and beans with one hand that I couldn't lift with two. I would always try to help Granny Kat and the other women who were there silking and stringing, but for many years I was too little to be a part of it, so I would tag along behind Papaw. Sometimes we'd go back into the garden for more food, or we'd find a shady spot and sit. We'd watch for squirrels and blue jays, and we'd talk. Every summer though, we'd venture out to the cherry tree in the backyard where we'd try to get the cherries before

the birds, but we were never quick enough. I can remember one time, just once, we managed to get one cherry. Papaw gave it me, and to this day, I can still remember how it tasted and how Papaw laughed at me when my mouth puckered.

I remember Granny calling us for dinner. She'd always have us a mess of corn or beans and whip up some mashed potatoes, and there was always some kind of meat. I'd rush in and set the table, plates, spoons, napkins and forks for everyone. Papaw had his own particular fork, though. Always, he had to have the one special fork. After I got older, I realized it was just the size of the fork that mattered. But, that's one of those things I'll never forget, just like how he used to let me eat straight from the butter bowl. He'd slide it over to me and let me spoon mouthfuls at a time until someone caught us and made me stop. And, then there was the time he led me to believe I was eating "chicken." Seven pieces later, Papaw told me it was in fact squirrel that I had ate. Squirrel just like the ones we'd watch romping through the trees. No, I'll definitely never forget that.

At some point though, whether we were in the garden or after dinner, we'd always wind up on the front porch. I can still see Papaw perched up in the swing, his long legs stretched out in the seat, his lifeless arm propped up on the slat back. He was tired, but he was happy. I wanted to grow up and be just like him; strong, faithful, fun and loving.

This is only a fragment in the enormous life that Albert Wayne Cole lived. He was a son, a brother, a husband, a father, and a grandfather. He was a member of the church, a neighbor and a friend. He was a big man with a big heart. After his accident in the mines, and his diagnoses with hypertension and diabetes, and all the complications of the two, he would suffer for many long years. We all do, and will continue to miss him. For me though, I know he is no longer suffering, no longer in pain. And, I know that his memory will live on in me, for I have more memories than all the paper in the world can hold. I grieve now, not for losing him, because I think that would be selfish of me, but someday, when I have children, they will only have pictures and stories. They will never be able to truly know him and what a great man he was.


We miss Mommy so much, but we know she's in Heaven and we will be with her and Daddy and Millard someday.


Preceding him in death was a daughter, Frieda K. Eldridge, and two grandchildren, Kenneth Wayne and Sherry Lynn Eldridge.

Later in life Polly Ann married Charlie Gibson who also preceded her in death.







Our hearts are so sad since you left us, Dad. But, we know you are resting in Heaven, where we hope to live with you again someday.







ARTICLES OF FAITH

- 1. We believe in the one true and living God, and not withstanding there are Three that bear record in Heaven, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, yet there is but one in substance, equal in power and glory, not to be divided and impossible to change in principle and practice.
- 2. We believe the Old and New Testament Scriptures are the true written words of God and were given by inspiration of God and there is a sufficiency in them contained for our instruction and they are the only rule of our faith and practice.
- 3. We believe the doctrine of original sin, and that man sinned since the fall, and that men are by nature the children of wrath.
- 4. We believe in the impotency or inability of men to recover themselves out of the state they are in; therefore, a Savior is absolutely needed.
- 5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Jesus Christ.
- 6. We believe in the perseverance of the Saints. That by grace through faith they are born again and adopted into the family of Heaven; that they will become equal heirs with Jesus Christ in glory, and that He will raise them up at the last day.
- 7. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Gospel Ordinances; that true believers are the proper subjects and we admit no other.
- 8. We believe that the true mode of baptism is by immersion, to baptize a person by their own consent, back foremost in the water, in the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost.
- 9. We believe that washing of one another's feet is a commandment of Christ, left on record with His disciples, and ought to be practiced by His followers.
- 10. We believe in the resurrection of the dead and general judgment when all will be judged according to their deeds done in the body.
- 11. We believe the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal after death.
- 12. We believe that no one has the right to administer the Gospel Ordinances but such as are legally ordained and qualified there unto.

- 13. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to attend church meetings, and that it is the duty of the church to deal with them for neglecting same.
- 14. We believe it to be the duty of all church members to contribute to the support of the church by defraying all reasonable expenses of same, never neglecting the poor, according to their several abilities.
- 15. We believe that any doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge the people in their sins or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving grace in Christ for salvation is erroneous and such doctrine will be rejected by us.
- 16. None of the above articles shall be construed as to hold with particular election or reprobation as to make God partial directly or indirectly so as to injure children of man.
- 17. None of the above articles shall be altered without legal notice and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall open and close with prayer.
- 2. The moderator and assistant moderator, clerk and assistant clerk, shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- 3. Only one member shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the moderator when he is about to speak.
- 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the moderator until he is done.
- 5. He shall strictly adhere to his subject and in no wise reflect on the preceding speaker, but define his ideas on the proposition for debate, so far as he can.
- 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the same.
- 7. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any subject without permission from the Association.
- 8. No member of the Association shall have the liberty to laugh during the sitting of the same, nor whisper in time of public speech.
- 9. No member shall address another in any other form or term than that of "Brother."
- 10. The moderator shall not interrupt a brother or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his views on the subject unless he shall violate the Rules of Decorum.
- 11. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the clerk, and called as often as the Association may require.
- 12. The moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided, in which event he shall give the deciding vote.
- 13. Any member who shall willfully and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reprimanded by the Association as it may think proper.

CONSTITUTION

Having by unanimous voice changed our organization from an annual meeting to an Association, we therefore propose to keep order and rules of an Association according to the following form of government:

- 1. The Association shall be called the Indian Bottom Association.
- 2. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our union, and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who shall be members whom they judge best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their respective churches, certifying to their appointment, these shall be entitled to a seat.
- 3. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their full number in fellowship; those baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed by letter, excluded and deceased since our last Association.
- 4. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord over God's heritage, nor shall they have any clerical power over the churches, nor shall they infringe on any of the rights of any of the churches in the union.
- 5. The Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum.
- 6. The Association shall have a moderator and assistant moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, and treasurer, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- 7. New churches may be admitted to this union, which shall petition by letter and delegates, and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association, and manifested by the moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.
- 8. Every church in the union shall be entitled to representation in the Association.
- 9. Every query presented by the churches to the Association, being first debated in their own church, shall come under the consideration of the Association.
- 10. Every motion made and seconded shall be considered by the Association, except it be withdrawn by the party who made it.

- 11. We think it absolutely necessary that we have an Association fund for defraying the expense of the same. For the raising of which we think it the duty of each church in the Union to contribute such sums voluntarily as they think proper, and send it by their delegates, to be deposited with the treasurer, who shall be responsible to the Association, and pay same out, as the Association may direct.
- 12. There shall be an Association book kept in which the proceedings of every Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary, who shall receive annual compensation for same.
- 13. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the moderator and clerk before the Association rises.
- 14. Amendments to this plan of government may be made by majority of the union when in regular session, when so desired.
- 15. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of the Association; the best method of effecting the same shall be determined by the Association.
- 16. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of the majority of the members present.
- 17. The Association shall have the power to decide for the general union of the churches and to preserve an inviolable chain of communion among same, giving churches all necessary advice in matters of church difficulty; inquiring into the cause why any church shall have failed to represent itself any time in the Association; appropriate the money received to any purpose it may think proper; appoint any member or members by their consent to transact any business which it may think necessary; withdraw from any church in the union which may violate any of the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion; admit any orderly minister of our faith and order to a seat in the Association and adjourn to any time or place it may deem necessary.
