

MINUTES OF THE ONE HUNDRED AND FOURTEENTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE INDIAN BOTTOM ASSOCIATION OF OLD REGULAR BAPTIST CHURCHES OF JESUS CHRIST FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 4TH, 2009 AND THE TWO FOLLOWING DAYS

The Indian Bottom Association, being in session, assembled at our association building at Sassafras, Knott County, Kentucky, on September 4, 2009 and the two following days. Hosted by the Cedar Grove Church and co-hosted by the Big Leatherwood and New Home Churches, the association met in the congregational department of the association building for preaching services. After singing some old songs of Zion, Elder Robert Halcomb introduced the service and led in prayer. Elder H.B. Reedy, Jr. followed with the introductory sermon.

The delegates were dismissed from the congregational department and asked to assemble in the delegate room. Brothers Toby Breeding, Frank Newsome, Jim Blankenship and David O'Quinn were appointed by the moderator to remain in the congregational department for preaching services. In the delegate room, Elder Elwood Cornett, the moderator, welcomed the delegates and called upon Elder Don Pratt to introduce the session and to lead in prayer. The Association, now being assembled, was called to order by Elder Elwood Cornett. He appointed a finance committee to wit: Brothers John Reedy, Randy Blair and Eugene Combs. He then called for the letters of the several churches that compose the Indian Bottom Association.

- 1. A motion was made and seconded, with no objection, to read the letter of the Cedar Grove Church. The letter was read by the clerk. By a move and second, with no objection, it was received, along with all other church letters, as they were in regular form; the delegates were seated and all requests and queries were referred to the Committee on Arrangements.
- 2. The Association was then organized by choosing the following officers:

Elder Elwood Cornett, Moderator Elder Jim Fields, Assistant Moderator Elder Don Pratt, Clerk/Treasurer Bro. Bob Banks, Assistant Clerk

(The following brothers had been appointed to count the votes: Wayne Smith, Freddy Watts, and Jasper Halcomb.)

- 3. By a move and second, with no objection, the moderator was directed to make all temporary appointments.
- 4. The moderator appointed a Committee on Ministry composed of one delegate from each of the churches to arrange the preaching services for Friday afternoon and Saturday morning.
- 5. The moderator called for newly constituted churches desiring to take up fellowship with us. The clerk read the letter from the Little Martha Church. By a move and second, with no objection, the delegates were seated and the letter referred to the Committee on Arrangements. The clerk read the letter from the Sweet Home Church. By a move and second, with no objection, the delegates were seated and the letter referred to the Committee on Arrangements.
- 6. Churches of our same faith and order who desired fellowship with us were called for: The clerk read the letter from the Little Flock Church. By a move and second, with no objection, the delegates were seated and the letter referred to the Committee on Arrangements.
- 7. By a move and second, with no objection, the clerk was directed to read the Articles of Faith and the reading of the Constitution and the Rules of Decorum was omitted. All were directed to be printed in the minutes.
- 8. The moderator called for transient members and ministers and the following responded: Brothers H.B. Reedy, Jr., Roger Gibson and Arnold Bailey.
- The Committee on Ministry made the following report for preaching services: Friday afternoon: David O'Quinn and Frank Fouts. Saturday morning: Howard Owens, Allen Whitaker, Layton Phipps and Harvey Creech.
- 10. The moderator appointed a Committee on Arrangements composed of one delegate from each church, together with the association moderator, assistant moderator, clerk and assistant clerk.
- 11. A move and second, with no objection, were made for the Committee on Arrangements to meet on Friday afternoon at 1:00 p.m. to arrange the business for Saturday.
- 12. By a move and second, with no objection, the Association was adjourned until 9:00 a.m. Saturday morning. The singing will start in the congregational department at 9:30 a.m.

The Committee on Arrangements met at 1:00 p.m. on Friday afternoon in the congregational department of the association building. After singing, Elder David O'Quinn introduced the service and led in prayer. Elder Frank Fouts then preached, after which the committee arranged the work for Saturday. Elder Merle Caudill called dismission.

SATURDAY MORNING

The association met pursuant to adjournment. After singing some songs of Zion, Elder Elwood Cornett, our moderator, welcomed everyone and called upon Elder Jim Fields to introduce the session and Elder Earl Mosley led in prayer.

- 1. The clerk called the roll and marked the absentees.
- 2. The report of the Committee on Arrangements was given by the clerk of the association. The report was approved by a move and second, with no objection, and the committee was discharged.
- 3. Elder Elwood Cornett, Association moderator, addressed the delegates, as follows:

Our biggest challenge in recent years has been to maintain proper order; to hold fast to that which will keep us on the proper path. It has not been easy. The gospel is the power of God unto salvation. I have visited all of our churches during the past year and I have heard and felt the gospel preached in all of them. There is a message going throughout the land that salvation is by the works of man. Salvation is not obtained by works but salvation is the gift of God. Our forefathers knew what it took to obtain salvation and maintain the gospel. They knew that we could not be yoked with just anything. In order for us to live together in peace we have established orders.

I will read a couple of our orders. The 1999 Indian Bottom Association minutes, Item 12,A.5 states: "In funerals and family memorials, Indian Bottom ministers may preach with those with which we are not in correspondence." We are an exclusive band of people; we have been born of the spirit of God. There are boundary lines that were set by those before us. Our forefathers knew that when the boundary lines are gone, we forget who we are. There are those who want to be called by our name and follow the practice of others. We have seen other churches do this and they have faltered in faith and are gone. The 1999 Indian Bottom Association minutes, Item 12,A.10 states: "Indian Bottom Churches may receive Godly members by recommendation from Regular Baptist churches of associations with which we formerly corresponded (Philadelphia, Sardis, Northern New Salem, New Salem, Union, Thornton Union, Mud River, Friendship and Old Indian Bottom Associations), providing those members were baptized by an ordained Old Regular Baptist minister. (A recommendation must come from a member having personal knowledge of the qualifications of the recommended person.)."

When we lose sight of our boundary lines, we too will fade away as others have done. We are mostly an association of churches that came looking for a home. It is not necessary to think that we have to remodel the Association to prosper. God has prospered us, let's rejoice in that peace.

- 4. The ministers chosen to preach on the stand were excused to go to the congregational department of the association building.
- 5. The Committee on Finance reported a sum of \$8,925.00 collected from the various churches. By a move and second, with no objection, the report was received and the committee discharged.
- 6. By a move and second, with no objection, the minutes of this session of the association were ordered to be printed. The clerk is to be secretary/treasurer and will decide how many copies to have printed and distributed to each church, according to the amount of money collected. By a move and second, with no objection, the clerks were given permission to contact the churches, as needed, to verify information stated on the church letter. By a move and second, with no objection, the clerks were authorized to decide the size and style of the minute books.
- 7. By a move and second, with no objection, the dates of the union, communion and memorial services and appointed meetings are to be printed in the minutes.
- 8. The circular letter was read by Elder Gary Mosley, who had been chosen last year to write a circular letter for approval by the association this year. By a move and second, with no objection, the letter was received and ordered to be printed in the minutes.
- 9. A. The Committee on Ministry, being the same as on Friday, chose the following ministers to preach on Sunday, to wit: Brothers Ronnie Robinson, Willie Crase, Jr., Jeff Combs, Sabert Nichols and Elwood Cornett.
 B. The Committee on Ministry chose Elder Merle Caudill to preach the introductory sermon for the 2010 session and Elder Ronnie Robinson to be the alternate.
 C. The Committee on Ministry chose Elder Mickey Amburgey to write a circular letter for consideration of approval next year.
- 10. By a move and second, with no objection, obituaries are to be printed in the minutes. Obituaries may be given to the clerks at any time during the year. They are to be typed and may be on paper, a computer disk/CD(MS Word) or emailed to the clerks.

11. The treasurer's report was given by the clerk. By a move and second, with no objection, the report was received and ordered to be printed in the minutes. The report is as follows:

13. Elder Elwood Cornett, our moderator, appointed the following brothers to serve another year as the Committee on Council. These brothers are: Terry Bryant, Harvey Creech, Emory Caudill, Ronnie Robinson, Nelson Craft, Roy Slone and Elwood Cornett.

The minutes of the Committee on Council meeting with the Little Flock Church were read by the clerk. Elder Elwood Cornett discussed the history of the Little Flock Church and their letter to the Indian Bottom Association. By a move and second, with no objection, the Little Flock Church was received into full fellowship of the Indian Bottom Association and the delegates were given the right hand of fellowship.

- 14. The clerk read the minutes of the presbytery that established the Little Martha Church. Elder Elwood Cornett discussed the arm from the Little Jewell Church, the work of the presbytery, the organization of the church and their letter to the Indian Bottom Association. By a move and second, with no objection, the Little Martha Church was received into full fellowship of the Indian Bottom Association and the delegates were given the right hand of fellowship.
- 15. The clerk read the minutes of the presbytery that established the Sweet Home Church. Elder Elwood Cornett discussed the arm from the Caney Fork Church, the work of the presbytery, the organization of the church and their letter to the Indian Bottom Association. By a move and second, with no objection, the Sweet Home Church was received into full fellowship of the Indian Bottom Association and the delegates were given the right hand of fellowship.
- 16. The requests from the Tolson Creek Church to host the 2010 Association and the Friendship Church to co-host the 2010 Association were read. The Chester Hogg Memorial, Little Zion and Clear Fork Churches made verbal requests to co-host the 2010 Association. The requests were granted by a move and second, with no objection.
- 17. The request from the Big Creek Church to change their monthly meeting time from the fourth Saturday and Sunday to the third Saturday and Sunday was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 18. The request from the Little Bethany Church to change their monthly meeting time from the fourth Saturday and Sunday to the third Saturday and Sunday was discussed. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 19. The request from the Chester Hogg Memorial Church to list the physical (911) address of each church in the minutes was read. By a move and second, with no objection, it was agreed to begin the process of obtaining the physical (911) address of each church for printing in the minutes.

- 20. The request from the Bright Morning Star Church requesting permission to dissolve and to give letters to the members to go into one of our other churches was read. By a move and second, with no objection, the request was granted.
- 21. By a move and second, with no objection, the clerks were directed to write a tribute to the deceased ministers of the Indian Bottom Association.
- 22. By a move and second, with no objection, the clerks were directed to write a resolution of appreciation to the Cedar Grove, Big Leatherwood and New Home Churches for hosting the 2009 session of the Indian Bottom Association.
- 23. There was a move and second, with no objection, to have services at the association building on the following odd-Sundays: November 1, January 31, May 30 and August 29; and at 6:30 p.m. on the Friday night of the Association.
- 24. By a move and second, with no objection, the reading of the minutes of the 2009 session of the Indian Bottom Association was omitted and ordered to be printed in the 2009 minute book.
- 25. By a move and second, with no objection, we adjourned until the 2010 session of the Indian Bottom Association convenes on September 3, 2010. The moderator called on Elder Hershell (Jimmy) Hall to lead the closing prayer.

SUNDAY

On this final day of the one hundred and fourteenth session of the Indian Bottom Association, brothers, sisters and friends gathered at the Association building. After singing some songs of Zion, Elder Elwood Cornett, the moderator, welcomed the congregation. Elder Elwood then called upon Elder Ronnie Robinson to introduce the service and Elder Charles Shepherd to lead in prayer. They were followed by Elders Willie Crase, Jr., Jeff Combs and Sabert Nichols. Elder Elwood Cornett then came forth and preached, bringing the meeting to a close with much shouting and rejoicing in the Lord. Elder Squire Watts led in the prayer of dismission, thus ending the 2009 session of the Indian Bottom Association.

CIRCULAR LETTER

To the Indian Bottom Association:

Being chosen by the delegates of our Association to write a Circular Letter, to be read at this, the one hundred fourteenth session, it is an honor to be chosen by the delegates to write this letter. It is with much fear, many prayers, and the help of God that I stand here before you. These are the thoughts that have come to my mind.

In a world filled with much confusion and one that changes almost daily, what great consolation it is to know that God never changes. 




DELTA CAUDILL

She was preceded in death by her first husband, Jasper Gayheart (my Dad). He passed away at the age of sixty-seven on March 20, 1985.






Lettie and Clark worked hard to make a home and to provide for their

On May 24-25, 1994, Garfield joined and was baptized into the Left Beaver Church of Martin, Kentucky. He began to talk about the goodness of the Lord and the beautiful sights that he had seen as a servant of Jesus Christ! (His bright and shining armor). Now he is at peace with the Lord.





Virgil still lives at Hallie and Vanzel was killed in an accident when he was a young man. Two sisters, Lizzie and Mary, died as babies. He had two other sisters: Mandie Back and Nora Halcomb. They treated him like their "baby" as long as they lived.

Daddy went into the Army during World War II. He was wounded on July 4, 1944 just a few days after he entered combat. He never dwelled on his injuries and some of us never heard any of his war stories. He was always proud to be a Purple Heart Veteran. Although he always worked to provided for his family, he suffered pain everyday in that bad foot. In the

final days, as he told us things to do, he always stressed that we not put shoes on his feet when we bury him; socks, yes, shoes, no.

Sixty-three years ago Daddy married our Mom, Ora Watts Whitaker, on June 6, 1946. After he died, Mom decided to bury him in a suit because, and I quote, "suits are pretty and he was pretty." One of the kids asked her if she had married Daddy because he was pretty to look at or for his money. She said it surely wasn't for his money because the poor fellow had to borrow a pair of dress pants from Chester Whitaker to get married in.

Daddy was always proud to have eight children. How many times have we heard him tell people, "I've got four boys and four girls: four blue eyed and four brown eyed; one blue eyed boy and one brown eyed girl; they came boy, girl, boy, girl, boy, girl, boy, girl." His first boy was named Manuel Dean after someone he had been in the Army with. He lives at Jeremiah and grew up to be a truck driver like Daddy. They named the oldest daughter, Grethel, then called her Dosh almost from the time she was born. She provided him with his first son-in-law, Jim Fields, and tried to make sure he always had a baby to play with right up to the time he went home.

Denzil lives on Leatherwood and has been married to Teresa so long that she seems like one of the family. He is the blue eyed boy. His brown eyed girl is Freedia. She is married to his other preacher son-in-law, Virgil Combs. They live at Carcassone. Venon lives next door to Mom. He worked third shift and brought breakfast from the diary bar every morning the last few months of Daddy's life. Gertrude is the only blonde haired girl and always took care of his court house errands. She also rarely missed a Sunday coming to his house. She is married to Wayne Maggard and they live at Cowan.

Since 1962, he has been telling people, "This is my baby boy, Ricky Allen." He was always pleased when people in the church told him that Rick sounded just like him "giving out" songs. Rick is married to Melinda, who for years, has rarely missed a Sunday coming to Daddy's house. They live at Hallie.

How, in a sentence or two, do we talk about his baby, Mary Janet? There isn't enough paper or enough time to say how much we appreciate the sacrifice she has made to take care of our parents. She has not spent a whole day or night at her house with her husband and daughter since October, 2008. But, every single morning her cell phone would play

the ring tone, "Just give it Away" and whoever was there would say, "Mary, Marty is calling you." Even Mom knows his call. While we are eternally grateful to Mary, we have to thank her husband, Marty Collins, who lives at Isom, also.

We were all important to Daddy. He loved it when the eight of us were together. Almost every day for the past few months he wanted to know where each one of us was.

Mary called it his daily head count. She would tell him what state Dean was in and go from there to tell him as best she knew where we all were. Except for Dean, she could usually get us all there within an hour if that is what he wanted. Besides his eight children, he had a host of grandchildren that he loved like his own. He also had a bunch of great grandchildren that brought him much joy in his latter days.

Mom has sat by Daddy's bed and took care of him as much as she could. She got in that chair at seven a.m. and, except for going to the bathroom, she did not get up until ten p.m. Often, he would hold out his hand and she would take it in her little crippled hand and hold it for hours. She would tell us what kind of sheets to put on his bed and what kind of clothes to put on him. The night before he died, she sat there until five o'clock in the morning. She went to bed for a couple of hours then was back there. It was she who recognized that he was taking his last breaths as he went home. Daddy was not a perfect man, but he set high standards for us and we respected him a lot. Mom may "quarrel" at us or tell us three times to do the same job, but if Daddy said, "Did you hear what your Mom said?" we moved quickly.

As far back as we can remember, Daddy and Mom went to church. They did not go every Sunday, but they did not miss Cedar Grove very much. For years, people thought Daddy was already a church member. We don't know exactly when he was saved, but he joined the Cedar Grove Church on Christmas Day in 1972 and was baptized, along with our sister, Freedia, in January, 1973. He was ordained a deacon in May, 1973. He always took that job seriously and did not waver much from what he believed to be right. He always enjoyed serving at communions and participating in presbyteries. The last presbytery he participated in was the deacon ordination of his own "baby boy", Ricky Allen. He always tried to keep the deacons younger than him in line. A few weeks ago on Saturday morning, Rick cooked a big breakfast at Daddy's and called Freddie Watts, a Cedar Grove deacon, to come over and eat. In a few minutes, Freddie showed up in a disheveled state, with his hair sticking up. Daddy looked at him and said, "I think there is a comb here somewhere if you want to use it."

Daddy was clerk of the Cedar Grove Church from October, 1978 until May, 2008 when he resigned because of his health. He always tried to keep up with the church members. When someone died, he automatically looked up how long they had been a member just in case the Moderator asked. When he could no longer go to church, he had church at home by way of tapes and CDs. He has sung and talked to the Lord many nights, practically all night long. For a couple of months he has wanted us to keep him "shaved up" for he was going on a journey just any time. He wanted to go and often begged to go. Once when he was wanting Mary to shave him because he may be going somewhere "today or tomorrow," she asked if she could go with him. He told her if she was ready she could go.

Many birds visited a feeder that was outside the window where Daddy's hospital bed was. The morning he died, someone noticed a white dove outside. We had not seen that before and many of us gathered to see it. We somehow felt comforted by its presence and Daddy went home to be with the Lord in just a little while. He was laid to rest in a little spot he picked out and named the Whitaker Cemetery.


- 9. We believe that washing of one another's feet is a commandment of Christ, left on record with His disciples, and ought to be practiced by His followers.

- 15. We believe that any doctrine that goes to encourage or indulge the people in their sins or cause them to settle down on anything short of saving grace in Christ for salvation is erroneous and such doctrine will be rejected by us.
- 16. None of the above articles shall be construed as to hold with particular election or reprobation as to make God partial directly or indirectly so as to injure children of man.
- 17. None of the above articles shall be altered without legal notice and free consent.

RULES OF DECORUM

- 1. The Association shall open and close with prayer.
- 2. The moderator and assistant moderator, clerk and assistant clerk, shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- 3. Only one member shall speak at a time, and shall rise from his seat and address the moderator when he is about to speak.
- 4. The person thus speaking shall not be interrupted in his speech by anyone except the moderator until he is done.
- 5. He shall strictly adhere to his subject and in no wise reflect on the preceding speaker, but define his ideas on the proposition for debate, so far as he can.
- 6. No person shall abruptly absent himself from the Association without leave of the same.
- 7. No person shall rise and speak more than three times on any subject without permission from the Association.
- 8. No member of the Association shall

have the liberty to laugh during the sitting of the same, nor whisper in time of public speech.

- 9. No member shall address another in any other form or term than that of "Brother."
- 10. The moderator shall not interrupt a brother or prohibit him from speaking until he gives his views on the subject unless he shall violate the Rules of Decorum.
- 11. The names of the several members of the Association shall be enrolled by the clerk, and called as often as the Association may require.
- 12. The moderator shall be entitled to the same privileges of speech as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall have no vote unless the Association be equally divided, in which event he shall give the deciding vote.
- 13. Any member who shall willfully and knowingly violate any of these rules shall be reprimanded by the Association as it may think proper.



CONSTITUTION

Having by unanimous voice changed our organization from an annual meeting to an Association, we therefore propose to keep order and rules of an Association according to the following form of government:

- 1. The Association shall be called the Indian Bottom Association.
- 2. The Association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches in our union, and duly sent to represent them in the Association, who shall be members whom they judge best qualified for that purpose, and producing letters from their respective churches, certifying to their appointment, these shall be entitled to a seat.
- 3. In the letters from the different churches shall be expressed their full number in fellowship; those baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed by letter, excluded and deceased since our last Association.
- 4. The members thus chosen and convened shall have no power to lord over God's heritage, nor shall they have any clerical power over the churches, nor shall they infringe on any of the rights of any of the churches in the union.
- 5. The Association, when convened, shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum.
- 6. The Association shall have a moderator and assistant moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, and treasurer, who shall be chosen by the suffrage of the members present.
- 7. New churches may be admitted to this union, which shall petition by letter and delegates, and if found upon examina-

tion to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association, and manifested by the moderator giving the right hand of fellowship.

- 8. Every church in the union shall be entitled to representation in the Association.
- 9. Every query presented by the churches to the Association, being first debated in their own church, shall come under the consideration of the Association.
- 10. Every motion made and seconded shall be considered by the Association, except it be withdrawn by the party who made it.
- 11. We think it absolutely necessary that we have an Association fund for defraying the expense of the same. For the raising of which we think it the duty of each church in the Union to contribute such sums voluntarily as they think proper, and send it by their delegates, to be deposited with the treasurer, who shall be responsible to the Association, and pay same out, as the Association may direct.
- 12. There shall be an Association book kept in which the proceedings of every Association shall be regularly recorded by the secretary, who shall receive annual compensation for same.
- 13. The minutes of the Association shall be read and corrected, if need be, and signed by the moderator and clerk before the Association rises.
- 14. Amendments to this plan of government may be made by majority of the union when in regular session, when so desired.

- 15. The Association shall endeavor to furnish the churches with minutes of the Association; the best method of effecting the same shall be determined by the Association.
- 16. All matters coming before the Association shall be decided by will of the majority of the members present.
- 17. The Association shall have the power to decide for the general union of the churches and to preserve an inviolable chain of communion among same, giving churches all necessary advice in matters of church difficulty; inquiring into the cause why any church shall

have failed to represent itself any time in the Association; appropriate the money received to any purpose it may think proper; appoint any member or members by their consent to transact any business which it may think necessary; withdraw from any church in the union which may violate any of the rules of the Association or deviate from the orthodox principles of religion; admit any orderly minister of our faith and order to a seat in the Association and adjourn to any time or place it may deem necessary.

CHURCH LETTER

We are glad that we can correspond with you, and we have chosen these, our beloved Brethern, to bear this, our letter, to you, to-wit:


